Rahway Park Pool spells r-e-l-i-e-f

Union County residents can escape the heat and find cooling solace at Rahway Park's pool.

Built in 1982 at a cost of \$1.3 million financed by Green Acre funds, the pool is open seven days a week and is operated by the Union County Department of Parks and Recreation.

The pool also hosts one of the oldest bath houses in the state of New Jersey, said Supervisor Kyle Jackson. "They started to renovate it by putting in

new bathrooms and adding on storage areas before they stopped," said Jackson. "They built a new one opposite it."

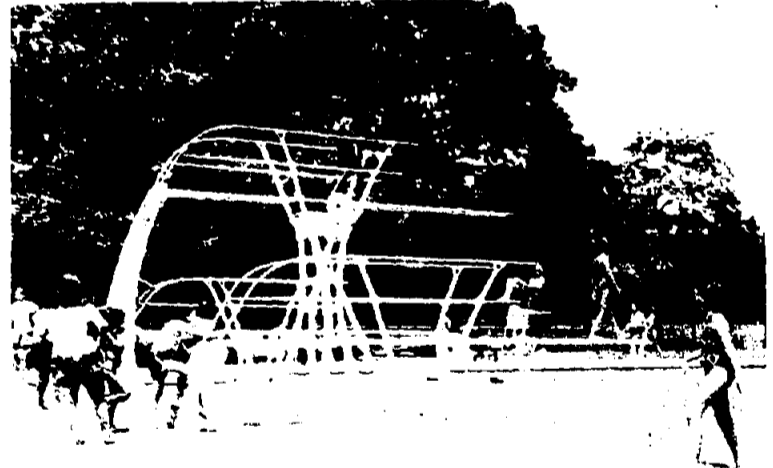
The pool is 20 meters by 50 meters and holds in excess of 250,000 gallons of water, said Jackson. It is maintained by 14 working lifeguards during the weekend and 8 lifeguards during the week.

Divers have their own pool with two one-meter boards and one three-meter board. There is a kiddie pool adjacent to the main pool with a jungle gym.

Facilities include picnic benches and a snack bar, showers, changing facilities and coin-operated lockers.

When the capacity reaches 900, usually on a weekend, the doors will be shut down, according to Jackson.

Rahway River Park is located on St. Georges Avenue, and the pool entrance is adjacent to the river in the center of the park.

Juvenile Bureau gets youth back on track

John started getting into trouble when he was 14. He was often in fights, was disciplined in school almost weekly for "cutting up" in class and was generally a disturbance in his neighborhood and home. By the time he was 17 he was serving a one and a half month sentence in a rehabilitation center with nine months on probation for attempted breaking and entering and carrying a deadly weapon. "I never got into trouble when I was straight," said John of his years of alcohol and drug abuse. "Everything happened to me when I was high."

John is 20-years old now. He spent a year in Alcoholics Anonymous and has been drug and alcohol-free for almost two years. He is living at home with his family, has a girlfriend and is working regularly in a good job.

When John was first picked up by the Rahway Police Department, being a minor, he came into contact with the Rahway Juvenile Bureau. They counseled him and his family and offered referral services for his family. "I was just so unwilling to work with them," says John today. "I went out of my way to do everything against them. I'd deliberately miss appointments and would not cooperate with anything. But they wouldn't give up. They seemed to care."

Rahway's Juvenile Bureau was established in 1950. One of its main functions is to investigate crimes

involving juvenile suspects. Another aspect is to investigate child abuse cases in conjunction with the Division of Youth and Family Services and with the Union County Prosecutor's Office and Child Abuse Unit. The Juvenile Bureau also investigates all sex cases involving juvenile victims and works closely with school officials on problems that might arise in and around school, including alcohol and drug abuse.

The Juvenile Bureau frequently gives tours of Police Headquarters to scout and school groups and talks to school groups and parents about different phases of the Juvenile Bureau, the Police Department and juvenile crime.

Rahway's award-winning Juvenile Bureau consists of Detective Sergeant Robert Disko, and Juvenile Officers Detective Daniel Pitts and Detective Mark Schwartzbach. In 1985 Det. Pitts won the Prosecutor's Annual Award for Police Officer of the Year and Sgt. Disko was the recipient for 1986.

Important to juvenile in trouble are the referral services offered by the Juvenile Bureau. "We also investigate juveniles who run away from home and who are having family problems," said Sgt. Disko. "We will sit down with the family and try to work out the problem. If we can't do it there are referral agencies in Union County. One of the main ones is the Crisis Intervention Unit, Project Access. We refer families to the Rahway Psychiatric Unit or to Elizabeth Union Memorial now has a very good unit for the treatment of alcohol or drug abuse. Kids can be treated then sent to a residential place. When we deal with kids

who have drug or alcohol problems, but who have not been arrested, we refer them to people trained in that area."

Last year the Juvenile Bureau handled 456 juveniles in 568 cases, some including repeaters, with 34 cases involving runaways (all found), 26 incorrigibility cases, 12 robbery, 10 aggravated assault, 27 burglaries, 42 thefts, 6 motor thefts, 41 assaults and 13 child abuse cases. "In 1986 there was a decrease of 120 cases from 1985," said Disko.

It takes a special rapport to deal with troubled kids and all the officers of the Juvenile Bureau have that certain quality necessary to instill trust. "I just like working with kids," said Disko. "You have to really enjoy it. I think you get the most satisfaction in trying to help a family who might have a problem or in help-

ing straighten out a kid in trouble."

Rahway's Juvenile Bureau can boast a 90 percent clearance rate of cases investigated.

One program Sgt. Disko would like to see implemented is the return of the department's own counselor. "Years ago we had our own counselor but we lost the federal grants that paid for the service," explained Disko. "The City has not been able to afford to start the program up again."

Sgt. Disko is a firm believer in the merits of the Juvenile Department. "I think every department should have one," he said. "People in the Juvenile Department really make an effort to get to know the kids. Not everyone can develop that rapport with them."

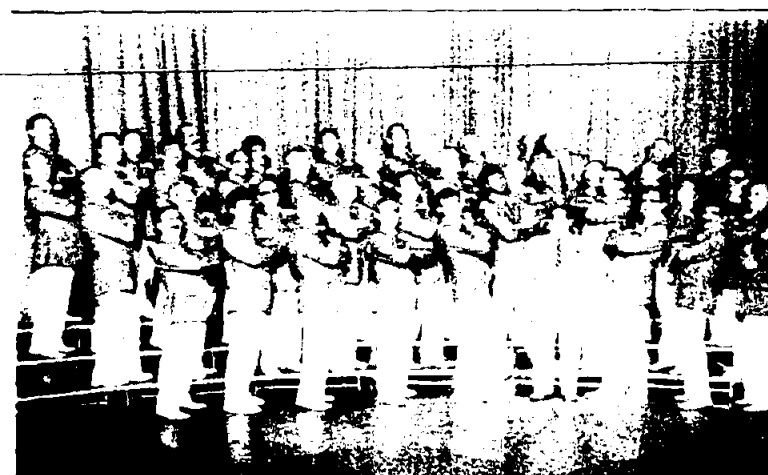
Merck declares dividend

The Board of Directors of Merck & Co., Inc. recently declared a quarterly dividend of 80 cents a share on the company's common stock, increased from 55 cents a share. With the 80 cent dividend, payable October 1, 1987, to stockholders of record as of the close of business on September 3, 1987, Merck's total dividends paid during 1987 will be \$2.4 a share, a 29 percent increase over the amount paid in 1986.

The company also announced that its Board of Directors would review the desirability of a stock split at its regular meeting on November 1987. It approved by the Board at that time a recommendation to stockholders, a stock split would be subject to stockholder approval of the annual meeting, to stockholders in April 1988. Merck's last stock split was two-for-one effective May 1987.

The Merck Board also approved purchases of up to an additional \$1 billion under the company's program for purchasing shares of its common stock for its treasury over time. Under prior approvals for the period 1984 through 1986, the company spent \$900 million to acquire 13 million shares of its stock on the open market. Merck currently has 136 million shares outstanding.

These treasury stock purchases will be made on the open market, in block transactions, and in privately negotiated transactions. All purchases will be made through Goldman, Sachs & Co., an exclusive agent. Purchases may be suspended from time to time or discontinued. Shares acquired will be available for use under the company's employee benefit programs and for other general corporate purposes.

Cost of violence and vandalism in regional district is down

Violence and vandalism in the schools of the Union County Regional High School District No. 1 cost the Board of Education and the taxpayers \$14,160.59 during the 1986-87 school year, down \$1,385.34 from the damage figure of the previous school year.

These facts were revealed during the discussion of the Regional District's Annual Report on Violence and Vandalism, which was made public at the Regional Board of Education meeting on August 4, 1987, at the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School in Springfield.

While the cost of damages during 1986-87 is approximately \$1,380 less than it was during the previous school year, the figure is still too high," said Dr. Donald Merachnik, Superintendent of Schools. "I would like to ask all

parents of students in the District to instill in their youngsters the idea that the property and equipment of the Regional High Schools belongs to the taxpayers and that they, as students, should take the responsibility for helping to maintain this property and equipment.

"When vandalism to Regional District property or equipment necessitates repairs or replacement, the cost must be absorbed by all the taxpayers of the District," he continued. "If vandalism is curbed, we can take the funds now being spent on repairs and redirect them toward instructional programs which will benefit the students."

Dr. Merachnik, who said the decrease in violence and vandalism-related damages was "encouraging," also stipulated that the Regional District will do everything possible to see that vandals are apprehended and that restitution is received for the offenders.

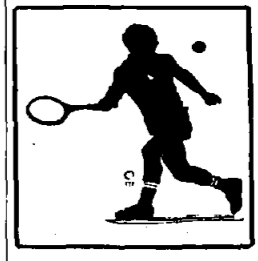
