## Rahway Education Association agrees to three-year contract

The Rahway Board of Education ratified a Memorandum of Agreement with the Rahway Education Association (REA) at a meeting held last week.

The REA voted on and approved the memorandum that grants members of their bargaining unit a three-year contract to expire on July 1, 1987.

Teachers will receive a gross adjustment in their

salaries of 8.95 percent the first year, 9.25 percent the second year, and 9.35 percent the third year.

President of the Board of Education Robert Munsey said the increases were "below the county average on contracts in this area."

Munsey pointed to 1987-88 increases in Berkeley Heights of 8.6 percent; in Cranford of 9 percent; and in Garwood of 9.08 percent. Clark granted a 9 percent increase in the

first year of their three-year contract.

Board member Barry Henderson voted against the memorandum. "I feel the agreement is excessive," said Henderson. "We've put a tremendous burden on the taxpayers of Rahway."

"I think it is a fair agreement," said Board member Lori Kennedy. "We hired 27 teachers this year. If we don't want to have the bottom of the barrel we must

be comparable to other towns."

Beginning teachers in New Jersey receive a state-mandated salary of \$18,500. Under the old contract, Rahway teachers started at \$19,700 with a top range with a Bachelor's Degree of \$34,675.

The REA is the bargaining unit for teachers, clerical workers, custodians and maintenance workers. Total membership is approximately 350.

With mandatory recycling now in effect in Union County, the business community is moving ahead in its efforts to comply with the necessary requirements.

"Businesses, both large and small, must separate recyclables from their non-recyclable garbage," said Joan Buhrendorf, district recycling coordinator. "The State Department of Environmental Protection has informed garbage haulers not to collect containers that hold substantial amounts of recyclable materials."

Businesses and institutions (including hospitals, schools, colleges and libraries) interested in beginning office paper recycling programs can contact their municipal recycling coordinators for brochures on

the types of paper that can be recycled and how the paper can best be collected within the office.

Because procedures for pick-up and/or delivery of recyclable materials vary among Union County's 21 municipalities, businesses should call their municipal recycling coordinators for specific information on disposing of recyclables.

The Rahway Board of Education accepted the retirement resignation of Herman Scherman, principal of the Intermediate School, at their regular meeting held on September 15.

Ralph Manfredi, former vice principal of the high school, has been serving as acting principal while Scherman was on an extended medical leave. Scherman's resignation is effective December 1.

The board also appointed Deborah Ann Clarke as a cosmetology teacher at the high school at the compensation rate of \$19,700; appointed Roberta Scaman as eighth grade advisor at the Intermediate School at the compensation rate of \$152; and appointed Judith Fossa

as Choral Director at the Intermediate School at the compensation rate of \$372.

Additional appointments included Barbara Goldner and Patricia R. Bradshaw as teachers' aides at Roosevelt School at \$5.07 per hour. Dianna Speidel and Joseph Daniele were added to the Substitute Teacher List and the board accepted the resignation of John Melkle, sixth grade teacher at Roosevelt School.

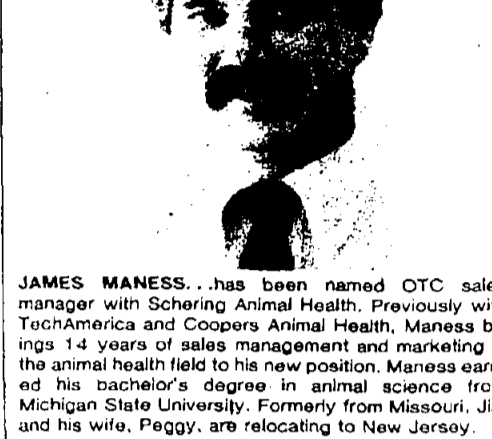

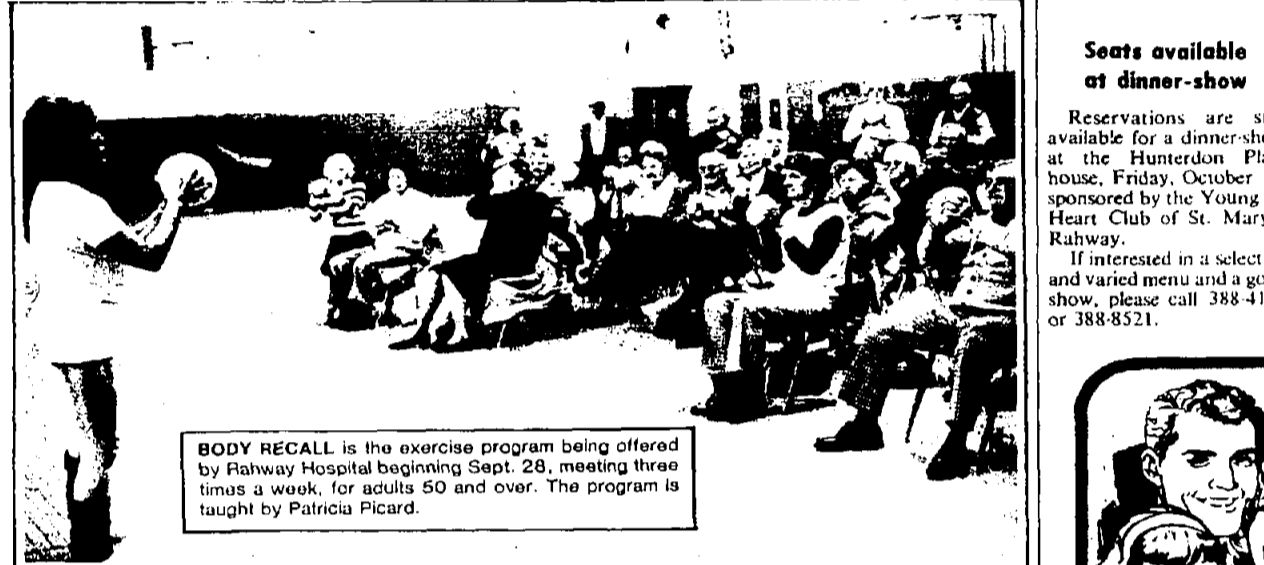

### Adults offered 'Body Recall'

Rahway Hospital is introducing "Body Recall," a program of gentle exercise and movement designed for adults who are 50 years plus.

Taught by a specially trained instructor, the program is aimed at restoring flexibility, increasing range of motion and circulation, and maintaining fitness.

The ten-week session begins on Sept. 28 and will meet at the hospital three times a week: Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, from 9:45 to 10:45 a.m.

Body Recall is a safe, beneficial system of exercise taught by more than 300 certified instructors across the country. It has been acclaimed by physicians and is recognized by the President's Council on Physical Fitness.

Instructor Patricia Picard was trained by Dorothy Christman, founder of Body Recall and a member of the physical education staff at Berea College in Kentucky. Ms. Picard attended a week-long intensive training session at Berea College and has an extensive background in ballet and gymnastics.

"Body recall helps seniors restore and keep a full range of motion," said Ms. Picard. Participants have reported phenomenal results. People who have lost the ability to get up and down from the floor, or the ability to get in and out of the bathtub have regained these skills through Body Recall, reported Ms. Picard.

"The program is safe for anyone — movement is not forced. Physical fitness can come from slow movement. Exercise should not produce pain or strain," explained Ms. Picard.

The instructor educates the participants as to why the exercises are being performed and assigns and discusses reading material.

"The program is different from any other exercise program I've been involved in. It changes attitudes, it creates body awareness, and builds self-esteem. The participants do not merely come and go — a social network is established," Ms. Picard reported.

Participants should wear loose clothes and sneakers, and have their legs covered. Sweat pants are preferred.

Enrollment for this ten-week course is limited and pre-registration is required. The cost of the program, which runs for 30 sessions, is \$35. To receive a registration form, call the hospital's Physical Therapy Department at 499-6012, between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. weekdays.

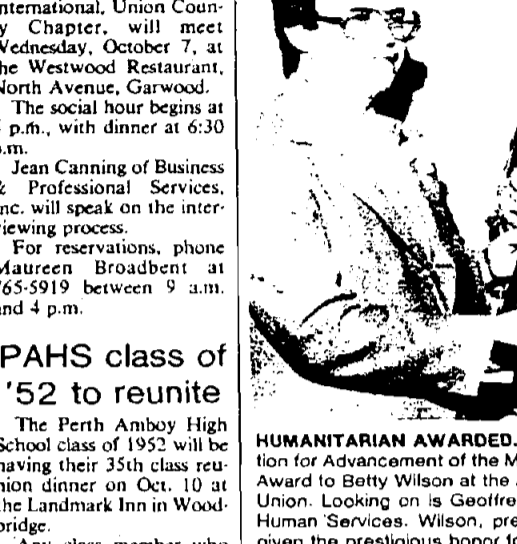

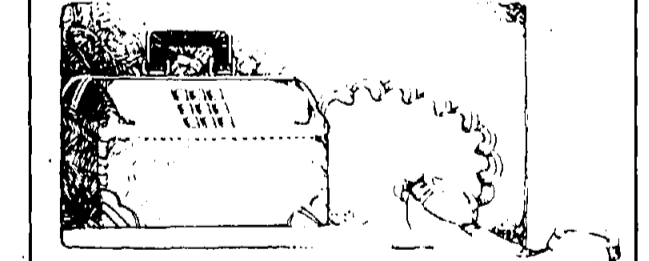

**Animal adoption bill passes the assembly**

Animal shelters would be allowed to offer for adoption any cat or dog not claimed by its owners within seven days under a bill sponsored by Assemblyman Bob Franks that was approved by the General Assembly on Sept. 10.

Franks said existing law only allows shelters to dispose of cats and dogs after seven days elapse from the time the owner is notified.

"There are many pets that are left to wander the streets because their owners no longer want them," said Franks. "Too many of these cats and dogs are put to sleep because shelters are not allowed to offer them to other families."

"This bill would allow pets who are in need of love and attention to be matched with people who want to give them these things," Franks said. "This seems like a fair trade."

The bill, A-4036, has now been sent to the Senate for its consideration.

**State House Perspective**

It's a supermarket shopper's nightmare. Groceries moving swiftly along a conveyor belt are snatched up by a cashier who quickly flips each item on its side and slides it across an electronic thingamajig. The machine beeps as the price flickers across the register and you wonder whether that box of corn flakes you picked up in aisle six really did cost \$2.19 — or are you getting the cereal combined with the oatmeal in aisle seven?

If the corn flakes have a price sticker, you could simply check the box against the register tape to find out if the "electronic scanner" has made a mistake. But, in this store, the cereal box doesn't have a price sticker.

As the groceries continue moving by and the machine keeps beeping away, you wonder whether you should ask the clerk to stop the conveyor belt and walk over to aisle six to check the price on the shelf where the corn flakes are. No, better not, you decide. That would really cause a scene. The shoppers behind you look like they're in a hurry. The machine's probably right anyway, you tell yourself.

But is the machine really right?

The State Division of Consumer Affairs did a study that estimated New Jersey consumers lose \$13 million a year because their groceries do not carry price stickers that can be checked against the amount ringed up by electronic scanners. On the average, the division says, 27 cents of every \$100 spent at the supermarket represents an overcharge to consumers.

That's why Senator Frank Pallone Jr.'s bill to require all supermarkets to plainly mark prices on products is so important to New Jersey families. The bill, S-1455, which won Senate approval on August 6, prescribes a basic minimum of every \$100 spent at the supermarket represents an overcharge to consumers.

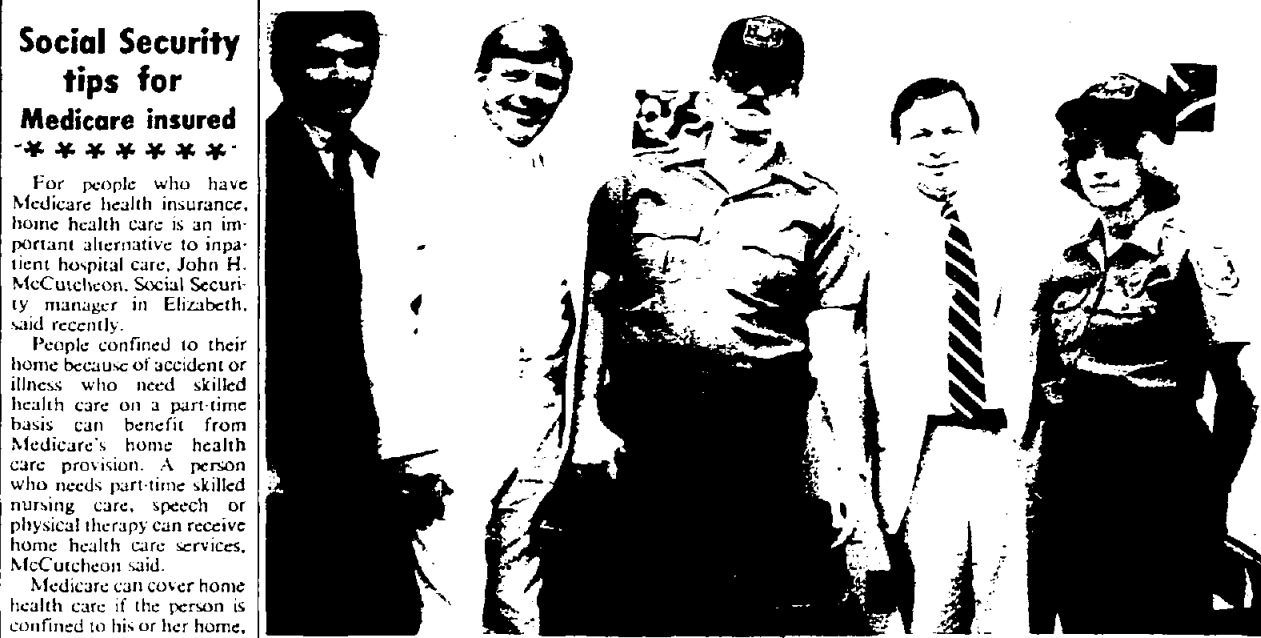
