UCUA seeks involvement in transfer stations

At a recent public hearing sponsored by the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (DEP), Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) Chairman Kenneth L. Mac-Ritchie testified that "with great reluctance" the UCUA would support the state's proposal to develop three trash transfer stations in the County under conditions that would allow the UCUA to control waste flow and rates.

ficials at Elizabeth City Hall, MacRitchie stated that the UCUA remains unanimously committed to the position that the DEP should make regional landfill space available until the planned resource recovery facility in Rahway is opera tional. But, given the impending closure of Edge-boro landfill, where 19 of the County's 21 municipalities currently truck their refuse, MacRitchie explain ed that the Authority has no other alternative but to become involved in the operation of transfer stations. "UCUA involvement will help to ensure con-tinued disposal during the hot summer months and in the years prior to the operarecovery facility at the most reasonable costs possible

under the circumstances, In January 1986, the DEP proposed an amend-ment to the Union County Solid Waste Managemen Plan designating the development of three transfer stations to handle Union County's waste flow for a three to five year period, beginning December 1987. The transfer station would consolidate solid waste generated within the County for transportation to out of state landfills. County officials have

been opposed to the transfer station proposal, sug-

tion proposal.

> his statement, the UCUA chairman warned the DEP about the possible mpact of privately operated transfer stations on the UCUA's solid waste pro-jects. "We have serious concern about our ability to guarantee waste flow to the County's resource recovery facility in the future," said MacRitchie. "Therefore, it was the consensus of our staff and consultants that without County-level involvement, the transfer stations could threaten the viability of the resource recovery facility and lead to uncontrollable out-of-state disposal costs."

Under the proposed modification, the per ton cost of disposal for all palities would be the same regardless of which transfer station is utilized by the

Inc.) in Elizabeth and on Lower Road (site of Maddaluna Disposal) in Linden.
