

Rep. Rinaldo to sponsor energy standards bill

A senior Republican member of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo, R-N.J., said he will introduce the home appliance energy standards bill when the new Congress convenes in January.

"The President has all agreed to begin work on what would be the back-burner unlikely coalition of appliance makers, consumer advocates and utilities," Rinaldo said. "It would have cut consumer energy costs, deflected the need for up to 10 new power plants, and replaced a patchwork of state codes with a single national standard."

President Reagan pocket vetoed the bill, the National Energy Conservation Act of 1985, which was passed, completed its business, and adjourned for the November 4 elections. He opposed it on the grounds that it interfered with the marketplace, consumers chose and the prerogatives of states to set their own standards.

"I love the President's veto is simply an opportunity deferred and not lost," Rinaldo said in announcing in a news conference and press for its approval early in the session. "It's a good measure that would conserve energy, save money, and it has the support of the Association of Home Appliance Manufacturers, the American Council for an Energy-Efficient Economy, which is a non-profit conservation organization, and the Edison Electric Institute, an association representing investors owned utilities.

The proposed standards would have required most new home appliances, such as refrigerators, freezers, ranges and dishwashers to use between 25 percent less electricity than national gas. To reduce the economic impact on the appliance industry, the new standards

would have been phased in over a four year period to allow manufacturers sufficient time to retool their assembly lines.

The American Council for an Energy-Efficient Economy calculated that based on the current cost of electricity, the bill would have saved consumers \$38 billion, or about \$100 per household, by the year 2000. It further revealed that the more efficient appliances would have obviated the need for 10 new power plants capable of generating 22,000 megawatts of electricity. Household appliances account for about 50 percent of all residential energy consumption and nearly 25 percent total U.S. energy consumption.

Rinaldo said the administration initially backed the bill because it pre-empted a provision of state appliance standards that make it costly and difficult to plan for appliance production, and utility companies liked the idea of having a single standard and have improved them ability to forecast future electrical requirements. U.S. utility companies have lately over built with an estimated sum of \$20 billion, according to Dennis L. Johnson, a utility data manager, who says the market has not materialized.

The cost of the unused capacity is being passed along to consumers, and rejecting the administration's position of non-interference in the marketplace, Rinaldo said. "It's better to have a little bit of regulation in the form of standards to which all concerned have agreed than to have much more rigid standards from the federal government." State standards are arbitrary and costly federal rules that may be issued by the Department of Energy in the absence of congressional action.

And the economic argument is not compelling because a large percentage of home appliances are purchased by

Over 40 business and pro
perty owners met to discuss
a planned Special Improve
ment District and manage
ment corporation for the
downtown area last week at
an informational meeting held
on Nov. 19 at City Hall.

Business Administrator
Joseph Hartnett explained
that the administration had
selected a management group
of business men, led by
Mike Freida, former owner
of Sonnamera on Main
St., to start a centralized
promotion and marketing
corporation and to hire a
manager to oversee advertising
and promotional work.

Funding would be by an
ordinance creating a special
assessment in the downtown
area, the cost to be shared on a fair basis among
property owners. The actual
amount to be assessed would be determined
by the assessed value of the
property.

With a proposed budget of
\$50,000 and a proposed
rate of .00589, a building
assessed at \$40,000 would
have to pay \$23.56, while a
household apartment account
for about 50 percent of all residential energy con
sumption and nearly 25 per
cent total U.S. energy consumption.

Hartnett said the idea
was good, but was one that evolved
over several years. "For the
past three years an active business economic develop

ment committee has focus
ed on making downtown
Rahway a thriving district,"
said Hartnett. He said the
City would not be involved
in the corporation other
than to coordinate an or
ganization creating the special
improvement district.

"There is no way the City
can force this program. Our
philosophy is not to impose
our plans as to what should
be done. Whether downtown Rahway lives or dies
is in your hands," said Hart
nett.

Richard Horling, Pres
ident of Anthony's Key
Shop on Irving Street, was
one of the opponents of the
plan. "I'm totally against
this," said Horling. "I think
it's going to bring bus
ness into town. I pay
enough taxes now. I can't
see how it's going to help
the city. I think it's going
to be a drain on the city.
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Kurt Clebsch, owner of
Kurt's Beauty Shop on
Cherry Street complained
of loiterers and "bums" in
the back of his property. "I
think there are other
priorities," said Clebsch.
"We should clean up the
downtown area. We should
make it a nice place to live."
He said that he had told
the police on several
occasions but was told they
could do nothing.

Thomas Graybill, Pres
ident of The Rahway Sav
ings Institution on Irving
Street, was also under fire
for being too liberal in his
taxes.

Bruce Schwartz, Vice
President of Cliff Hardware
on Irving Street, spoke out
against the plan. "We at
Cliff Hardware are opposed
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Mike Freida, who recently
sold Sonnamera on Main
Street after 19 years of ownership,
directed the question and comments
from business owners.

"Rahway needs help,"
said Freida. "The town has a
lot of possibilities. Property
owners are worried about the
dollar but others are also worried about business,
about the future of the town."

"Everyone agrees, Rah
way is going down," said
James Bigelow of Wood's
Hardware on Main Street.
"Everyone wants to do
something about it but we're
going about it the wrong way. Money is not
the important thing here
tonight. People would

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
