

## 11% increase

# \$14.8 million city budget introduced

Homeowners will be hit with a 97 point tax increase, including the schools and county portion of the budget, equal to \$388 more per year on a house assessed at \$40,000, if the mayor's budget is adopted by the Rahway Municipal Council.

The 1987 budget was introduced at a special meeting held on Monday night in council chambers. Totaling \$14,813,883, the budget is an 11 percent increase over last year's budget and includes a tax increase of 42 points or \$168 per year for municipal purposes.

The breakdown for taxes is as follows: If the school board budget is approved

by voters on April 7, residents will face a 43 point tax increase, or \$176 per year on a home assessed at \$40,000; the county budget includes an 11 point tax increase or \$44; the municipal budget equals 42 points, or \$168 per year.

Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett said nine items in the budget more than equal this total tax increase. "In other words, without these nine items you cannot change, the entire rest of the City budget would result in a tax decrease for 1987," said Hartnett in a letter to council members.

The items include loss of federal revenue sharing, reduced industrial waste charge revenues, loss of surplus, increased garbage

collection costs, increased reserve for uncollected taxes, tax appeals, pensions, state mandated health insurance premiums and contractual clothing allowances for police and fire departments.

Profits from the sale of "Library Park," a parcel of land behind the library sold recently, were included in the budget and amounted to a 16 point reduction in taxes, according to Hartnett.

Mayor Daniel L. Martin said that five positions vacated through attrition were not filled and were not included in the budget. The positions include three police officers, one from the Fire Department and one from the Public Works Department.

Council Member James Cadigan, in voting to introduce the budget, said he "was not happy with an 11 percent increase (from last year). But, if we cut any more firemen we would have to reorganize the Fire Department and maybe close the Maple Avenue station," said Cadigan. "I can't see any more cuts in personnel without hurting the City."

Council President Vincent Addona urged council members to support the budget. "We are facing hard facts," said Addona. "We are facing a 97 point tax increase. We do not control two-thirds of the budget. I refuse to decimate the City because other people have no fiscal responsibility, in-

cluding the County and the Board of Education."

"As a result of attrition, we elected not to replace five people," said Mayor Martin. "As a result of the school budget, they elected to add 14 positions and as a result of the County budget, they elected to add 37. Without addressing the total package, we're trying to carry the burden of the total tax load which is only shared in a small portion."

Voting against introduction of the budget were Republican Councilmen James Fulcomer, John Marsh and George Wagenhoffer. "There has been no substantial effort to economize in this budget to cut the number of tax points," said Fulcomer. "In spite of the rhetoric we

heard about a budgetary crisis, there is in fact no crisis."

"The average house in Rahway will go up \$500 in taxes," said Marsh. "The administration puts itself on the back and says 'we're doing a good job. The mayor is not running the community, he's ruining the community.'"

"A 42 point tax increase seems rather hefty in a year when we were told we were in crisis," said Wagenhoffer. He said senior citizens and people on fixed incomes would find it difficult to afford the tax increase. "I've seen no effort to make reductions in this budget," said Wagenhoffer.

A public hearing on the budget will be held in council chambers on April 28.

## School board elections will decide on four posts

Rahway Board of Education candidates expressed their views to more than one hundred people at a Candidates Night held March 30 at the Intermediate School and hosted by the Parents Teachers Association (PTA/O) Council.

Margaret Walker, of the Westfield League of Women Voters, introduced four candidates seeking three, three-year terms to the board and two candidates seeking one, one-year term.

Former High School Principal Roy Valentine, former Board Member Betty Jacobs, incumbent Rick Proctor and PTA/O member Jacqueline Fagan are candidates for the three year terms. Barry Henderson and Rev. Donald Jones are seeking to fill the unexpired one year term of the late Louis Rizzo.

Roy Valentine retired last year after 33 years as an administrator in Rahway. He has served on various committees and has also served as a president of the board. He is employed as the Director of Health and Human Services in Bloomfield.

"One area that is important is an improved image for the board," said Proctor. "It has not kept up with our academic standards. We need a better community involvement." Proctor urged support of the budget. "We said it was the board's budget and indeed it was," he continued. "It reflects all our concerns as board members. There have been a series of compromises and we took some risks in putting it together. The only way to build on our strengths is to get adequate funding." Proctor also said he was in support of a full day kindergarten and a latch key program.

Jacqueline Fagan is a member of the PTA/O Council. She was the chairperson of the Pre-School Parents Advisory Council for two years, a member of the Rahway School System Curriculum Committee, a parent representative for the All Day Kindergarten Research Committee, a member of the HSPT Interpretation Committee and a volunteer librarian at Roosevelt School.

"I hold the administration accountable for a stronger school system and a stronger community," said Fagan. "My sole goal is to achieve excellence in education. I think I've proven by my actions that I can get the job done."

Barry Henderson, who is seeking a one year unexpired term, has been a Police Captain in Rahway for 23 years. He previously served nine years on the Board of Education.

"I don't just settle for progress. I settle for excellence," said Henderson. "I am an advocate of strong discipline. I am bringing to you nine years of experience I've had on the board. In education the most important thing a teacher can bring to a student is the ability to think for him or herself. I will make the tough decisions. I stand on the issues and I am approachable by everyone."

Rev. Donald Jones was appointed by the board last November to serve the unexpired term of Louis Rizzo until the election. He has been the pastor of Trinity Methodist Church for the past ten years. Jones is on the Board of Directors of the Rahway Day Care Center, is a member of the Rahway First Aid Squad Building Committee, is an honorary member of the Rahway High School Hall of Fame and is the chairman of the Rahway-Clark Red Cross Blood Bank.

"There are two enemies of education, one is apathy and the other is procrastination," said Jones. "We need to promote a thorough education. Kids are our most valuable commodity. They are human beings and they should be treated like human beings, not numbers. I hope and pray that each of you go to vote on April 7. In this City we can do anything we want to do if we have a positive attitude. I support our administration, our teachers and our kids. The last few months on the board have been a great experience for me. I've enjoyed it. We can make all kinds of promises. No one person can do a thing, but together we can do anything. We take Dan Martin's attitude, 'Pride and Progress'."

## \$17.6 million school tab goes to the polls

Voters will be asked to decide on the Rahway Board of Education budget when they go to the polls on April 7 for the school election.

"I feel that it is necessary,

for us to assure our continued certification, to back this budget," said Superintendent of Schools Frank Brunette.

The total budget of \$17,665,791 includes a Current Expense portion of

\$16,908,578, a Capital Outlay portion of \$368,500 and a Debt Service of \$388,713.

According to Board of Education Business Administrator/Secretary Anthony Rocco, if the budget

is approved, residents can expect to pay \$176 more a year in taxes on a home assessed at \$40,000 for school purposes.

This year's budget, an increase of 9.4 percent over last year, includes proposed new positions of four basic skills teachers, one music teacher, one special education teacher, one teacher for English as a Second Language (ESL), two librarians and one nurse.

Proposed positions eliminated in the budget are two teachers to cover in-school suspensions, one ESL teacher, one basic skills teacher, an extra teacher for Madison School and five clerical/aide positions.

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
