## Three R's improve for Rahway students

William Humphries, Director of Student Personnel Services, reported on High School Proficiency Test (HSPT) results, standardized achievement tests, and analysis of the tests for parents of Rahway students on Nov. 17.

Calling the scores the highest ever achieved in Rahway, Humphries said that although no one "feels good" about the HSPT scores, an improvement was shown over the past three years.

The Iowa Test of Basic Skills is administered to students in grades K through eight. This norm referenced test compares Rahway with what is being achieved in other school systems throughout the nation. Test results show increased scores in grades K, first, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh.

Tests of Achievement and Proficiency are used in grades nine through eleven. In Rahway, grade ten showed an increase in 1986.

The HSPT is administered to ninth graders who must pass it in order to graduate. If a student fails the test in ninth grade, he or she is allowed to take it again in tenth, eleventh or twelfth grade. Students who fail the test are given compulsory education in that subject funded through State Aid.

A practice HSPT test was given in 1983-84 and 1984-85 with results of passing grades of 55 percent in

reading in 1983-84 and 65 percent in 1984-85; a passing grade of 43 percent in math in 1983-84 and 53 percent in 1984-85; and a passing grade in writing of 66 percent in 1983-84 and 63 percent in 1984-85.

In 1985-86, when the HSPT was first used as a graduation requirement, Rahway's passing scores were 76 percent in reading, 57 percent in math and 71 percent in writing.

"The only redeeming feature in these last scores," said Humphries, "is that we have improved since taking the test the last two years. We improved in reading and math the first two years and writing improved this year. An analysis is written on each subject area to point out our strengths and weaknesses. We try to maintain the areas where we are strong and improve the areas where we are weak."

## School district to receive additional funds for HSPT testing

The Regional District Board of Education voted to accept additional funds in State Aid for High School Proficiency Test (HSPT) remediation at its regular meeting held on November 3.

The Regional District, which includes Atlantic Highlands, Clark, and Scotch Plains, was increased from \$193,832 to \$194,403 to reflect this change.

## DeLorenzo receives Hixson Fellowship award

Arthur DeLorenzo was the proud recipient of the George F. Hixson Fellowship award at a dinner held on Thursday, November 13 at the Landmark in Woodbridge. The dinner was held to honor DeLorenzo for representing the New Jersey District of Kiwanis as an International Trustee. The Trial Lawyers Notebook

How much are we suing for?

Perhaps one of the most frequent questions that our clients ask is "How much are we suing for?" You can imagine how frustrated they are when they are told that in New Jersey no amount of money is specifically requested in the lawsuit and no sum of money can be specifically asked for from a jury.

New Jersey is one of the few states that forbid plaintiffs' control in personal injury cases from requesting a sum of money in their lawsuit and from the jury itself. This has not always been the law. The New Jersey Supreme Court in the 1928 case of Botta v. Brunner held that it was improper for plaintiffs' counsel to suggest to the jury in closing argument a sum of money which should be awarded to the victim.

How much would you sue as a juror know how much money is not permitted to suggest a sum of money that he or she would award to the victim in most other states. In New Jersey, that is not the case. In fact, a fair compensation for his or her client's injuries is not example of the jury's duty. In those states, it is free to accept the number, reject the number or return any other amount of money that they feel would adequately compensate the victim. You may remember the foreman of the jury in Paul Newman's movie The Verdict asked, "Can we return more money than the plaintiffs have requested? That cannot happen in New Jersey since the plaintiff's lawyer may not suggest any amount of money to the jury.

It is even certain guidelines by the judge at the end of the case. They are called jury charges. In these charges the judge tries to explain to the jury how to arrive at a verdict and how to determine the amount of damages. The measure of damages is what a reasonable person would consider to be adequate and just under all the circumstances to compensate the plaintiff for his or her injury. The law does not provide you with any table, schedule or formula by which a person's pain and suffering may be measured in terms of money. The amount is left to your sound discretion. It is not an arbitrary power left to you, but rather the mechanism by which you are to attempt to make the plaintiff whole, so far as money can do so without having any idea of what would be fair and reasonable compensation and without knowing how much was being sought.

A recent change in the law now permits the victim's lawyer to make a "time unit argument" to help the jury in returning a fair verdict. For example, the lawyer may suggest that the victim has \$100,000 worth of lost wages based on court-approved life expectancy tables. He therefore may suggest to the jury that they may attach a monetary unit to each of those hours. The lawyer may not say what specific dollar amount should be awarded for each hour in pain and suffering the victim must endure for any permanent or temporary injury resulting in disability to the victim or to his or her family. Hopefully, you will now understand why your attorney cannot give you a specific answer when you ask how much he is suing for. If your lawyer is not sure what amount to serve as a juror in a personal injury case, you will now understand why the victim's lawyer will be selling you the dollar figure that he is seeking. Perhaps allowing the victim's lawyer to suggest the amount of the verdict would restore some predictability to verdicts and would best serve in helping jurors reach a fairer verdict.

TAKE MY WORD FOR IT

There is very strong evidence to support the theory that Atlas, a mythological Greek god and keeper of the "Fates", was the source of our word Atlantic. There is another explanation why the word was also the source of the name for the East Island of Atlantis. Atlas came from a Greek word meaning "to uphold", which he did quite well. For, you see, Atlas was a titan who was condemned by Zeus to hold up the heavens and especially earth for having attempted to storm heaven. Atlantis, incidentally, was the Greek adjective for Atlas. Legend has it that about 1450 B.C., a volcano erupted on the island of Thera currently Santorini which destroyed Knossos and perhaps the fabled Atlantis. Much later, a mountain in North West Africa was named Mount Atlas, and the sea that lay at its feet was called Atlantikos, later anglicized to Atlantic. In the latter part of the 16th century, Atlas was depicted holding the world on his back on the frontispiece of a book of maps published by Flemish geographer Gerhardus Mercator. As a result, any collection of maps published since then has been called an Atlas. We hope Atlas continues to hold up his end. What a lot down of the "drips the ball!"

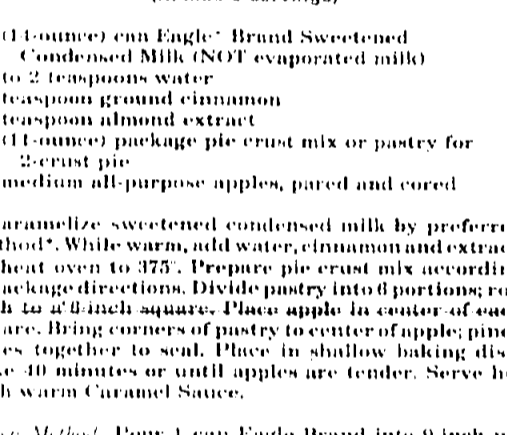

1 1/2 cups corn meal
