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Over \$1.5 million bid on city-owned land

A standing room only crowd of 200 people packed the Council Chambers in City Hall this past Friday for the City's third land sale auction in the past four years. "It was unbelievable," reported City Administrator Joseph Hartnett, who served as the auctioneer. "I've never seen so many people interested in buying land in Rahway and bidding such high prices."

The City had put up for bid three parcels of land it owns: the corner of Pierpont Street and Central Avenue; a wooded tract between Concord and Murray Streets, adjoining Stein Field; and a 75' x 100' lot on Princeton Avenue, adjoining Tully Field. In each case the City strictly restricted the use of the property to one family home, a maximum of six at the Pierpont/Central site, a

maximum of eight at the Concord/Murray site, and one at the Princeton Avenue lot.

The Princeton Avenue lot attracted a high bid of \$90,500. The successful bidder was Steven Okay of Cornell Avenue in Rahway.

Fred Babish of St. George Avenue was the high bidder for the property between Concord and Murray Streets at \$800,000.

While Thomas Stappas of Stanmore Place, Westfield, bested all other bidders for the Pierpont/Central parcel with a high bid of \$625,000.

Hartnett noted that, even using the maximum total allowance of 15 one family lots for all three parcels, the average price bid per lot exceeded \$100,000. "Rahway has officially broken the \$100,000 barrier for a building lot," the City Administrator declared, "and

in the process has skyrocketed past many municipalities which had previously had higher property values than us." The Administrator noted that just two days before Rahway's auction another Union County municipality had auctioned off municipally-owned property and drew prices of only \$35,000 per lot.

Mr. Hartnett also reported that the reaction of local residents who attended the sale was "ecstatic."

"I heard a number of residents in Rahway had immediately increased 5% to 10% in value just as a result of this auction," he said, "and I believe they're right."

Mayor Daniel L. Martin commented that Friday's sale was an affirmation of Rahway's reputation as a progressive community, which results in strong prop-

erty values. "But," the Mayor warned, "selling off surplus City property is not a panacea for the financial challenges facing Rahway and other municipalities. Any revenue produced by such sales must be prudently utilized to the future benefit of all of Rahway's taxpayers, and not just used in some shortsighted fashion."

Hartnett also noted that Friday's auction does not mean the sales are final or the City will definitely receive the revenues. "The title searches, which are quite complicated for these properties, are still being processed," he said. He pointed out also that the neighbors in the area of the Pierpont/Central parcel, who are opposed to its sale, have initiated an investigation by the Green Acres Division of the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection. "It's

possible that the Green Acres people may try to delay or prevent sale of the properties," Hartnett stated, "even though it is the City's position that we have the legal right to do so. This administration has a strong record of preserving parklands and recreational areas and we believe that is very much in our favor."

Mayor Martin concluded by saying, "In this day and age, it is a common objective of all area municipalities to sell surplus properties for the benefit of the taxpayers, while preserving as much open space as possible. Even a community like Westfield, which is considered suburban rather than urban, is doing this. Rahway will definitely maintain a strong system of parks and playgrounds and sell only those properties which are clearly surplus in nature."

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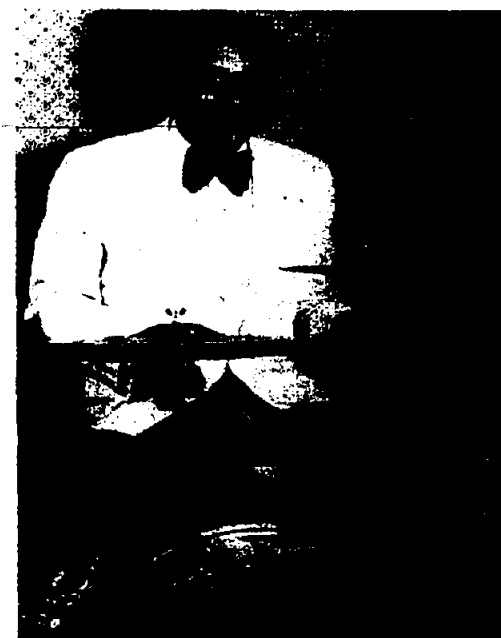

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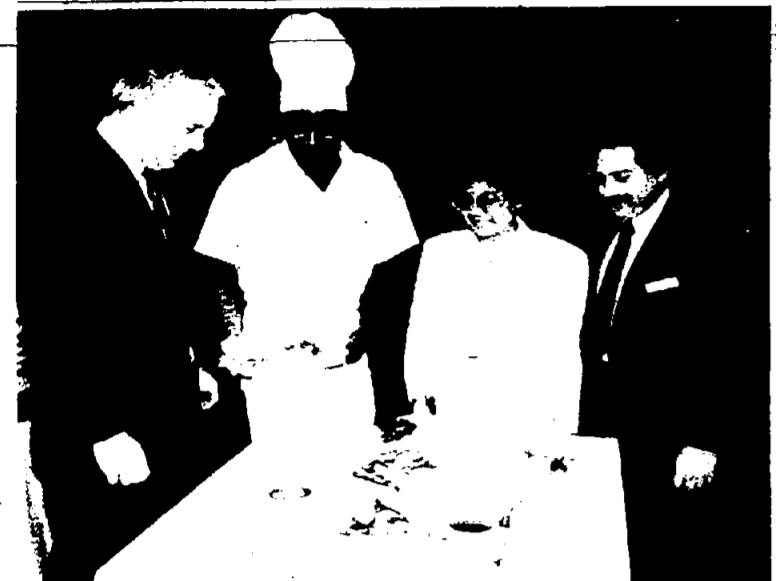

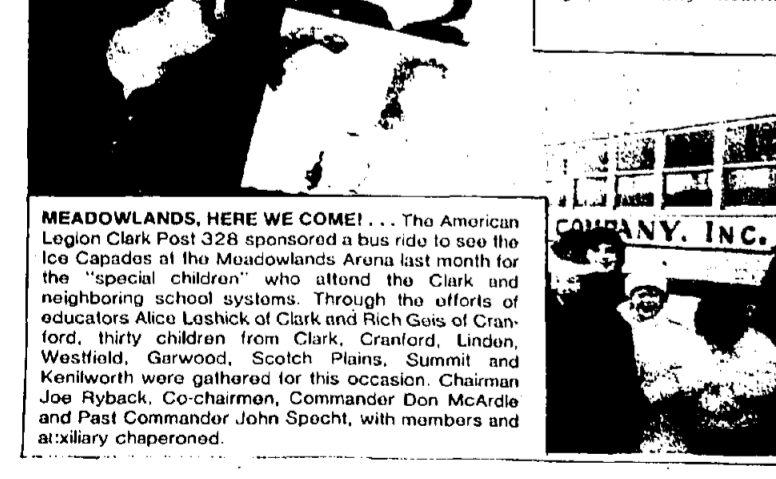

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Hospital pharmacist discusses effects of drug abuse

...at a recent speech at Solomon Schechter Day School in Cranford, Rahway Hospital Pharmacist Angela Musso warned students about the physiological effects of drugs. Miss Musso gave the talk as a member of the hospital's speakers' bureau.

...Miss Musso focused on the effects of marijuana and cocaine. "As a street drug, marijuana's strength varies from weak to potent," she said. "But it is more potent than it has been in the past." She described its effects during use and cited studies which have been done involving marijuana users. She said that marijuana use causes short-term memory loss and a loss of control, which can make learning and activities which require coordination (such as sports) difficult.

...Driving simulation tests have shown that it takes people using marijuana longer to see normally after viewing light glare, and their peripheral vision is reduced. Other tests have shown that the reflexes of pilots using simulators were impaired up to five hours after they no longer felt high.

...Miss Musso also discussed possible long-term effects of marijuana use. She explained that marijuana smoke burns hotter than cigarette smoke, leaving scar tissue in the lungs. "This is a hidden danger of marijuana," she said. She also noted that marijuana smoke contains double the amount of carcinogens as in cigarette smoke.

...In other tests, marijuana has been shown to attach to fat cells and bind to reproductive organs. In men who are constant users of marijuana, testosterone (a hormone level and sperm count) have decreased.

... "Marijuana has also been directly linked to affecting the immune system, causing a decreased resistance to infection," she said.

...Miss Musso went on to discuss cocaine, "the drug of the '80s." The effects of cocaine last only about an hour. It is water-soluble and leaves the system quickly, she said. "But after the initial high, the person goes into a depression, so then he takes more cocaine. The system feeds on itself."

...She said that cocaine increases blood pressure, heart rate, and body temperature. It can also lead to paranoid heavy users may see "coke bugs" on their skin. Not much information is known about the lasting effects of cocaine.

Houseplant problems and their cures

by James Nichnadowicz, Program Associate in Agriculture

When I purchased my houseplant several months ago it was full of foliage and the leaves were a beautiful mix of gold and green. Today, all the leaves are a dark, dull green color and very small. Also, the stems have grown tall and spindly. Many of the bottom leaves have fallen off. Why is my plant doing this to me?

Your plant is expressing all the symptoms of receiving inadequate light. Moving it to a brighter window, south is lightest followed by east and west, will prompt your plant to grow full and bushy once again. Likewise, only fertilize your plants from March 1 to November 1. Winter feeding causes lush plants to grow tall and spindly.

My Chinese Evergreen is showing the following symptoms:

1. lower leaves are curling and wilting
2. some of the stems are rotting
3. the soil in the pot never seems to dry out
4. what's wrong with my plant and what can I do to cure it?

It sounds like your plant is experiencing the most common houseplant ailment, overwatering. Your Chinese Evergreen's roots have rotted away. If the plant isn't too far gone, you can save it by:

1. only watering it when the soil surface
