perty values, "But," the Mayor warned, "selling off surplus City property is not a panacea for the financial challenges facing Rahway and other municipalities. Any revenue produced by by utilized to the future benefit of all of Rahway's taxpavers, and not just used some shortsighted fa-

Hartnett also noted that Friday's auction does not mean the sales are final or the City will definitely receive the revenues. "The title searches, which are quite complicated for these properties, are still being processed, he said. He pointed out also that the reighbors in the area of the Pierpont/Central parcel, who are opposed to its sale, have initiated an investigadivision of the New Jersey Department of Environ-mental Protection. 



The Trial Lawyers Notebook

In support of the Governor's veto of the **Dram Shop Legislation**

For the past two years, the public has been besieged by the tavern owners to eliminate the rights of intoxicated drivers and their passengers injured in automobile ac cidents to seek compensation from the tavern which served them alcohol. The tayern owners have sought to have such rights eliminated even when they served alcohol to those who were obviously intoxicated.

During the 1986 Legislative session, the New Jersey State Assembly, under pressure from the tayern owners lobby, passed legislation which did, indeed, eliminate these rights. (The Association of Trial Lawyers of America - New Jersey, the New Jersey State Bar Association and Lawyers Encouraging Government and Law opposed such legislation throughout the length of the debate). The primary basis upon which the tavern owners' lobby rested its position was the soaring increase of their liability insurance premiums

On January 22, 1987, Governor Kean conditionally vetoed such legislation, in large part because it contained a categorical abolition of the rights of intoxicated drivers and their passengers to sue the bar which served them. We applaud the reasoning employed by the Governor's

Office in reaching such a decision.

One of the most fundamental principals upon which our legal system rests requires it to be sufficiently flexible so as to meet the needs of society on a day to day basis. To be able to do this, judges and juries must be able to judge each situation or ease on its own facts and merits. Any piece of legislation which would prohibit our doing so creates injustice as it infringes upon citizens' right to access to our court system. This right is so fundamental that it is constitutionally protected. The Assembly legislation as conditionally vetoed would fall into such a

category.

Certainly, there are situations where intoxicated motor vehicle operators and/or their passengers should not be able to recover from the tavern owner who served them alcohol. However, there are other situations where such people would be entitled to recover from the bar. For example, a person goes into a bar, orders a drink and puts down a \$20 bill on the bar to pay for it; the bartender continues to serve that person alcohol until the \$20 bill is used up without waiting for the person to ask for additional drinks. That bartender should be held responsible if the drinker is injured as a result of his intoxicated opera-

tion of a car. There would also be situations where the question would not always be so clear out. The State of New Jersey already has a law designed to deal with situations where the victim may contribute to an accident through his own carclessness. That law is the Comparative Negligence Act; simply stated, it allows the jury to consider negligent conduct on part of both the victim (Plaintiff) and the Defendant (the person who inflicted the injury). If the jury believes they are both negligent, it then assigns percentages of negligence for each party with the total being 100 percent.
