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Speed limits, city aid and garbage top Municipal Council agenda

The Rahway Municipal Council approved an ordinance for first reading that would lower the speed limit on Madison Hill Road from 35 miles per hour to 25 miles per hour at their regular meeting held last week.

The 25 miles per hour limit would extend from the Clark Township line to Westfield Avenue in Rahway. A second reading and possible final adoption of this ordinance will be held at the September 14 meeting of the council.

The council also approved a resolution authorizing a Memorandum of Understanding for the receipt of \$400,000 from Distressed Cities State Aid and approved a resolution authorizing the acceptance of a bid of \$7 to a maximum of \$90,000 from Schifano Construction Corp., Middlesex, for the reconstruction of Barnett Street.

A resolution strongly protesting the request by the Edgboro Landfill to drastically increase its tipping fee was approved. Edgboro has requested an increase of 55.3 percent in its tipping fee from the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities. "Such an increase would exceed the amount of funds appropriated for garbage disposal in the state-approved municipal budget of the City of Rahway," stated the resolution, "and would place an unfair burden on the taxpayers of Rahway."

The council also approved a resolution directing the Planning Board to research and develop an amendment to the zoning ordinance to regulate the development of townhouses and condominiums in the City.

A resolution requesting the funding and completion of the permanent Route 1 realignment in the vicinity of the Lawrence Street/Route 1 intersection to provide a traffic plan for the proposed resource recovery facility was also approved by the council. The resolution directs the Department of Transportation and the Department of Environmental Protection to take whatever steps are necessary to assure proper funding and completion of the realignment. "The City of Rahway is the first and, to date, only municipality within the State of New Jersey to willingly accept siting of the solid waste facility," stated the resolution, "and an integral condition of this facility was the understanding that the City would have complete oversight and control of the traffic plan for garbage trucks entering and leaving the facility."

In other business, the council: Approved a resolution authorizing the mayor and city clerk to enter into an agreement with Robert E. Rosa Associates for consulting purposes.

Approved a resolution reappointing Martin Spangle as a commissioner of the Housing Authority.

Approved a resolution authorizing the mayor and municipal clerk to enter an agreement with the Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) on recycling. The UCUA has entered into an agreement with the Occupational Center of Union County to provide curbside pick-up of recyclable materials.

Approved an ordinance authorizing the mayor and municipal clerk to execute an agreement with the County of Union to modify the Interlocal Services Agreement.

Approved an ordinance authorizing the mayor and municipal clerk as the Public Housing Agency to execute an agreement with Union County for cooperative participation in the Rental Rehabilitation Program.

Amended an ordinance to include the acquisition of new traffic signals and handicapped access improvements to the public library at the maximum amounts of \$20,000 and \$25,000.

Free water turned off

The Rahway Municipal Council approved an ordinance at their regular meeting held last week that will put an end to the city's policy of providing free water to non-profit organizations.

Councilman Max Sheld, chairman of the Water Study Committee, said the city has been giving free water to certain organizations in Rahway for the last 15 years. He pointed to a state statute that allows any municipality to give free water to a charitable organization if the city is the owner of that water company.

A recent study by the committee discovered the city was providing between \$8,000 to \$9,000 of free water per year, said Sheld. The ordinance states that all non-profit organizations will be billed for and required to pay for all water consumed.

Any eligible non-profit organization may apply for and receive reimbursements for water bills paid from the City of Rahway Water Utility under the following conditions: That the organization has, at the conclusion of its fiscal year, submitted audited financial statements to the Division of Water; that the financial statements demonstrate that the organization operated at a loss for the year; that the sum of the water bills paid for the fiscal year are equal to or more than five percent of the demonstrated losses as revealed by the financial statement; that when the organization is a component of or subsidiary to any other organization, the requirements shall apply to all such organizations taken together as a whole.

The ordinance will take effect on January 1, 1988.

Herbert H. Kiehn, a resident of Rahway for 70 years, was memorialized by a resolution approved by the Municipal Council last month.

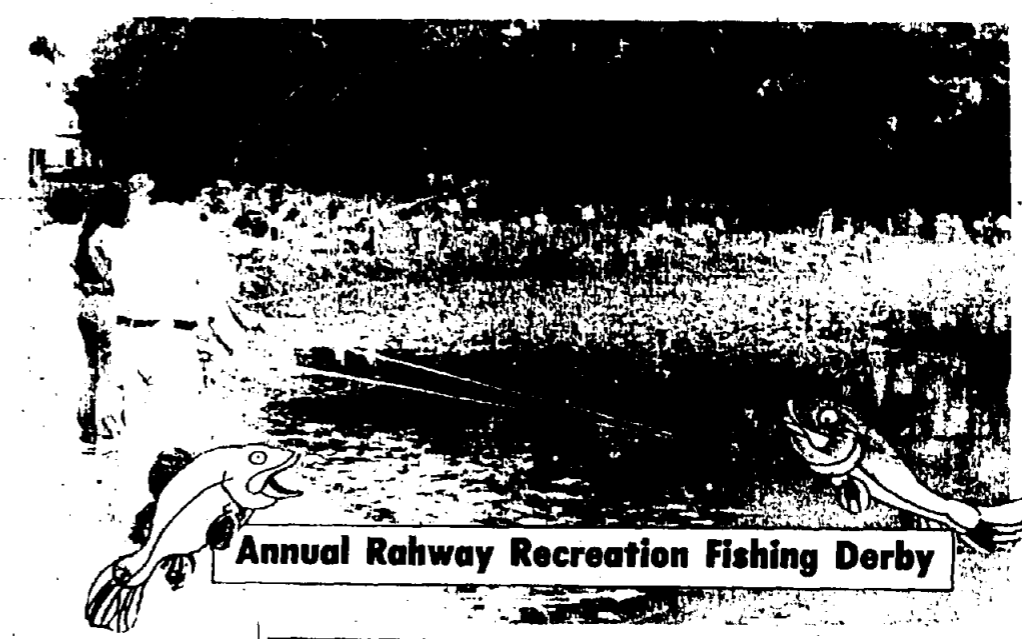

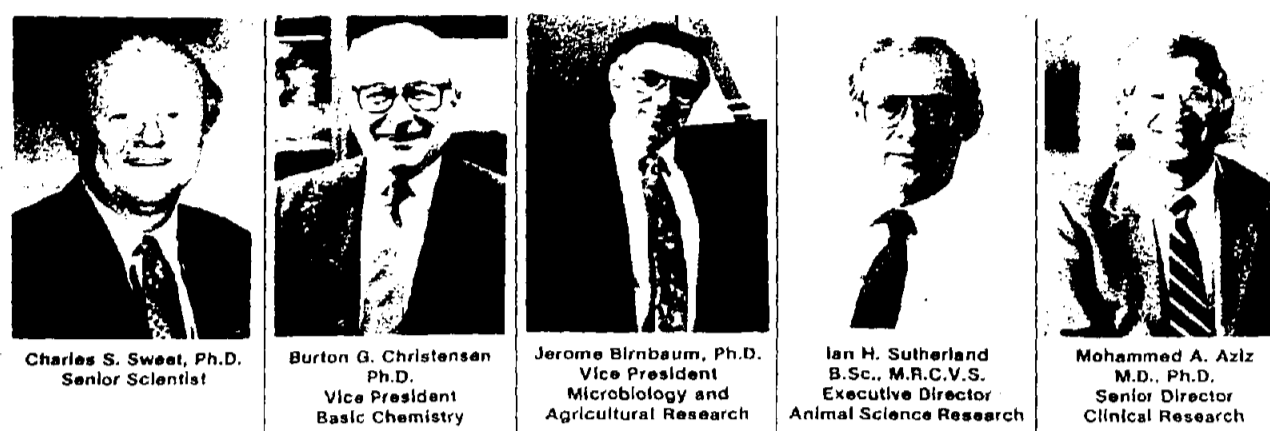


NO FISH STORY... Tameka Hargrave of Mad-den Field holds an 8-inch Speckled Trout caught at Milton Lake Park during the derby.

Ten lauded Merck confers top science awards

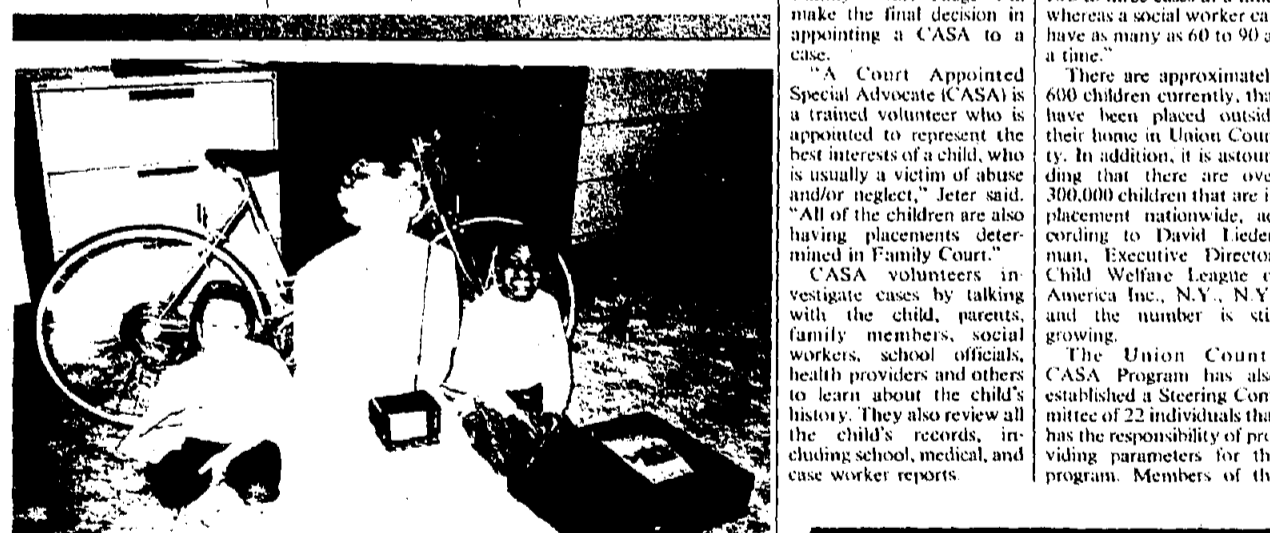

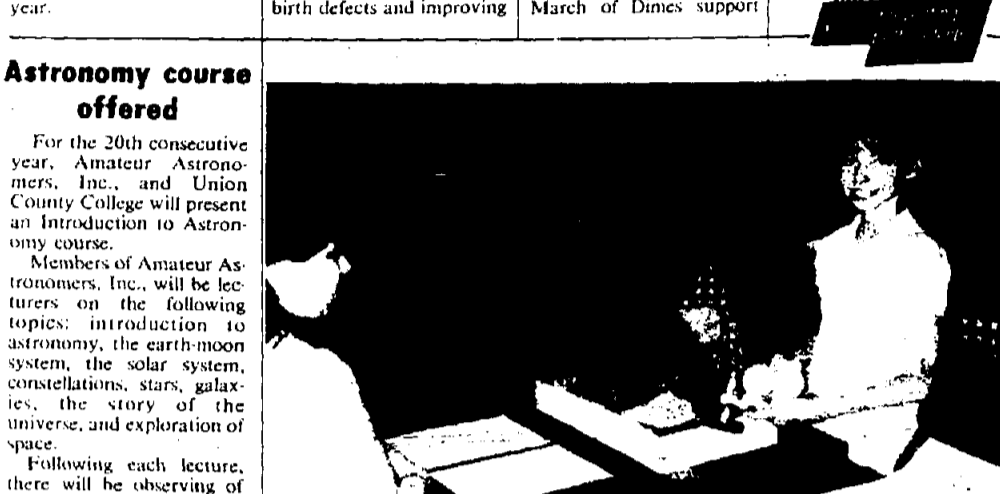

County to enact model program for abused, neglected children

Union County will implement a model program that will represent the best interests of abused and neglected children, for whom placement is being determined in Family Court, according to Linda Jeit, Coordinator of the Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) Program.

This unique program will utilize the existing Child Placement Review Board as a screening mechanism for assigning a CASA to a case, with the CASA acting as a neutral fact finder.

However, the Presiding Family Court Judge will make the final decision in appointing a CASA to a case.

There are approximately 600 children currently, that have been placed outside their home in Union County. In addition, it is astounding that there are over 300,000 children that are in placement nationwide, according to David Lederer, Executive Director, Child Welfare League of America (C.W.L.A.), N.Y., N.Y., and the number is still growing.

The Union County CASA Program has also established a Steering Committee of 22 individuals that has the responsibility of providing parameters for the program. Members of the committee include: Lapolla, Judge Edward W. Beglin, Jr., Walter R. Baranek and Assistant Judge, Presiding Judge Family Part and Judge Superior Court, according to Linda Jeit, Coordinator of the Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) Program.

"Stakeout"

"Stakeout" is all of the following: a cop movie, a love story, a "buddy" movie, a comedy, and cavity, one of the most likable films of the summer. It's a two-hour roller coaster of laughs and thrills.

The plot centers on two Seattle police detectives (Richard Dreyfuss and Emilio Estevez) who are ordered to "stakeout" duty, to watch an unassuming woman from across the street.

The plot thickens when the flamboyant cop (Dreyfuss) loses more than his "cover" and falls head over heels for the Latin beauty, Maria, whom he and his buddy have been ogling through their bugging and binocular devices. When Maria's convict boyfriend returns, all hell breaks loose and the film climaxes with a knock down drag out fight between the good and bad guys.

"Stakeout" is directed by John Badham, who has made consistently entertaining and highly profitable films like "War Games," "Shogun Crazy," and "The Thunder" which have pleased moviegoers and studio executives alike.

The formula for "Stakeout" differs not an iota from these past hits — Badham builds up a character study of likable "good guys," and puts them in a perilous situation which has the audience cringing and squirming in their seats.

The director is helped by some excellent performances by the leads. Richard Dreyfuss plays a pint-sized tough guy detective who is both humorous and touching. His character is the typical self-proclaimed "swinging bachelor" who in actuality hides his loneliness by playing the joker.

Emilio Estevez plays his detective as the "straighter" of the two. He is a younger, more family-oriented man whose by the book procedures contrast and come to odds with his partners' devil may care attitude towards life. The chemistry between the two leads is right on target. Both play their parts to perfection.

The script is reminiscent of Hitchcock's "Rear Window" which viewed the hero (James Stewart) as a voyeur whose fascination with spying on the unsuspected leads him into trouble. "Stakeout" is no different. Dreyfuss' character becomes intrigued, obsessed and finally falls in love with the "subject" he has been ordered to watch, thus leading him and his partner into a situation which threatens both of their lives.

"Stakeout" is a crisp and thriller and a bona fide audience pleaser.

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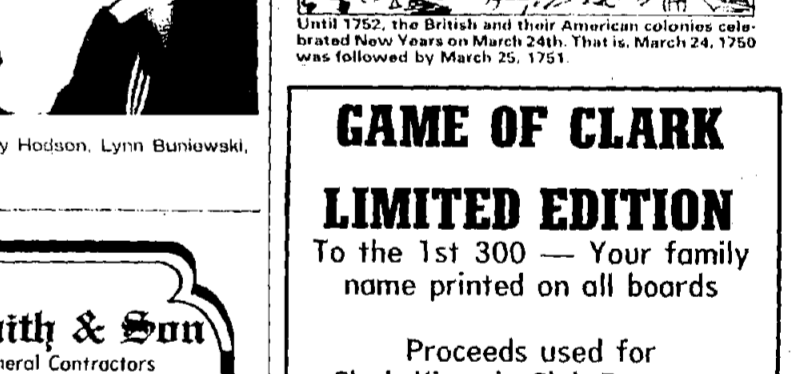

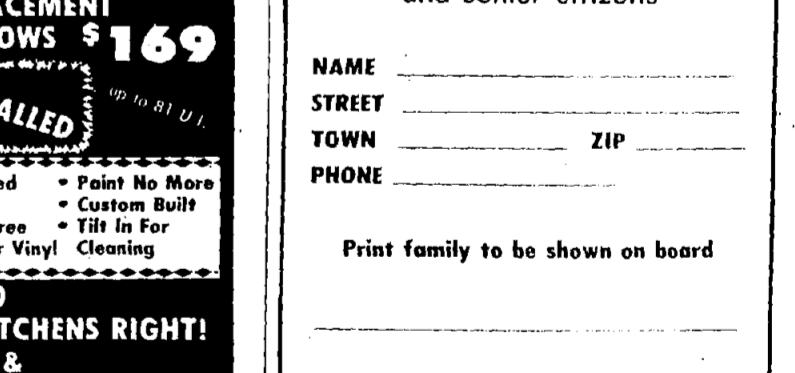

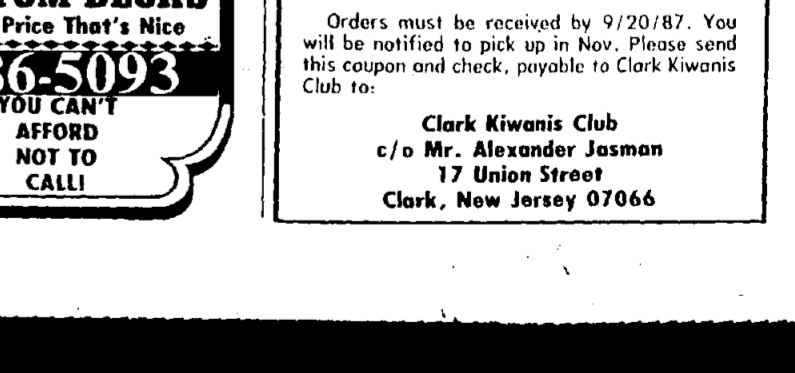

Extended nursing home care urged

The vice chairman of the House Aging Committee, Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo, R-N.J., has urged Republican leaders in the Senate to offer his plan for long-term nursing home care for the elderly as an amendment to the Senate catastrophic health insurance bill.

The Rinaldo plan, which would provide affordable private extended home health and nursing home care insurance through tax incentives, was included in the Republican catastrophic health legislation that was rejected by the House last week in favor of the Democratic-sponsored bill.

The Congressman said that long-term care insurance is currently too costly for most older Americans and to preserve it when the differences between the House and Senate bills are reconciled by the conference committee.

Rinaldo said, "If there is one glaring omission in the House catastrophic illness bill it is the absence of a provision to protect the elderly against the expense of ex-

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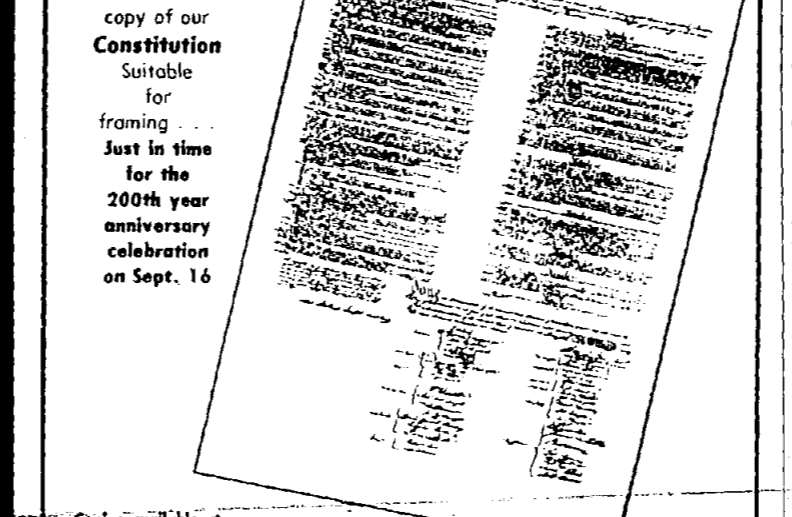

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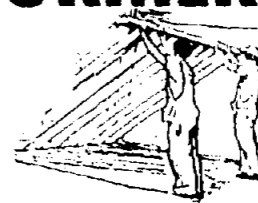
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
