Parents demand removal of Madison School teacher

More than 30 parents attended the June 29th meeting of the Rahway Board of Education to ask the board to remove a third grade teacher at Madison School. Debbie Christian, acting as a representative of those present, read a prepared statement asking for the board's intervention on behalf of the "concerned parents of Madison School."

"This teacher is no longer providing a thorough and efficient education," said Christian. "There have been rumors of the lack of control and discipline in the classroom and rumors of mental and physical abuse." Many parents are so concerned that they are considering removing their children from the Rahway school system said Christian. "If this is not resolved, we feel we have no alternative," she said.

Robert Munsey, President of the Board of Education, said the board was investigating allegations against the teacher. "There are limitations to what we can say; we cannot name names," said Munsey. "We are aware of some of the circumstances that took place at one of our schools. I assure you this is not a dead issue. We understand and share your concern."

Munsey said that there were still two months to go before the beginning of the school year and two more meetings of the board to decide the issue. "We can

assure you we will not endanger your children and we will allow them to have a thorough and efficient education."

After the meeting Mrs. Christian, who has a son who will enter the third grade in September, said she will take a "wait and see attitude."

"I'll tell you right now, if that teacher is there my son will not be there," said Christian.

Sports clinics offered free to Rahway youth

Five free sports clinics will be held in the city of Rahway during the month of July. The clinics are being coordinated by Tom Lewis, athletic director at Rahway High School.

The Board of Education, City of Rahway's Recreation Department and Merck and Co. Inc. are providing the funds necessary for these events.

The first clinic will be for football, from July 6 to 10 from 2 to 6 p.m., at Veterans Memorial Field. Varsity football coach Lou Racipioe will direct the mini-camp which will be open to young men between the ages of 12 and 17. Some points of emphasis include running, drills to improve agility, team play, timing and testing, and an introduction to the weight room.

Boys' basketball will be featured from July 13 to 17 in the high school gymnasium from 2 to 6 p.m.

Rocco Colucci, junior varsity boys' coach, will direct the clinic which features shooting, dribbling, passing, rebounding, and defense skills. A special lecture and guest speaker are planned for later in the week.

The third week of July will feature two clinics. Boys' baseball under the direction of varsity baseball coach Bill Dohm will be held at Veterans Memorial Field from 10 a.m. to noon, and 1 to 4 p.m. from July 20 to 24. The clinic will be open to all boys between the ages of 10 and 17.

During the same week, a wrestling clinic will be held in the high school gymnasium between 5 and 9 p.m. Varsity wrestling coach Fred Stueber will coordinate activities that include numerous coaches from Union and Middlesex counties.

The girls' basketball clinic will be held in the high school gymnasium July 27

to 31 from 1 to 5 p.m. Glenn Curnow, varsity girls' coach, will coordinate the week of instruction with members of his coaching staff.

Clinics are open to all residents of Rahway between the ages of 12 and 17, except the baseball clinic which will be open to boys between the ages of 10 and 17.

The clinics will feature important aspects of play, guests speakers from throughout New Jersey, t-shirts to participants and refreshments.

All clinics are free, and according to Tom Lewis, "This opportunity will provide the young men and women a chance to meet with an excellent staff of coaches, receive free instruction and enjoy the month of July."

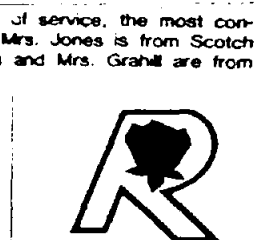

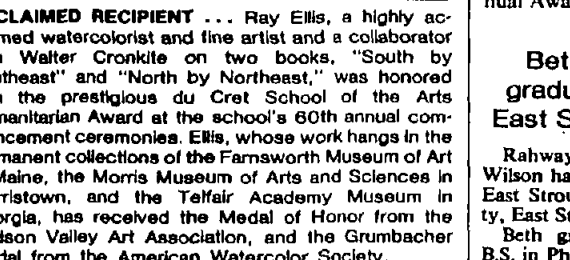

Owners should restrain pets advises Postal Service

He may be known as "man's best friend" to most, but not to the nearly 4,000 letter carriers nationwide who were the victims of serious dog bites while delivering mail last year. The major cause says Joseph P. Rulofs, Postmaster of the Rahway Post Office, is the pet owner who opens the door to take the mail from the carrier. It is an invitation for the dog to run out, he said. He also stated that these occurrences resulted in 50 dog attacks on carriers in this area alone. Added to the foregoing problem are unconfined dogs. "Our customers are responded very positively to our plea to keep their pets restrained in the past few years," Postmaster Rulofs says, "and we have seen a decline in bites nationally from 7,000 to 4,000. Nevertheless, virtually all dog bites are unnecessary and we are determined to eliminate this hazard to our employees and other citizens who might be bitten."

The Postal Service views dog attacks as a serious problem and is now helping its carriers fight back with third-party claims. In one recent case a carrier was awarded more than \$325,000 above Postal Service and Department of Labor costs, less an \$30,000 fee to his lawyer. In addition to the risk of a lawsuit, says Postmaster Rulofs, pet owners risk losing mail delivery to their homes or even entire neighborhoods in areas where pets roam unconfined and are a threat to the carrier. He noted, "What usually happens when it occurs is the pet owner who opens the door to take the mail from the carrier. It is an invitation for the dog to run out, he said. He also stated that these occurrences resulted in 50 dog attacks on carriers in this area alone. Added to the foregoing problem are unconfined dogs. "Our customers are responded very positively to our plea to keep their pets restrained in the past few years," Postmaster Rulofs says, "and we have seen a decline in bites nationally from 7,000 to 4,000. Nevertheless, virtually all dog bites are unnecessary and we are determined to eliminate this hazard to our employees and other citizens who might be bitten."
