School tab raises taxes

The Rahway Board of Education adopted a tentative 1987-88 school budget Monday night that will raise homeowners' tax bills by \$176 a year.

Business Administrator/Board Secretary Anthony Rocco said the budget includes a 44 cents per \$100 of assessed value increase for property owners. On a home assessed at \$40,000, this will result in a \$176 raise in taxes for school purposes.

The budget totals \$17,665,791, a 9.4 percent increase over last year's

budget which was approved by voters. The Current Expense portion equals \$16,908,578. Capital Outlay totals \$368,500 and Debt Service equals \$388,713. The amount to be raised by taxes, which will appear on the ballot on April 7, is Current Expense, \$11,939,141 and Capital Outlay, \$326,130 for a total amount to be raised by taxes of \$12,265,271.

Robert Munsey, Chairman of the Finance Committee, said the budget includes proposed new positions of four basic skills teachers, one music teacher

for the Intermediate School, one special education teacher, one teacher for English as a Second Language (ESL), two librarians and one nurse. Proposed positions eliminated from the budget were two teachers to cover in-school suspensions, one at the high school and one at the Intermediate School, one ESL teacher, one basic skills teacher, an extra teacher for Madison School and five clerical/aide positions.

Included in the tentative budget is a seven percent built-in negotiable increase for teacher salaries. "If a set-

tlement comes in higher than seven percent," said Board Member Rev. Donald Jones, "we don't have a free balance (account) to meet it. We might have to go to reduction in force again."

"The board is not in the position to take from free balance to fund the deficit of state monies," said Munsey in explaining the lack of a surplus account. "We don't have surplus so we must go to local taxes. This year we are on a 'shoe string' budget. If we want to continue programs we must use the local tax levy."

Rahway was notified that they would receive approximately \$350,000 less than the full funding expected from state aid. Cuts totaling \$290,000 were made in the proposed budget and the rest of the funding figure was added to the local tax levy.

"I have a strong feeling that we should have strong expectations of our students," said Superintendent of Schools Frank Brunette. "But when we have those expectations, we, as adults, also have the responsibility to see we have the means to fulfill those expectations."

Rahway schools slate registration for preschool, kindergarten, handicapped

Registration for kindergarten, preschool and preschool handicapped children will be held April 6-10, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Kindergarten and preschool registration will be held at the following schools: Franklin, Grover Cleveland, Madison and Roosevelt. Preschool handicapped children will be registered at Roosevelt School only.

Kindergarten children must be 5 years old on or before December 31, 1987; preschool children, 4 years on or before December 31, 1987; and preschool handicapped, 3 years on or before December 31, 1987. In all cases a birth certificate must be presented at time of registration.

All children entering kindergarten, preschool and preschool handicapped classes in the Rahway Public Schools must have followed the immunization schedule as follows:

—Three DPT injections, plus one booster six months after the third injection.
—Two Poliovirus immunizations, plus one booster six months after second injection.

—One Rubella (German Measles) immunization.
—One Measles immunization, given after 1 year of age.
—One Mumps immunization.

Parents of registrants should contact their physi-

cian to start an immunization program if it has been started. Parents unable to have this done by their own physician may call the local Department of Health to make arrangements. Evidence of above immunizations must be presented at the time of registration.

If you are aware of any handicapped children who will be 3 years old by December 31, 1987, notify Ms. Alice J. DeSanto, Director of Student Personnel Services of the Rahway Board of Education at 396-1035.

The painless tonometer screenings are for pressure within the eye which can lead to permanent, irreversible blindness. Glaucoma is discovered early, medical treatment can halt the progress.

Freeholder Fulcomer said that Rahway Landmarks, Inc., is making an outstanding contribution to the progress of Union County with its Union County Arts Center at the old Rahway Theater. He added that he hoped that the \$50,000 grant will bring the Arts Center closer to its goal of fully restoring the Rahway Theater.

Meals on Wheels may be extended

Legislation that would extend the Meals on Wheels program for senior citizens to weekends and holidays cleared a legislative hurdle last week when it was approved by an Assembly subcommittee.

Current Meals on Wheels programs would administer the expanded effort, according to Senator Russo. Each participating county would be required to contribute at least 20 percent of the state grant to their county-run program in order to participate.

The legislation would appropriate an additional \$1 million to the Department of Community Affairs for the program. In turn, their allocations to the counties would be in accordance to the existing formula derived from the Older Americans Act of 1965.

Under terms of the bill, residents of the state who are age 60 or older and homebound by illness or disability would be eligible to receive their meals delivered to them every day of the week. Like the existing weekday food delivery program, donations would be accepted, but not required of participants.

"The Meals on Wheels program is the lifeline of many senior citizens," said Senator Russo. "Their need for healthy meals is just as great on weekends and holidays as it is during the week."

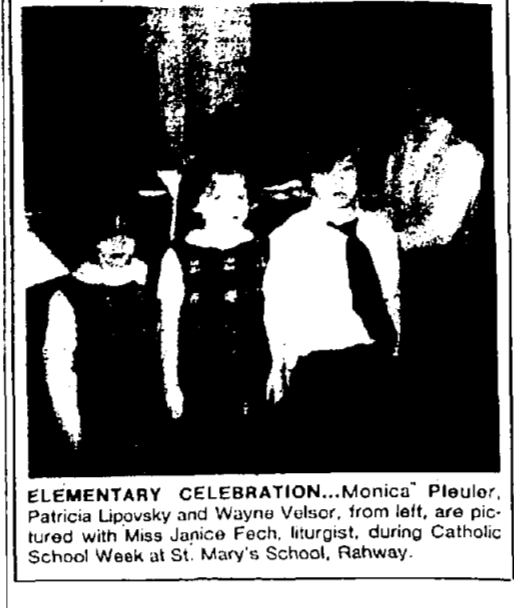

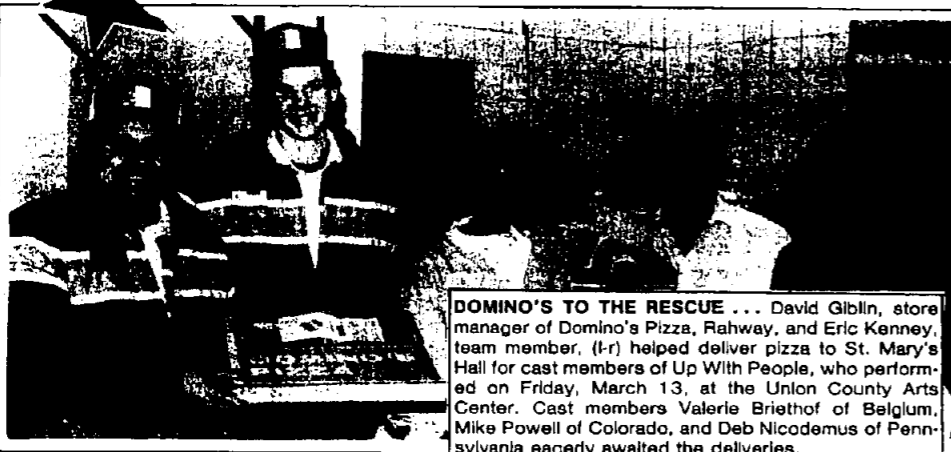

Junior Women offer checklist on poisons

In observance of National Poison Prevention Week, March 15-21, the Public Affairs Dept. of the Rahway Area Junior Woman's Club would like to remind everyone that the home areas listed below are the most common sites of accidental poisonings:

The Kitchen

1. All harmful products in the cabinets should have child-resistant caps. Products like furniture polishes, drain cleaners and some oven cleaners should have safety packaging to keep little children from accidentally opening the packages.

2. All potentially harmful products should be in their original containers. Labels on the original containers often give first aid information if someone should swallow the product; if products are stored in containers like drinking glasses or soda bottles, someone may think it is food and swallow it.

3. Harmful products should be stored away from food. If harmful products are placed next to food, someone may accidentally get a food and a poison mixed up and swallow the poison.

4. Keep all potentially harmful products up high and out of reach of children. Lock all cabinets that hold dangerous products.

5. Harmful products should be locked up and out of sight and reach.

6. Mrs. Elaine Oehme, Public Affairs Chairman of the Rahway Area Junior Woman's Club, states that the above checklist was published by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission. She adds, "Everyone should have the toll-free N.J. Poison Control Center phone number, 1-800-962-1253 listed on or near their telephone."

The Rahway Area Junior Woman's Club is a member of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, the largest volunteer organization in the world.

good medicine many now be a dangerous poison. Flush all old drugs down the toilet, rinse the container well, then discard it.

4. Give medicine only to the person the doctor prescribed it for. The medicine that works wonders on one person may harm another.

5. All medicines should be in their original containers with the original labels. Some prescription medicines list ingredients; the prescription number on the label of those that don't will allow identification of the ingredients by the pharmacist.

The Garage Or Storage Area

1. Anything in the garage or storage area that can be swallowed is a poison. Substances such as charcoal lighter, paint thinner and remover, anti-freeze and turpentine cause violent reactions if swallowed.

2. All poisons should have child-resistant caps.

3. They should be stored in the original containers.

4. Original labels should be on the containers.

5. No poisons should be stored in drinking glasses or soda bottles.

6. Harmful products should be locked up and out of sight and reach.

7. The New Jersey State Department of Corrections will conduct one of the workshops focusing on careers in corrections work. The Union County Probation Office will handle the presentation on careers in probation and/or parole work. The New Jersey State Police plan to offer a workshop on job opportunities as a state trooper, while the Linden Police Department will give a presentation on local police work. The Union County Sheriff's Office will conduct a workshop, as will representatives of two private security firms, according to Prof. Donald Palmer, UCC's coordinator of Criminal Justice Studies.

"This is a perfect opportunity to hear firsthand what pursuing a career in criminal justice/law enforcement may involve, whether it's a first or second career choice," Prof. Palmer said. "We hope as many persons as possible, men and women, young and non-traditional, will take advantage of this career night."
