Contamination closes four City wells

The City has shut down four of its five operating wells due to contamination. The state Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has been monitoring wells throughout the state and has found a contaminant, tetrachloroethylene, to be present in Rahway's wells. The chemical is a derivative of dry cleaning fluids and degreasers.

Water Department, the City has requested help from the state in locating the source of the contamination. City wells 1 and 4 were closed on Aug. 13 and wells 2 and 5 were closed on Oct. 31. "We have received letters from the state advising us that the water is not acceptable by their guidelines," said Schimmel. "Wells 1 and 4 were shut off previously to the letter by our own analysis. The state said wells 2 and 3 were not acceptable but did not advise us not to use them as a source of supply. We have terminated usage as a safety measure."

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The City is now in the process of talking with consulting engineers on proposals for designing a water treatment facility to remove contaminants, said Schimmel. "Based on these proposals we will make a determination as to the feasibility of keeping the wells running or abandoning them," explained Schimmel.

Community development subject of hearing

A public hearing and special meeting was held on Nov. 10 to allow the public to add their input on Community Development Funds to be received by Rahway.

The county receives \$4 million each year from the Department of Urban Development and municipalities compete for portions of the funds.

Only one resident, Kay Papirnik, who is Rahway's senior citizen coordinator, approached the council for funds. Mrs. Papirnik asked if funds would be allocated for the senior citizen bus service. Councilman Harvey Williams said a proposal for \$31,000 would be submitted for senior activities.

Other proposed projects include a housing rehabilita-

tion program, downtown facade program and construction of a sewer on Hazelwood Ave.

Councilman Williams explained that projects must benefit low and moderate income families in order to be considered for the Community Development Funds.

He is the third son of John and Irene Kerekpyarto to serve in the Navy.

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
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
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Rahway NAACP to bestow awards

The president of the Rahway Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, John Robertson, and the Freedom Fund Dinner Chairwoman, Cheryl Buffalo, announced the award recipients who will be honored tomorrow evening at the branch's annual Freedom Fund Dinner and Awards Banquet at the Landmark Inn, Woodbridge, 7 p.m. The guest speaker will be Dr. Betty Shabazz, Director of Communications and Public Relations at Melvin Evers College in Brooklyn, New York. This event honors the accomplishments of persons in the community who have contributed to the well being of all citizens, and provides sustaining funds for the local, as well as the national, office, stated Robertson and Buffalo.

Charlie Braine and Myrtle D. Thomas will be introduced into the NAACP Hall of Fame and receive the Hall of Fame Award, which is the highest honor the branch can bestow on any member. Her recipient must adhere to the principles and philosophy of family stability, as well as having at least 20 years membership during which they were in good financial standing and must have held an elective office.

Inductee, Charlie Braine, received his Bachelor of Science Degree from A&T College, Greensboro, North Carolina. He is employed by Merck & Co where he is a member of its Quartet Century Club and has been the recipient of the Harry Faulkner Humanitarian Award from the Human Relations Committee of the Rahway Division of Merck, Sharpe & Dohme Co.

He is the chairman of the Board of Trustees of Second Baptist Church where he also serves as a Sunday School teacher, and is a past Superintendent. Also, he is a member and past president of the Church Choir and a member of the Male Fellowship Chorus.

His community activities include serving as past president of the Rahway Carteret Branch of the NAACP, past assistant Scoutmaster candidate for Fourth Ward Councilman, Rahway, and a member of Hiram Lodge No. 54 AF-KAM. He was organizer of the American Legion Post No. 499, Rahway, in 1973 and has held many posts with this group. He is presently a member of its Americanism Committee and a Department Executive Committee man, State of New Jersey. Also, Mr. Braine served a tour of duty in the United States Army in Germany with the 26th Infantry Division during the Nuremberg Trials.

Myrtle D. Thomas is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. Thomas. She began her NAACP involvement at the age of 12 when she joined the Rahway NAACP Youth Group. This youth group was involved in many projects in the community. They supported the first Black Rahway Board of Education candidate with telephone and door to door

citation; they marched for the hiring of young Black people to work in various stores in town; and, Ms. Thomas, along with other NAACP youth, campaigned for the first Black Freeholder in 1964 and he won the election.

Ms. Thomas has been a member of the adult branch for 25 years and has served in various capacities. She is Branch Secretary, Program Chairperson, Chairperson of the Souvenir Fund and ticket committee, and as Financial Secretary.

In June of 1985 she became a member of the NAACP's Club 100 for soliciting 100 or more memberships and she is a Life Member of the NAACP. She is employed at Supermarkets General Corporation (PATH MARK) as an accounts payable supervisor. She was the first Black to become a supervisor in the office environment there.

She is a 30 year member of Second Baptist Church, Rahway, and is the priest of the Women's Guild. Ms. Thomas is the youngest person to be inducted in the Rahway NAACP Hall of Fame and states that she is very proud and honored and will continue to strive for equality among people, with God's help.

To win the Rahway Branch Community Service Award there must be a demonstration of consistent performance, attitude and commitment to humanitarian efforts and one must adhere to family stability and improvement of life for black families and conduct in a manner which reflects high achievement, civic obligations, spirituality and vocational goals. The recipients are Margaret Lucas Stockley, James White, and the Supermarkets General Corporation.

Margaret Lucas Stockley joined the NAACP more than 30 years ago and has been very active. She is a past secretary of the Branch. She is an avid church worker at Second Baptist Church where she serves on the Senior Usher Board, the Golden Rule Club and is 1st vice president of the Women's Guild. She is a Life Member of the National Council of Negro Women Rahway Section and currently serves as section treasurer.

Mrs. Stockley is the mother of Dr. Henry Lucas, Dr. M. Duke Lucas, Mrs. Vivian Hurling and late Lenore Lucas Williams. James White has been a resident of Rahway since 1946 and has been a member of the NAACP since last year. He served as Membership Chairman and he presently serves as Membership with Deacon Roosevelt Robinson.

When his children reached the ages to participate in recreational sports, Mr. White became very active in the local recreational organizations as assistant coach and coach for the Little League baseball teams and supported the Little League Football through the Citizens Youth Recreation Committee. Also, at

the time he was involved with the local Boy Scouts and served as secretary treasurer. He was an unsuccessful candidate for the Board of Education in the 1960 election. During that time, he became involved in organizing the Rahway Coalition and out of this coalition came the Community Action Organization and the creation of the John F. Kennedy Community Center was accomplished.

Recipient, Supermarkets General Corporation, embraced its Affirmative Action Program in 1970. Supermarkets General is a top employer in the State of New Jersey. Of the 40,000 employees, Blacks now number 16%. These represent a 25% increase in employment of Black ranging from management, office workers, sales, skilled and semi-skilled personnel. M*A*S*H

Based on the television series and movie of the same name, **M*A*S*H** will star senior Joe Colombo as Hawkeye Pierce, the role made famous first by Elliott Gould and later by Alan Alda. Lynda Schubert, also a senior, will play Margaret "Hot Lips" Houlihan, and junior Rob Clifford will play Hawkeye's sidekick, Duke Forrest.

The play also includes such favorites as Frank Burns, played by Rob Harrington, General Hammond, played by John Clement, and Trapper John, played by Jim Sargent. Altogether thirty-five actors and actresses play the colorful cast of characters who "laugh to keep from crying" their way through the Korean War.

Mr. Michael Vogel, director of **M*A*S*H**, calls the play "a funny, but sobering look at war." Mrs. Sam D. Hirschman, art teacher at the high school, and the Johnson Regional Art Club have constructed the sets that take us back to Korea in the early fifties. Mrs. Jen Malloy is Mr. Vogel's stage manager, and Miss Donna LaSpata is in charge of gathering the enormous number of props required for the show.

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
