Rahway was notified that they would receive approx imately \$550,000 less than the full funding expected from state aid. Cuts totall-ing \$290,000 were made in the proposed budget and the rest of the funding figure was added to the local tax levy.

"I have a strong feeling that we should have strong expectations of our stu-dents," said Superintendent of Schools Frank Brunette. "But when we have those expectations, we, as adults, also have the responsibility to see we have the means to fulfill those expectations.
