# Marsh indicted for bribery

Second Ward Councilman John Marsh was indicted Tuesday for "commercial bribery" by a state grand jury.

According to wire service reports, Marsh, along with a defunct fuel company and its chief executive officer, were indicted on charges including bribery and theft of about \$5.6 million in bank funds. Attorney General W. Cary Edwards said.

Named in the indictment were R.K.D. Oil, Inc., which had offices in Little Ferry, its chief executive officer Daniel F. Jackson, 46, of Milltown, and John

Marsh, 54, a former mayor of Rahway.

Criminal Justice Director Donald Belsore said that from June 30, 1982 and July 1, 1983, R.K.D. entered into a loan agreement with Maryland National Industrial Finance Corporation. The loan was secured by a mortgage on the Little Ferry property.

The bank later learned Jackson had misrepresented oil inventories in R.K.D.'s financial reports and that the company received advances against the bank loan totaling \$5.6 million, to which it was not entitled, the indictment said.

The indictment also alleged that in late 1979, Jackson proposed to John Steflick, a supervisor at Barry Lu's cookie and biscuit company in Elizabeth, that he pre-sign metered oil delivery tickets. The indictment alleged that Jackson received and split nearly \$285,000 in illegal payments with Steflick and others. Steflick was sentenced to three years in prison for his role in the alleged scheme.

The indictment against Marsh alleges that while he was a plant engineer at Cosmair, Inc., a cosmetics manufacturer in Clark, he accepted \$5,958 as a

kickback for purchasing oil from R.K.D. R.K.D. was charged with theft by deception, Jackson was charged with conspiracy and two counts of misconduct by a corporate official and theft by deception, and Marsh was charged with commercial bribery. Commercial bribery is punishable by up to five years imprisonment and \$7,500 fine.

Rahway City Attorney Louis Raimone said if Marsh is convicted he would be automatically disqualified from serving as councilman. Marsh was unavailable for comment.

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## Liver foundation honors Vagelos

The American Liver Foundation presented its Distinguished Service Award to Dr. P. Roy Vagelos, chairman and chief executive officer of Merck & Co., Inc., for his achievements in biomedical research at its first annual award banquet last week at the Sheraton Centre Hotel and Towers, New York City.

Robert H. Hansen, chairman of the board of the American Liver Foundation, said that the award will be presented each year to a man or woman who has made an outstanding contribution to humanity.

Dr. Vagelos was honored for his outstanding leadership in the development of prescription medications which have had a significant impact on the health of the nation.

In particular, the American Liver Foundation is recognizing Dr. Vagelos' development of the world's first genetically engineered human vaccine, which offers protection against hepatitis B, a liver disease that can lead to cirrhosis and liver cancer.

Dr. Vagelos joined Merck Sharp & Dohme Research Laboratories in 1975 as senior vice president for research. In 1985 he was elected president and chief executive officer of Merck & Co., and the following

year was also elected chairman of the Board of Directors.

Earlier in his career, he was with the National Heart Institute and at the University of Pennsylvania (A.B.) and Columbia University (M.D.), he has received honorary Doctor of Science degrees from Washington University, Brown University and the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey.

The American Liver Foundation is a national non-profit health agency formed to combat the full array of liver diseases through research, education and self-help groups.
