

HMAC, supporters hailed for emergency response efforts

The Hazardous Materials Advisory Council (HMCA) of Union-Middlesex counties was recently honored by the Chemical Manufacturers Association (CMA) for its outstanding efforts in improving the community's emergency response capabilities.

State Senator Raymond Lesniak, D-Middlesex-Union, founder and Co-Chairman of the HMCA, was cited by the Washington, D.C.-based CMA in recognition of the group's efforts to improve emergency preparedness in the two counties.

Among the supporting organizations that received duplicates of the award were the cities of Linden, Elizabeth, Rahway and Carteret, Middlesex County Health Department, the Union County Board of Freeholders, Union Hospital, New Jersey Office of Emergency Management and the Department of Environmental Protection.

Lesniak hailed the Council and its Executive Committee members for making major achievements in the group's 2 1/2 years of organization.

"They have heightened the consciousness of public

officials and private industry," Lesniak said, "providing a shared awareness and a forum for addressing hazardous materials emergencies. There was an awful lot of distrust from industry to government and government to industry."

He said the group, formed in 1985 with representatives of government, industry and emergency services as a core, has worked to create an atmosphere of cooperation.

Its initial accomplishments included planning and sponsoring a rolling-stock emergency drill, a community awareness program, and managing the development of an Emergency Response Training Program funded by the group's corporate members, American Cyanamid, Dupont, Exxon, Merck and Union Carbide.

"Our agenda is always ambitious," the senator said. "We never achieve all of it because our goals are so high."

Several speakers from the HMCA Executive Committee described the organization's background and programs to an audience of almost 90 community

representatives at the Sheraton, Woodbridge. "Between October 1984 and January 1985 (when the group was formed) there were 15 major industrial accidents in the central New Jersey area," said Vice-Chairman Richard Hills.

Hills, who is also the Middlesex County Health Department's program coordinator for air pollution control, said the area's 27 communities house 175 major industries.

"We have 675,000 people, so we have a need (for the organization)," he said. "We tried to coordinate various groups that support HMCA. We were able to bring the multitudes of diverse groups together." Hills said the organization "tries to bring the facts to the people."

Community awareness is of critical concern to HMCA. "We owe a lot to Senator Lesniak," Hills said. "He added an impetus to get HMCA off the ground, (but) we have a long way to go."

"We are a group of volunteers whose methods and agenda have recently been made mandatory by the Superfund Reauthorization Act (SARA)," said Paul

Schultz, Environmental and Community Affairs Manager of Union Carbide and HMCA Training Chairman.

Dennis LaJeunesse, HMCA Vice-Chairman and Division Manager at Exxon Chemicals, said to the community officials "When you are deciding how to comply with the new SARA regulation, think of the HMCA as a tool."

HMCA Executive Committee member John Carnall, Regional Safety Manager for American Cyanamid, outlined the organization's aggressive program for the next 12 months. Highlights of the activities include:

- Planning and sponsoring a regional field drill program that will result in a full field exercise at a local chemical plant in 1988.
- Provide specialized Hazardous Material training to Emergency Response personnel.
- Identify major transportation routes of hazardous materials shipments.
- Provide a data management system for Hazardous Material Data to a Response Organization.

Roselle ordinance challenged by County Utilities Authority

The Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) has filed a complaint against the Borough of Roselle, asking that an ordinance banning the receipt of recyclable materials from other communities be declared invalid and unenforceable.

According to UCUA officials, the action was taken in an effort to speed implementation of the County's regional recycling program. The twice-monthly, curbside pick-up plan was

scheduled to have begun this summer. However, efforts to satisfy objections voiced by Roselle officials to the use of Cox Street warehouse, where recyclable materials would be sorted for resale, have caused the program to be delayed until the fall.

According to the County's complaint:

- the Roselle ordinance is beyond the scope of powers granted to a municipality under New Jersey law
- in effect, the ordinance

is an amendment to the Roselle zoning ordinance and fails to comply with pertinent provisions of the Municipal Land Use Law.

• distinctions made in the ordinance between recyclable materials generated within and outside the Borough are improper under the Municipal Land Use Law, and these distinctions do not have any basis in terms of any legitimate governmental objective

- the ordinance constitutes special legislation

directed solely at one party and is, therefore, unconstitutional.

Referring to the action by the Authority, UCUA Chairman Kenneth L. MacRitchie said, "This lawsuit was filed as a last resort, after discussions with Roselle officials proved unproductive. The suit's objective

is to implement the UCUA's recycling program, which is vital in solving the County's solid waste disposal crisis. I hope that the suit can be resolved amicably, to allow the recycling program to proceed while protecting the legitimate environmental interests of Roselle residents."

Authority advancing on vendor selection

Following months of intensive negotiations with two prospective vendors, the Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) is focusing its attention on a proposal from Ogden Martin Systems, Inc. of Fairfield, N.J. to construct and operate a resource recovery facility in Rahway.

UCUA Chairman Kenneth L. MacRitchie emphasized that the Authority reserves the right to continue negotiating with

Research-Cottrell, Inc. of Bridgewater, N.J., should it be unsuccessful in finalizing an agreement with Ogden Martin.

UCUA officials hope to sign construction and operating contracts with the successful vendor within the next two months. The County's resource recovery facility, to be built on a 23-acre parcel off of Route No. 1 in Rahway, is expected to be operational by 1991.

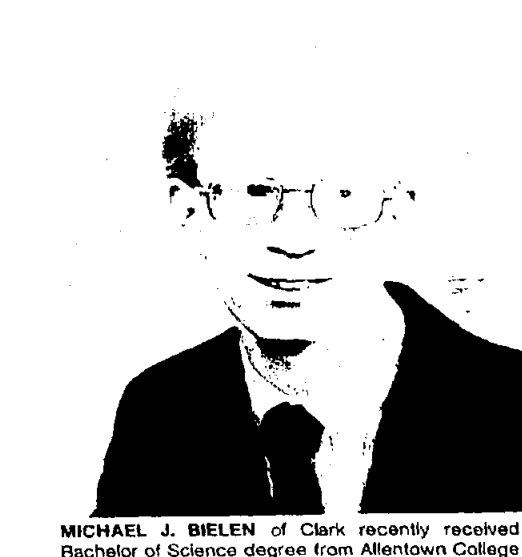

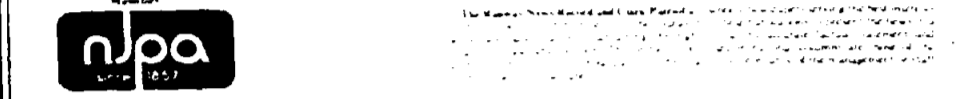

Save Library Park!

Editor's Note: The following letter was sent to the Rahway Planning Board.
On April 23, 1987 the Star Ledger reported that the town of Toms River was barred from selling a piece of municipally owned property because of a town accepted approved municipal budget includes approximately \$11 million in state aid. Library Park was sold for \$585,000. New state aid programs alone in the recently approved budget account for almost \$485,000. On April 23, 1987 the Star Ledger reported that the town of Toms River was barred from selling a piece of municipally owned property because of a town accepted approved municipal budget includes approximately \$11 million in state aid. Library Park was sold for \$585,000. New state aid programs alone in the recently approved budget account for almost \$485,000. Financial crisis over \$100,000 in a city the size of Rahway is ridiculous.

In a last resort effort to save the Library Park, I contacted the Department of Environmental Protection. I have been informed that the owner/developer of the property must submit a stream encroachment permit application to the state for review and pursuant to N.J.A.C. 17:27A et seq., the owner/developer must obtain a sewer extension permit from the Department prior to any construction. Since the planning Board is the agency responsible for overseeing the proper land use management practice in the City, I respectfully request that at a very minimum the owner/developer be required to comply with the letter and intent of the law, even if the City Council sees fit not to. At least what may be built on Library Park will conform to structural and environmental criteria designed to protect the public health and welfare.

Finally, should you know of any avenue which I or my colleagues have not explored in our fight to save Library Park, I sincerely hope you will make us aware of what additional measures we can take. Thank you very much for your time and attention.

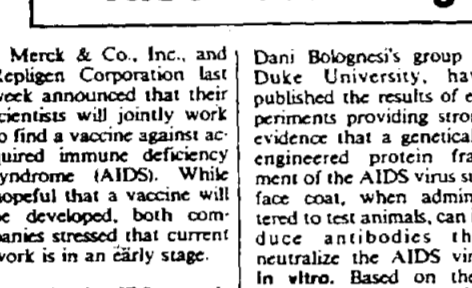

Merck will receive worldwide rights to the acquisition technology, and the agreement calls for Repligen to supply Merck with the finished product. Repligen will receive royalties on any successful AIDS vaccine marketed by Merck.

Each donor will be provided a card with his or her blood type printed on it for future reference and a record will be retained for use in the event of emergency or call for a specific blood type.

The need for blood never diminishes. Chairman Specht explained. Every minute of every day, five persons in the U.S. each need an estimated three pints of blood. Multiply those 15 pints by the number of minutes in a day, and the total daily consumption becomes enormous. And that's why donor blood, such as that which will be collected in Clark, is so important. Specht added.

"Don't underestimate the value of your blood donation," Chairman Specht emphasized. "All types of blood are needed... all the time!"
