Business Administrator's increase questioned

# Municipal salaries approved

by Pat DiMaggio A salary ordinance ap proved for final adoption by the Rahway Municipal Council drew comment from Republican Council members over the business administrator's 1987 salary

In a meeting held last eek, the council approved salaries for municipal of Business Administrator oseph Hartnett, was ques tioned by council members James Fulcomer, John Marsh and George Wagenhoffer who voted against the ordinance.

Beginning on March 1, 1987, Hartnett's salary range was between \$53,005 to \$56,604 with an additional \$12,500 stipend for

managing the City's water | Union County and it brings utility and a percentage increase for longevity, plus benefits, bringing his total salary to over \$73,000.

The council approved the \$12,500 increase for Hartnett several months ago. They were told at that time there was a surplus in the water account and as Hartnett was one of the few administrators in the state to manage a water utility and crease was warranted. Last April the council then approved a rate increase for water utility users.

"This salary incorporates \$12,500 increase for the business administrator on top of percentage increase, said Fulcomer. "This gives him the highest increase in

him far ahead of any other municipality in the County. It undermines the credibility of our City. It is not fair and it is not right.

"Rahway had the highest tax increase in Union County," said Marsh. "We are the only town in Union County to increase our water rates by 20 percent and we had the audacity to increase an individual salary by \$12,500 plus another six percent for longevity and benefits. My conscience tells me it must be tough to negotiate with our unions and tell them they only get 6 percent but I get \$12,500. The day should come when

everyone is equal." "This is too high of an increase to manage the water utility," said Wagenhoffer. | Finance and Comptroller, | Municipal Council, \$4,834; "When the residents of Rahway get their tax bill I think they will agree with the three councilmen who voted against this. They will come out and voice their objections to the kind of in-

crease we are granting."

#### Real Estate commissions

receive a commission in a real estate sale, the Brokerage Agreement must be in writing. As a further extension of this law, if there is a document in writing indicating that a party will be responsible for a brokerage commission and there is no specific amount or percentage that would calculate exactly what the commission is, the Broker is still not entitled to a brokerage commission. An agreement without the commission being clearly set forth violates the Statute of Frauds. The only way a Broker can get around the Statute of

rauds Law is by complying with what I call "5 day rule." What this rule provides is, in the event that a owner/landlord of real estate and, for whatever reasons, cannot obtain a written agreement executed by the owner of that real estate, the Broker can submit a letter either by registered mail, return receipt requested, or by delivering same personally, within five days after the making of the oral agreement, but prior to the actual sale of the real estate in question. This letter must set forth the specific terms of the oral agreement, including the actual rate or amount of commission to be paid.

Like any other rule, regulation or law, we all learn

from experience that there are a number of exceptions and "possible" exceptions. Without going into these exceptions in detail, I would like to briefly enumerate important categories of exceptions: 1. The Courts have determined that where a Broker

s representing a purchaser of land and the purchaser of that land agrees to pay the Broker/Salesperson a commission, that contract need not be in writing. (However, be aware that you could have a sparring match between the parties as to who said what and who agreed to what.) 2. The Broker/Salesperson may have a chance of obtaining a real estate commission on a matter that is not in corporated into a writing where it can be proven that the property owner committed fraud and/or deceit in induc-ing the Broker/Salesperson to expend his/her time and eforts in consummating the sale. However, this would be very difficult to prove. 3. An exception is possible if the Broker/Salesperson

is claiming a commission on an oral agreement for items other than real estate such as vending machines, etcetera. 4. There are times that memorandums rather than formal contracts (assuming they have the essential ingre-dients setting forth the agreement and the amount of money a Broker will receive for his commission) may enforce the payment of a commission even though a formal contract has not been executed between the parties. There is a decided case in which a Corporate Resolution, executed by the authorities of the Corporation, but not signed by the Broker/Salesperson, agreeing to engage the services of a particular Broker at a specific percentage rate or the sale of a specific piece of property, was sufficient The moral of the story, for Real Estate Brokers and Salespersons and for those selling property, is save ourself aggravation and legal expenses. 

BE IT ORDAINED by the Municipal Council of the City of Rahway
that Chapter 193 of the Code of the City of Rahway be hereby amended to add the following: 193-2 (A) For the purpose of this Ordinance, the term "non-profit

193-2 (A) For the purpose of this Ordinance, the term "non-profit organization" shall be defined as any organization which qualities under the terms of Section (al.(f) of N.J.S. 40A:12:21.

(B) All non-profit organizations shall be billed for and be required to pay for all water constituted as per the terms of Section 193-1 hereof.

(C) Any eligible non-profit organization may apply for and receive reimbursement for water bills paid from the City of Rahway Water Utility under the following terms and conditions:

1) That said non-profit organization has, at the conclusion of its fiscal year, submitted audited financial statements to the Division of Water: Water:
That said financial statements demonstrate that said non-profit organization operated at a loss for the fiscal year submitted;
3) That the sum of water bills paid for said fiscal year are equal to or more than 5% of the demonstrated losses as revealed by the financial tatement;
4) That when the organization is a component of, or subsidiary to,

shall be applied to any and all such organizations taken together as a provide the required financial records for such other organizations also or a legal statement that it is not a component of, a division of, or a ibstidiary to any other organization;




