





Peddlers of these items have been making millions ind possibly billions of dollars by encouraging the use of llegal drugs. They have been pushing everything from ling papers for smoking marijuana to inhalers for snoring cocaine. They also offered a variety of publications bearing such titles as "The Cocaine Handbook," "Marijuana Catalog" and "A Child's Garden of Grass."


While many states, including New Jersey, have opted model drug paraphernalia statutes to prohibit the ale of these accessories in so-called "head shops," record tores and other commercial outlets catering to young people, dealers were getting around the state laws by selfing their products through the mail. It was an inherent contradiction to permit the sale and advertising of articles primarily — and in some case exclusively — designed for use with illegal drugs. Such free and unrestricted sale of these accessories

not only lured young people into drug experimentation,

but also suggested that the use of controlled dangerous ubstances was acceptable. Felix Walker, who represented a mountain district in North Carolina, was known for making irrelevant speeches in Congress. The primary purpose of his orations appeared to be to get "on the record," so that his constituents would feel that they were being well represented. These speeches were rarely addressed to the questions. Accordingly, when Walker rose to speak during a critical phase of these slavery-related debates, his fellow party members urged him to be silent. Undaunted, Felix Walker started his speech by saying, "I must speak for
