Juvenile Bureau gets youth back on track

John started getting into trouble when he was 14. He was often in fights, was disciplined in school almost weekly for "cutting up" in class and was generally a disturbance in his neighbor hood and home. By the time he was 17 he was serving a one and a half month sentence in a rehabilitation center with nine months on probation for attempted breaking and entering and carrying a deadly weapon "I never got into trouble when I was straight," said John of his years of alcohol and drug abuse. "Every thing happened to me when

1 was high."
John is 20-years old now He spent a year in Al-coholics Anonymous and has been drug and alcohol-free for almost two years. He is living at home with his family, has a girlfriend and is working regularly in a good job

When John was first picked up by the Rahway Police Department, being a minor, he came into contact with the Rahway Juvenile Bureau. They counseled him and his family and offered referral services for his family. "I was just so un willing to work with them," says John today. "I went out of my way to do everything against them. I'd deliberately miss appoint-ments and would not cooperate with anything. But they wouldn't give up. They seemed to care."

Rahway's Juvenile was established in 1950. One of its main functions is to investigate crimes

Another aspect is to investigate child abuse cases in conjunction with the Division of Youth and Family Services and with the Union County Pro-secutor's Office and Child Abuse Unit. The Juvenile Bureau also investigates all sex cases involving juvenile victims and works closely with school officials on problems that might arise in and around school, including alcohol and drug abuse

The Juvenile Bureau frequently gives tours of Police Headquarters to scout and school groups and talks to school groups and parents the Juvenile Bureau, the Police Department and iuvenile crime.

Rahway's award-winning Juvenile Bureau consists of Detective Sergeant Robert Disko, and Juvenile Officers Detective Mark Schwartzbach. In 1985 Det. Pitts won the Prosecutor's Annual Award for Police Officer of the Year and Sgt. Disko was the recipient for

Important to juvenile in trouble are the referral services offered by the Juve-nile Bureau. "We also investigate juveniles who run away from home and who are having family prob-lems," said Sgt. Disko, "We will sit down with the family and try to work out the problem. If we can't do it there are referral agencies in main ones is the Crisis Intervention Unit, Project Access. We refer families to Rahway Psychiatric Unit or to Elizabeth, Union Memorial now has a very good unit for the treatment alcohol or drug abuse.

that area. Last year the Juvenile Bureau handled 456 juveniles in 568 cases, some in cluding repeaters, with 34 cases involving runaways (all found), 26 incorrigibility cases, 12 robbery, 10 aggravated assault, 27 burglaries, 42 thefts, 6 motor thefts, 41 assaults and 13 child abuse cases. "In 1986 there was a decrease of 120 cases from 1985," said Disko.

It takes a special rapport to deal with troubled kids and all the officers of the Juvenile Bureau have that certain quality necessary to instill trust. "I just like working with kids," said Disko. "You have to really enjoy it. I think you get the most satisfaction in trying to help a family who might have a problem or in help-

ing straighten out a kid in plained Disko. "The City trouble." has not been able to afford Rahway's Juvenile Bu-

reau can boast a 90 percent clearance rate of cases investigated.

One program Sgt. Disko would like to see implemented is the return of the department's own counselor. "Years ago we had our own counselor but we lost the federal grants that paid for the service," exhas not been able to afford to start the program up again."
Sgt. Disko is a firm be-

liever in the merits of the Juvenile Department. "I think every department should have one," he said. "People in the Juvenile Department really make an effort to get to know the kids. Not everyone can develop that rapport with


Anyone wishing to compare "Full Metal Jacket" with "Platoon" should be warned outright: Stanley Kubrick appears less interested in making a standard "war" movie than in making a celluloid statement against the dehumanization of war which is generated by the functional training that precludes it. Indeed, with all of the training that Sgt. Hardeman drilled into the ecruits, Pvt. Joker comes face to face with situations that simply overcome him due to his basic human instincts

"Full Metal Jacket", like Kubrick's previous "war" film, "Paths of Glory" characterizes and attacks the directors disdain for authority and regimentation of any kind.

The last shot of "Full Metal Jacket" perfectly captures Kubrick's highly stylized sense of the absurd. The ong, dark silhouettes of Marines marching in no apparent order through the bombed out streets singing the theme song of "The Mickey Mouse Club" in perfect rhythm represents no more the fighting man but rather lost souls

in Hell knowing no other recourse but to follow the men in front of then Anyone going to "Full Metal Jacket" expecting mindless exercise in violence like the "Rambo" films or even a solid character study of men at war like "Platoon will be ultimately disappointed with Kubrick's master-

In conclusion, "Full Metal Jacket" is a slice of life at ts most ugly. Credit must go to its visionary director whose nonco iformity consistently challenges the audience to think for themselves Welcome back Stanley Kubrick, and please don't take another seven years to make a film!
