# City back in court with Utilities Authority

The City of Rahway is in court this week with continuing litigation against the Union County Utilities Authority (CUA).

The City, represented by attorney Louis Rainone, has protested a change in the CUA by-laws, made in February, which allows a member other than the treasurer to sign contracts and checks. Rahway Busi-

ness Administrator, Joseph Hartnett, acting as treasurer of the authority, has refused to sign checks in protest of the appointment of G. Richard Malgran as authority counsel.

Hartnett has charged that the appointment was a pre-arranged deal and accused Malgran of a "conflict of interest" in seeking and accepting the position of general counsel.

Malgran resigned from his position on the Board of Chosen Freeholders to accept the appointment. Rainone said the change in the by-laws is in violation of the consent judgement that settled the original lawsuit between the City and the Freeholders in creating the authority. "It is an attempt to strip the powers of treasurer from Mr. Hartnett," said

Rainone. In the judgement, Rahway was assured of the position of treasurer, chairman or secretary of the authority as long as it is in existence. During testimony before Superior Court Judge Milton Feller, County counsel Robert Doherty disclosed that some of the conversations between he and Hartnett were taped in conjunction with an in-

vestigation by the prosecutor's office, said Rainone. These taped conversations allegedly support Rahway's position that Doherty gave Rahway "sign off rights" on all contracts and checks, said Rainone. The City will be back in court on April 27 to argue the inclusion of the tapes in testimony. The Utilities Authority has moved to suppress them from evidence. A decision on admissibility of the tapes is expected that day.

## GED test for HS diploma slated for May in Rahway

Rahway Adult Basic Education Program in cooperation with Middlesex County College and the State Department of Adult Education will hold the General Educational Development (G.E.D.) test in Rahway Intermediate School.

The seven-hour test, which takes two evenings to administer, will be given from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m., on Tuesday May 5 and 12. Those candidates successfully passing the test will receive a New Jersey State High School Diploma.

Anyone who is interested in testing in Rahway should call Beverly Backmann at 574-2595 anytime from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. Because the testing is limited to 20 students, registration is required by April 28. There is a \$15 testing fee required by the State, which must be paid by certified check or money order upon registration.

It is highly recommended that all candidates for testing take the free practice

G.E.D. test which will be given in the Intermediate School on April 16, 28 and 30. This practice test is an excellent predictor of a person's scoring abilities on the official test, and will give them an idea of what they need to brush up on.

Presently, the G.E.D. tests five subjects: writing, science, social studies, reading and math. The reading, science and social studies portions of the test and predominantly reading comprehension. The test is entirely multiple choice.

The standards for obtaining a regular high school diploma are being raised with the required passing the High School Proficiency Test. In order for the State Diploma to maintain its relative equivalency, the requirements for passing the G.E.D. test are also being raised. As of January, 1988 the G.E.D. test will be completely changed. One of the biggest changes will be the addition of a 200 word written essay.

Judges were: for elementary students, poet and freelance writer Adele Kenney of Fanwood; for junior high school students, doctoral candidate Helena Kloder Bodian of Morris-town; for senior high school students, English teacher Ernest Jaeger of North Plainfield High School; and for college students, NJIT humanities professor Nikki Stiller of New York City.

Other winners in the elementary school division were Charles P. Rose, a sixth grader at Terrill Junior High School in Scotch Plains, second place for his poem "Fantasy," and Kenneth Duffy, a fifth grader at Roosevelt School in River Edge, third place for his poem "A Monet Day."

Honorable mention winners included Demian Graham, grade 6, Grover Cleveland School, for his poem "I Don't Understand," and to Debra Zapotocky, grade 8, Rahway Intermediate School, for her poem "The Branch."

## Heating, cooling assistance available to county residents

Union County residents experiencing difficulty paying their heating or utility bills from the winter may apply for help through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to a statement released by Michael C. Galuppo, Director, Union County Board of Social Services.

The program is intended to assist low-income families and individuals in meeting the high cost of heat in the winter months.

Gross monthly income limits for a single person household have been raised from \$656 to \$670, he said. The income limit for a two person household has been raised from \$881 to \$905.

The income limit for a three-person household has been increased from \$1,106

to \$1,140. For each additional household member the income limit is raised \$235.

Benefits are based on total gross income, household size and heating type. Tenants who have their heat included in the rent are eligible to apply as are home owners and renters who pay for their own heat. Eligible recipients of Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) and Food Stamps are issued Home Energy Assistance checks automatically.

Recipients of rental assistance apply for energy benefits only if they are responsible for their own heating costs.


As part of the same program, emergency assistance

may also be available for households without heat.

Cooling applications are now being taken for those for which there is medical evidence that the health of a household member will be seriously endangered unless their living quarters are cooled. The application must be accompanied by medical verification as well as an electric bill in the name of the applicant.

Senior citizens and disabled persons may receive and return their applications by mail.






