# Up With People to perform at Union County Arts Center

The international cast of Up With People brings their hit show "Beat of the Future" to the Union County Arts Center in the Historic Rahway Theatre on March 13, at 8 p.m. The theatre is celebrating the first anniversary of its reopening.

## Training for babysitters offered

By popular demand Rahway Hospital is once again offering its training program for babysitters, taught by registered nurses on the hospital staff. Participants have a choice of three dates: Thursday, March 12 from 3:30 to 6:30 p.m.; Saturday, March 14 from 9 a.m. to noon; and a special session just for adults, on Thursday, March 26 from 3:30 to 6:30 p.m.

"The focus of the program is to prepare babysitters for how to respond in emergency situations — from treating a minor injury to knowing what to do in a case of cardiopulmonary arrest," said Kay

MacVicar, R.N., Nurse Educator and Program Coordinator. The session also covers child care and safety in the home.

Upon completion of the session the participants receive a certificate, and have the option of placing their names on a registry of available babysitters, which is maintained by the hospital's director of junior volunteers.

## DEP approves environmental study for resource recovery facility

The New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection last week approved a preliminary Environmental and Health Impact Statement (EHIS) in another step toward construction of Union County's resource recovery facility in Rahway. The approval, signed by Al Montague, chief engineer with the DEP's Division of Waste Management, followed a detailed review by 17 different DEP agencies.

The 140-page statement, prepared by the county's environmental consultant Malcolm Pirnie, Inc. of White Plains, New York, indicated that the proposed waste-to-energy plant would produce "no unavoidable adverse impacts that cannot be reduced to acceptable levels."

The report further stated

that the resource recovery facility "will result in a net improvement in air quality because of a significant reduction in truck miles traveled to deliver waste to the facility site versus existing landfill disposal sites."

Eighteen of Union County's 21 municipalities currently haul their trash to Edgboro landfill in East Brunswick, a procedure the resource recovery facility will render unnecessary.

The preliminary EHIS describes environmental conditions, analyzes environmental impact and identifies other factors associated with the resource recovery facility. It was conducted for the purpose of assuring state, county and local officials and residents that the project will have no unacceptable impacts or health risks.

According to Joseph E.

Kazar, executive director of the Union County Utilities Authority, DEP approval of the preliminary EHIS paves the way for project financing and purchase of the waste-to-energy plant site — a 23-acre parcel of land off Route 1. The final EHIS will incorporate data from the selected vendor's design and will be the subject of a state-sponsored hearing prior to the DEP's decision to issue permits for construction and operation of the facility.

Plans call for construction of a mass-burn, field-erected waterwall steam generating system, capable of burning 1,440 tons of waste per day. An estimated 476,000 tons of solid waste are generated in Union County each year — equivalent to one ton of waste per year for every man, woman and child in

the county or enough to fill Giant's Stadium in 15 months. Of this total, 437,000 tons are suitable for processing at the resource recovery plant.

Waste taken to the resource recovery facility will be dumped into a storage pit capable of holding three times the plant's capacity, then fed by cranes onto grates that would pass it into a furnace, the report states. A "waterwall," consisting of steel water pipes, will line the furnace. Steam created in these pipes will power a turbine, producing approximately 40 megawatts of electricity for sale to Public Service Electric & Gas Co.

The plant, estimated to cost over \$100 million, is expected to be under construction next year and in operation by late 1990.

The Rahway Board of Education approved fund raisers for various schools, appointed personnel and approved payments for the high school renovation at their regular meeting held last week.

Fund raisers were approved for Rahway High School's Chi Tri Hi Y and the Drama Club. Intermediate School fund raisers were approved for the seventh and eighth grades and the Builders Club.

Franklin School's kindergarten will be allowed to sell t-shirts and Roosevelt School will allow all students to sell Easter candy to raise money for the school.

The board appointed Rocco Colucci as an assistant softball coach at the annual compensation of \$2,631. Mary Jane Lundgren as an elementary teacher at Roosevelt School at the salary rate of \$20,573 and Yolanda Kert as an instructor of mathematics on an as needed basis in the Adult Basic Education Program at an hourly rate of \$13.50.

### Campaign will help "free the handicapped"

The Association for Advancement of the Mentally Handicapped (AAMH) will be kicking off a Capital Campaign on February 26 at the Suburban Golf Club in Union.

The campaign's slogan is "Free the Handicapped." Maria DeNoble, campaign director, explains, "Traditionally, the public's fear and ignorance of persons with disabilities has created prejudice, mockery, and avoidance.

Many mock what they don't understand, and worse, deny handicapped persons the joys of accomplishment, the challenge of independence, and the right to a life with freedom, pride, and dignity."

The campaign's goal is to raise \$600,000 for the purchase of an apartment building in the Elizabeth vicinity.

Up to one-third of the apartments will be rented to AAMH clients (handicapped adults) and the remaining units rented to the general public.

"We are not trying to create a mini-institution for handicapped people," said DeNoble. "Low cost housing in this area has become increasingly difficult to find. The apartment building will not only help to eliminate this problem, it will help to produce revenue and build equity for the agency's future."

"The AAMH needs to have the capability to provide for handicapped adults for their lifetime," she said.

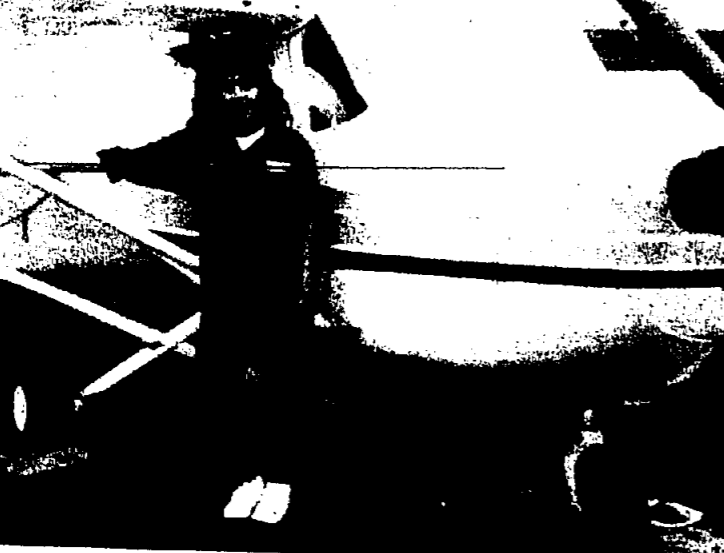

We haven't heard from Jean for several weeks, and Mary and Sheila didn't make the last meeting. I don't know how they are doing. Carol went two days without smoking, then succumbed over the weekend, and quit again. Carol is like me, she hasn't been able to completely give them up yet.

We are given an abundance of information at the meetings. Booklets, leaflets, folders and charts. "A Lifetime of Freedom From Smoking," "Stop Smoking, Stay Slim," "Change Your Thinking and Learn to Assert Yourself," all help us regain control of our lives.

I find it still a struggle. On some days, Richie's birth day party for instance, I'll smoke up to ten cigarettes. Then the next day I try to get it back down again. People's comments help me. All of the helpers of the counsellors lead me through the support. And it helps. Maybe I don't feel like such a failure after all.

**Council absences berated**

On Monday, February 25, I attended the Clark Municipal Council Budget Meeting. For over two hours, Councilman Hayden made motions to reduce specific services and equipment which needed to be needed operations. Cuts included elimination of the annual clean-up, reduction in the use of the contractor and reduction in funds to maintain equipment and vehicles. Each of his motions lost, none because they failed to receive a second to his motion. Councilman Hayden claimed that if all his motions were approved, the budget would be cut by \$165,335.

Council then went into private session to consider Mr. Hayden's proposed salary cuts. After the private session ended, the public portion of the meeting was once again opened to the public, at which time Council members Cristiani, Hayden and Plata were absent.

After taking two hours of the first portion of the budget meeting, Councilman Hayden led the budget meeting. Council President Porzick announced that Council members Cristiani and Plata had also "stormed out" of the meeting, leaving the remainder of the council members to decide the fate of the budget.

At the meeting Councilman Elizabetz stated "The walk-out... was a desecration to the Clark taxpayers and a repudiation of the democratic process."

In my eyes every council person owes it to the taxpayers of Clark to participate in the entire budget proceedings.

After the walk-out, Council members Caruso, Eckel, Elizabetz and Porzick stayed and deliberated. They, with suggestions from the Township Clerk Catherine Clancy, voted to reduce the budget by an additional \$275,000 without a cut in services that Hayden proposed. The council members who remained were able to exceed the amount proposed by Mr. Hayden by an additional \$110,000 in budget reductions.

After having spent two hours on Mr. Hayden's suggestions, it was incumbent on council members Cristiani, Hayden and Plata to have stayed and offered the other council members their support in order to avoid budget reductions. Instead, they left the budget meeting!

**Digest available on smoking laws**

Smoke-free indoor air at work, the law in New Jersey effective March 1. That's the deadline for all private employers with 30 or more individuals working in one structurally enclosed building to implement a policy to protect employees from tobacco smoke. Non-smoking areas must be designated. Smoking-purged areas are allowed, but not required.

The new state law (Public Law 1985, Chap. 184) states, "The right to breathe clean air supersedes the right to smoke." The law, which is enforced by the State Department of Health, also requires the posting of signs to designate areas as non-smoking or smoking-permitted.

**Ogden applauds bill package on drug/alcohol prevention**

A recent study proving the positive effects of alcohol and drug abuse prevention and intervention efforts among high school students has been applauded by Assemblywoman Maureen Ogden (R-23). Mrs. Ogden has long been an advocate of prevention and intervention techniques.

The package includes bills that would require teachers to be trained to recognize drug and alcohol abuse, that all instances of such abuse in schools be reported and that local school boards adopt policies for treating students who abuse drugs and alcohol.

Mrs. Ogden said the "heart" of the package is legislation that would establish education programs for teachers, parents, the public and all students "because our young people make very important decisions that can affect the remainder of their lives."

The Assemblywoman noted that the Assembly package is a 10-bill package which she calls a "major step toward reducing the number of young people who regularly use alcohol and/or drugs."

The package includes bills that would require teachers to be trained to recognize drug and alcohol abuse, that all instances of such abuse in schools be reported and that local school boards adopt policies for treating students who abuse drugs and alcohol.

Mrs. Ogden said the "heart" of the package is legislation that would establish education programs for teachers, parents, the public and all students "because our young people make very important decisions that can affect the remainder of their lives."

The package includes bills that would require teachers to be trained to recognize drug and alcohol abuse, that all instances of such abuse in schools be reported and that local school boards adopt policies for treating students who abuse drugs and alcohol.

"The recording fees in 1986," Rajoppi said, "represent a 38 percent increase over our recording fees for 1985. Most of this increase is due to the tremendous increase in volume of the office in 1986 and is continuing to experience in 1987. In terms of volume, there has been a 16 percent increase in deeds and a 44 percent increase in mortgage recordings," she said.

Rajoppi added that the volume increase in the office is due to the lowered mortgage interest rates which spurred a tremendous demand in home refinancing and purchases by young families who deferred buying homes at higher rates. She said that she expects 1987 will continue to be a record year for the office as the 1986 revenue record due to the decreasing mortgage interest rates and the increased attractiveness of home equity loans.

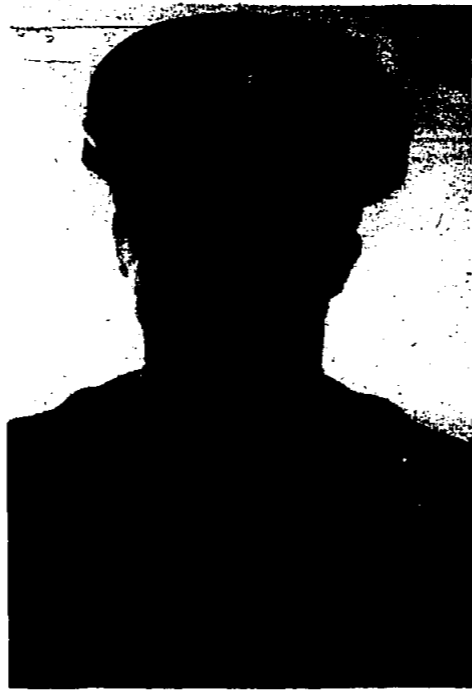

## Rep. Rinaldo pushing air traffic safety

Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo (R-N.J.) said recently that Congress should open up the \$6 billion Airport Trust Fund to hire hundreds of safety inspectors for the beleaguered Federal Aviation Administration.

He warned that the FAA safety inspection staff is stretched too thin, and that the fierce price competition for airline passengers in a deregulated market is forcing marginal carriers to cut corners on aircraft maintenance.

Rinaldo is supporting Administration efforts to tap the Airport Trust Fund to hire operating personnel to man the control towers and inspect aircraft and flight operations.

The Airport Trust Fund, which comes from an eight percent tax on airline tickets, is dedicated to capital improvements, such as rebuilding runways, control towers, and introducing new technology.

"The risks of being in a fatal air accident are still very low," Rinaldo said. "But with more people flying than ever before, and more jumbo jets in use in international service, the potential for a large number of fatalities has increased," Rinaldo warned.

He pointed out that the number of airlines has doubled since the end of 1955, and this growth has placed excessive demands on the FAA inspection force. "Serious questions have been raised at Congressional hearings about the adequacy of staffing the inspection force, and the promptness and thoroughness of the FAA's inspection training program."

The shortage of skilled airline technicians to maintain the planes, he pointed

out, also is contributing to the growing danger in the skies. Their number has dropped from 11,000 in 1979 to 6,500. Rinaldo said aviation experts claim the shortage is so acute that the quality of maintenance will soon be impossible to sustain.

Since deregulation, he added, the workload of inspectors has greatly expanded with no substantial increase in the number of airline inspectors since the 1960s. He cited a Congressional Research Service report which stated, "Insufficient FAA presence with respect to inspections often results in some air carriers taking advantage of the situation."

"What they're saying, in effect, is that competition in airline fares is driving some marginal carriers to cut corners on maintenance because the FAA inspectors are not there looking over their shoulders," Rinaldo commented.

He is supporting the budget request of Transportation Secretary Elizabeth Dole and FAA Administrator Donald Engen to spend \$5.8 billion in fiscal 1988. It would increase the funds for inspections and controllers by 15 percent. However, Rinaldo said that the legal restrictions on using Airport Trust Funds for this purpose would have to be changed in order for the FAA to hire 225 more controllers and 178 more aircraft inspectors.

"Building safer runways and putting new technology in the control towers is a good investment, but it needs to be accompanied by an increase in the inspection force so that air carriers are required to maintain their planes on the ground and operate them safely in the air. Just as the Amtrak accident proved, safety depends on people as much as on technology," Rinaldo said.

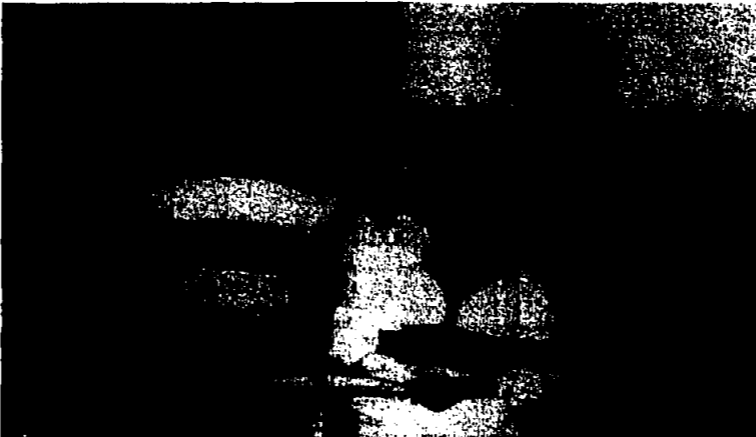
