RHS students celebrate poetry

From October 10 to 12, in New Jersey's historic Waterloos Village, the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation sponsored the nation's largest poetry festival. In turn, Commissioner of Education Saul Cooperman asked that all school districts help to celebrate this event by offering particular attention to the subject of poetry during the second week of October, which he declared to be Poetry Week in the State of New Jersey.

Rahway High School and Rahway Intermediate

School helped to "open the door" to creative writing by sponsoring their own poetry contests. Pupils had the opportunity to enter two different events, in which they were able to recite dramatically an already published work or an original piece of poetry. Preliminary competitions were held in every language arts classroom. Students were nominated by members of their class and, in turn, individual teachers decided upon those who would be judged by the en-

tire language arts department. During the month of November, final competitions produced several winners. They include for best original poems: Jeannie Wojtkowski, twelfth grade; Martin Homan, ninth grade; Susan Coll, eighth grade; and Hilary Rotondo, seventh grade. Students request Rahway celebrate Constitution's bicentennial

Ninth grade students from Rahway High School approached the City Council Monday night to ask their help in making an application to have Rahway designated as an official United States Constitution Bicentennial community.

About eight students from Mrs. Beecher's ninth grade American Civics class presented a petition to the council before a vote was taken on a resolution agreeing to the application procedures.

The resolution stated that "the Municipal Council is in agreement that granting said request is not only a valuable opportunity for the youth of the community, but will result in enhancing overall community participation in celebrating the Bicentennial of the United States Constitution."

First Ward Councilman Jerry Coleman also asked the council for support of a letter he intends to send to the Union County Chosen Freeholders Board asking for a "detailed explanation" of a photograph that shows two Republican Freeholder candidates viewing vendor proposals for the planned

resource recovery facility to be built in Rahway. The photograph shows Janet Whitman and Ed Palmieri looking at what was identified as vendor proposals with Freeholder Chairman Paul O'Keefe.

"I would like to know why I was not allowed to review those proposals submitted by vendors," said Coleman. "I am concerned that some individuals seem to have access to them."

Joseph E. Kazan, Director, Division of Environmental Affairs, stated in a letter to Mr. Coleman "that it remains our official position that the detailed vendor proposals will not be distributed for public review...the release of the detailed vendor proposals may compromise our negotiating position to the possible detriment to the public."

In other business the council:

—Approved a resolution authorizing senior citizen, veteran, widow of veteran and disabled deductions for 1986.

—Approved a resolution authorizing foreclosure of 23 tax sale certificates held by the City of Rahway and establishing the tax foreclosure list of liens to be foreclosed.

—Approved a resolution authorizing refund of payment of taxes.

—Approved a resolution continuing water utility rates.

—Approved a resolution authorizing the purchase of a van for the recreation department from Warnock.

Bob Baxter scholarships offered to students

Application forms for the two \$1,000 scholarships to study press photography are available from the Bob Baxter Scholarship Foundation, c/o New Jersey Newspapers, Airport International Plaza, Suite 1, Newark, N.J. 07114.

An applicant for the scholarships must be a resident of New Jersey, a senior in high school who has been admitted to a recognized school of photography, or college student studying press photography.

In addition to filling out the application form, the applicant must submit two letters of recommendation and a portfolio showing a cross-section of his or her work. The applicant is encouraged to include photographs that have appeared in school, weekly or daily newspapers, magazines or school yearbooks with proof of publication on the back of the photographs. Deadline for filing the application letters and portfolios is April 30, 1987.

Twelve scholarships have been awarded since the foundation was established in 1980, at the suggestion of the late Bob Baxter, a freelance photographer. Mr. Baxter, who died in May, 1982, suffered a spinal cord injury which paralyzed him in a swimming pool accident in August, 1971.

The scholarship is in memory of J. Howard Farrell, a 1928 graduate of Rahway High School, who played football for the Indians from 1925 to 1927, and for the Ramblers in 1928 and 1929.

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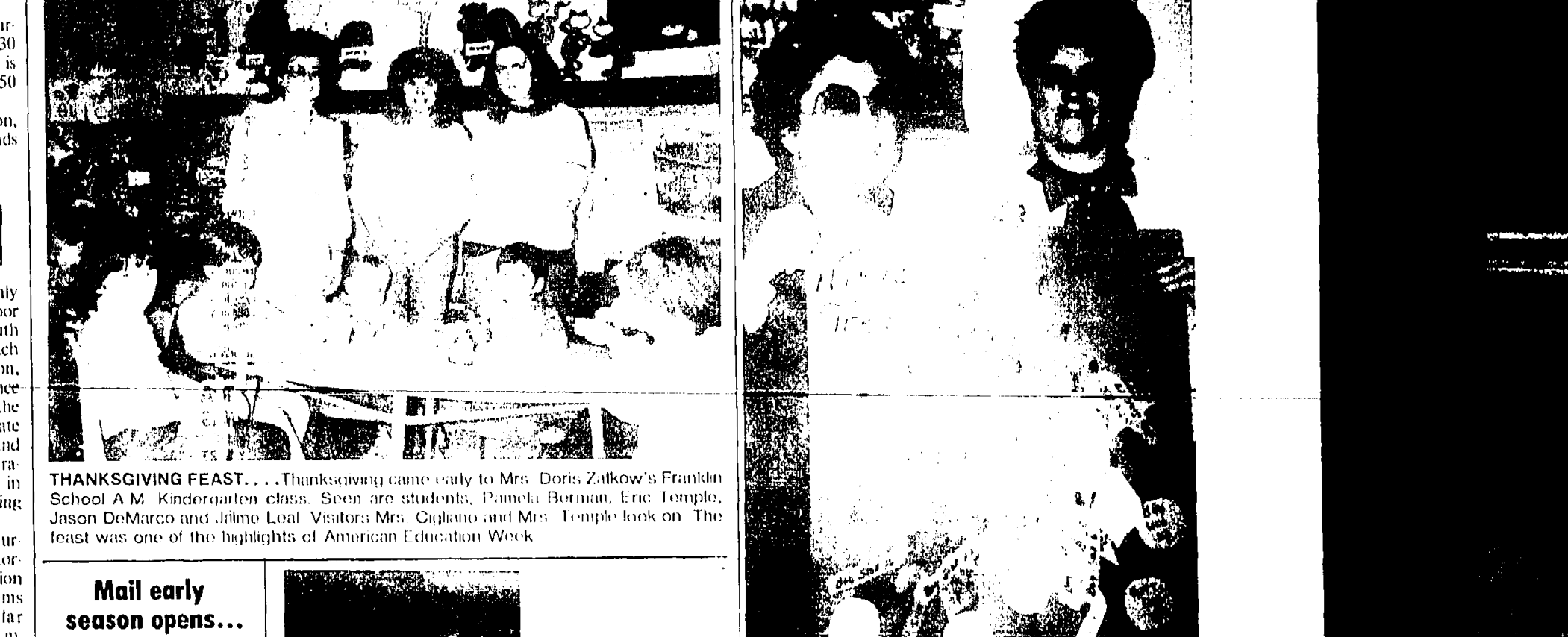
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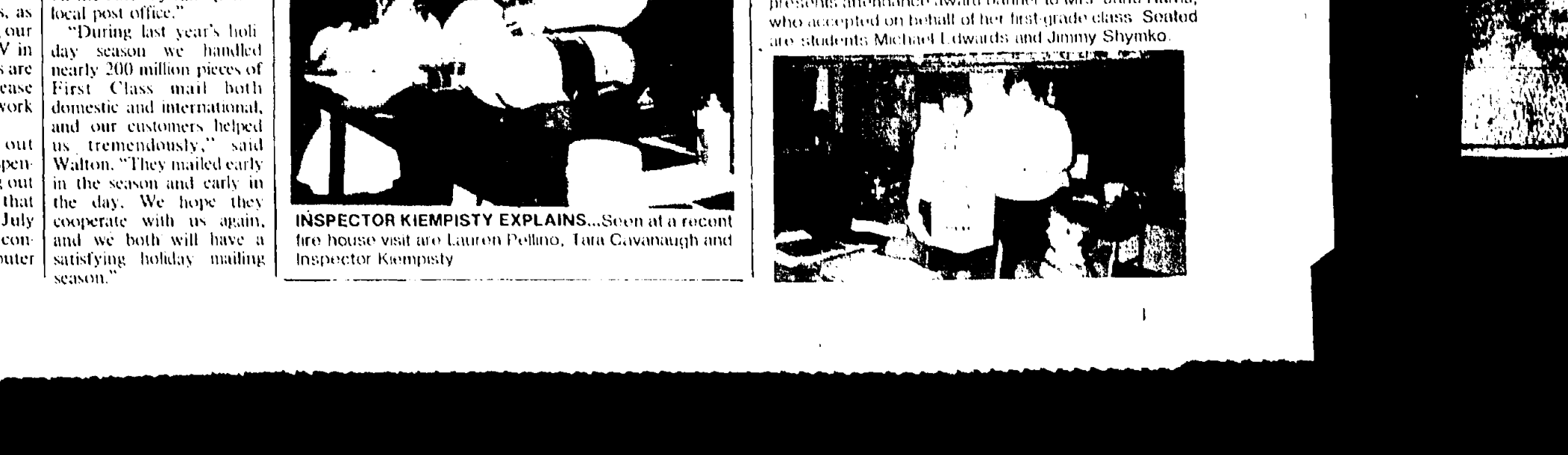

Group of workers claims one of two Pick-6 prizes

A group of 12 workers from a Linden plant recently claimed one of the two top prize tickets that will split the \$6.3 million jackpot from the New Jersey Lottery's "Pick-6 Lotto" drawing held Monday evening, November 24.

Lottery Executive Director Joan Zielinski announced that the two tickets were the only ones out of nearly \$6 million tickets sold for the drawing that picked all six numbers. They were 13, 17, 25, 26, 38 and 39. Each top prize ticket is worth \$3,149,665 in 20 annual installments.

The first ticket claimed was by a group of employees of General Magnaphoto in Linden, an electroplating company. The group told the Lottery that they chip in \$1 for each "Pick-6 Lotto" drawing to buy jointly-owned tickets.

Broken down into 12 individual shares each employee will receive \$262,472 over 20 years.

The winners are Annie Golden, 36, of East Orange; Ben J. Urban, 62, of Union; John Boone, 58, of East Orange; Ricardo Lopez, 46, of Irvington; Donald J. Smith, 53, of Irvington; and Maria Cololla, 46, of Elizabeth.

Also, Francisco Aponte, 24, of Carteret; Juanita

LeLindoz, 45, of Newark; Mary L. Eldor, 48, of Elizabeth; Lucille Boyd, 44, of East Orange; Angel Mejias, 25, of Linden; and Ricardo Gans of Linden.

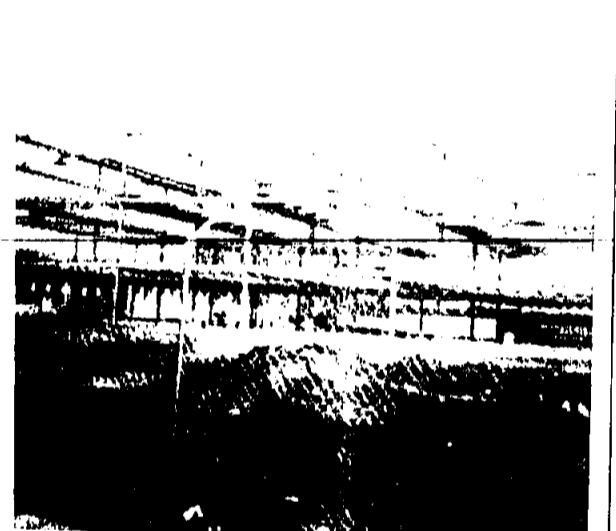
The winning ticket was purchased at the Bell Mart in East Orange.

The still-unclaimed top prize ticket was sold in Passaic County. Lottery winners have one year from the date of the drawing to claim their prizes.

In addition to the two top prize winning tickets, Zielinski reported that approximately 7,400 other players won more than \$1.6 million in cash prizes in the drawing.

For picking five numbers, in the drawing, 151 players won cash prizes of \$4,000 each and 7,263 persons won \$134 for selecting four numbers.

A total of 57 players matched, in exact order, the five-digit Million Dollar Bonus Game number drawn Monday, 21-445, and are eligible for a grand drawing featuring a top prize of \$1 million (\$50,000 a year for 20 years). In addition, the drawing will decide a second cash prize of \$50,000, one third prize of \$25,000, one fourth prize of \$10,000 and fifth through tenth prizes of \$2,500 each. The remaining finalists will receive \$380 prizes.

National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week

A cup of coffee, a cold shower, or fresh air may seem like ideal ways to sober up after drinking alcoholic beverages but, in truth, the only remedy for intoxication is the passage of time, according to New Jersey State Safety Council.

The holiday season, a traditionally high rate of alcohol and drug impaired driving.

To remind motorists that drinking before driving can be deadly, President Reagan has declared the week of December 14-20 "National Drunk and Drugged Driving Awareness Week." In observance of the awareness week, the Safety Council offers these safe driving suggestions:

- If you have been drinking alcohol and plan on driving, allow about an hour per drink to eliminate the alcohol. An average drink equals 12 ounces of beer, five ounces of table wine, or one and one-half ounces of liquor.
- Try to finish your last drink at least an hour before you plan on driving, and limit yourself to one drink or less per hour.
- Switch to non-alcoholic drinks.
- Don't drink on an empty stomach. Food can slow down the absorption rate.
