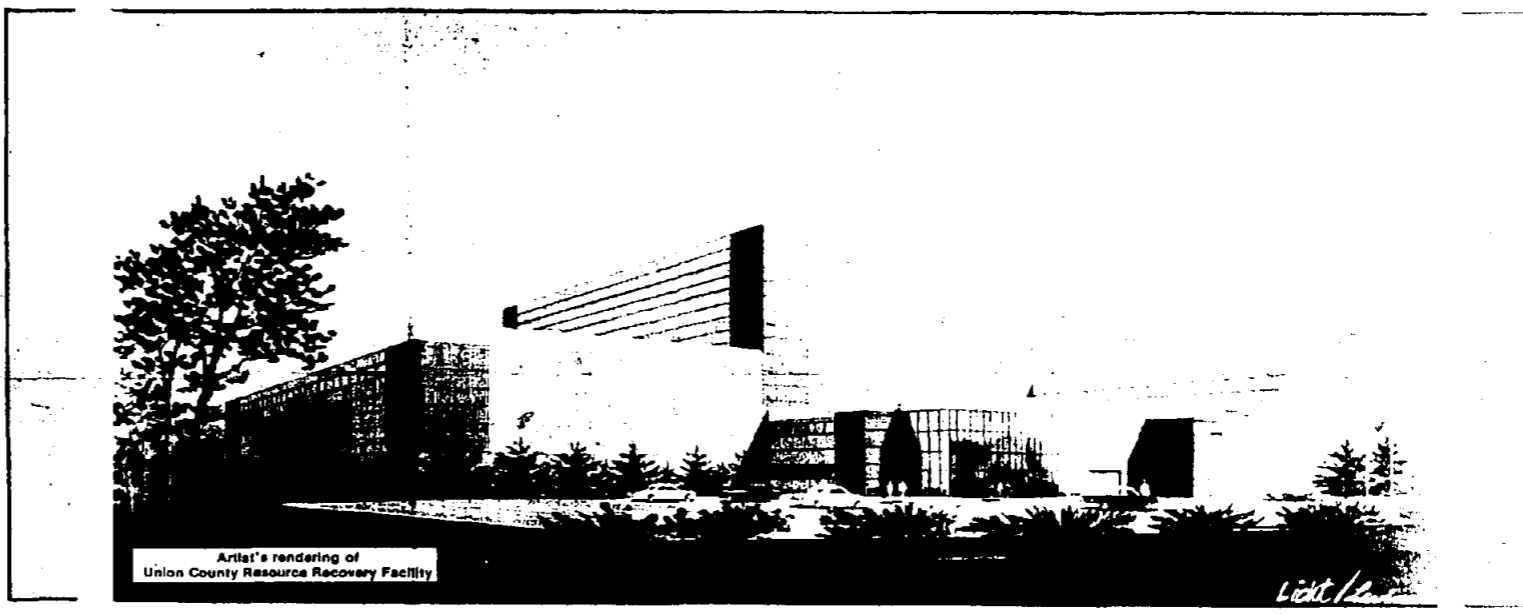

## City to begin negotiations for property reevaluations

Rahway's Municipal Council approved a resolution authorizing the negotiation of an agreement for a City-wide reevaluation at their regular meeting held last week.

Rahway is under a court order to begin reevaluation of all residential and commercial properties by 1989, said Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett. Procedures will begin in 1988 but will not take effect

in homeowners' tax bills until 1989. Properties are currently assessed at approximately 40 percent of their value for tax purposes. After reevaluation, properties will be assessed at 100 percent evaluation. The resolution approved by the council directs the city attorney and tax assessor to negotiate terms and conditions of an agreement with Certified Valuations, Inc., Randolph, the low bidder for the reevaluation at \$339,700. Formal execution of an agreement cannot take place until the adoption of a temporary budget in January of 1988. Certified Valuations, Inc., has also done reevaluations in Springfield, Westfield, Cranford and Berkeley Heights, according to Hartnett. "If we had the choice of any firm in the state, this is the firm we would want," said Hartnett.



## Utilities Authority chooses firm to build resource recovery plant

The Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) last week authorized the execution of contracts with Ogdin Martin Systems, Inc. of Fairfield, N.J., for the construction and operation of Union County's resource recovery facility.

The plant, to be located on a 23-acre parcel off Route 1 in Rahway, will convert approximately 437,000 tons of waste each year from 21 Union County municipalities into electricity, which will be sold to an electrical utility.

UCUA Chairman Kenneth L. MacRitchie stated that, "The approval of construction and service contracts with Ogdin Martin represents a milestone in the Utilities Authority's efforts to solve Union County's solid waste disposal problems. We are delighted to have reached an agreement on this critical component of the solid waste management plan and look forward to proceeding with the resource recovery project as expeditiously as possible."

passed on a voter referendum — a signal that Rahway residents recognize the role of waste-to-energy in solving the solid waste disposal problem. We will spare no effort in ensuring that the confidence placed in us by Rahway citizens is totally justified."

In a 1985 referendum, Rahway residents voted 55 percent to 45 percent in favor of allowing their city to become the host community for Union County's resource recovery facility. Under a host municipality agreement negotiated among the Utilities Authority, the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders and the Rahway City Council last year, Rahway will receive yearly minimum payments of \$1,115,200 plus inflation adjustments.

In addition, the city will receive an up-front payment of \$650,000 for community projects and recreational programs. More than thirty other provisions regarding issues such as truck traffic, environmental controls, architectural design and purchase of local utilities must also be honored under the agreement.

As the selected vendor, Ogdin Martin must give preference in hiring and job training to Rahway and Union County residents. The company will also be encouraged to purchase materials from city businesses and participate in neighborhood and civic organizations. The design and construction cost of the resource recovery facility will be approximately \$107 million (based on 1987 dollars), although payments made during the construction period will be adjusted according to an inflation index. The facility will be publicly owned by the Utilities Authority and will be financed through tax-exempt bonds, taxable bonds and funds accrued under the state resource recovery investment tax. According to UCUA Executive Director Joseph E. Kazar, major permit applications, including a final environmental and health impact statement, will be submitted to the state Department of Environmental Protection in November. "After permit approval, a notice to proceed with construction will be issued to Ogdin Martin. The construction agreement stipulates that the plant must meet all permit requirements and pass an acceptance test for performance within 31 months," he stated. Under the service agreement, Ogdin Martin will operate the plant for 20 years. The facility will accept residential and non-hazardous commercial waste exclusively from Union County municipalities six days a week, Monday through Saturday. Waste will be processed 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The plant will produce approximately 40 megawatts of electricity, most of which will be sold to an electrical utility.



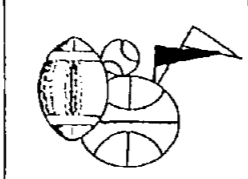

## Council approves moratorium on building requests

A moratorium on applications for the development of townhouses and condominiums was approved for final adoption by Rahway's City Council at a meeting held on October 13.

The 90-day moratorium was approved due to the influx of applications for new construction of townhouses and condominiums in the City.

The moratorium is designed to hold applications until zoning ordinances can be formulated and enacted. Present zoning laws only cover one family dwellings, according to Council President Vincent Addona.

The council also approved a resolution authorizing the mayor and city clerk to enter into an agreement with the Middlesex County Health Department for air

pollution and emergency response services. According to the agreement, the health department would respond to Rahway's air pollution and hazardous materials complaints services would be \$4,000 per year and the charge for hazardous waste emergency response services would be \$4,000.

The county Public Health Officer will supervise and direct all air pollution and hazardous material emergency response activities and personnel serving Rahway. The contract is for a term of two years.

A resolution to Union County regarding a leaf collection site was also approved by the council. The resolution requests the following priority in the use of a leaf disposal facility. The host community or communities; county government; those municipalities which have agreed to work with and be part of the county's recycling program.

Union county has indicated that, as part of its responsibility to implement a district solid waste management plan, it is seeking a central site or sites for leaf disposal in the county.

Rahway residents have been directed to take their leaves into the street for future pickup. The council also approved a resolution opposing the nomination of Robert Rork to the United States Supreme Court.

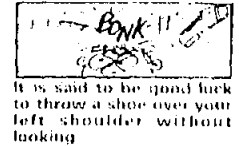
**Garbage talk is planned**

**Fulcomer: Rahway has highest property tax rate**

Rahway has the highest property tax rate in Union County at 6.89 dollars per hundred dollars of evaluation according to the 1987 statistics compiled by the Union County Board of Taxation, which were released recently by Freeholder James J. Fulcomer of Rahway.

"Of the twenty municipalities in our county that use the same taxation system as Rahway, Rahway has the highest tax rate in our county. The cause of this dubious distinction is the very high taxes levied for Rahway's municipal purposes (not school) budget controlled by the Democrat mayor and council. This extremely high tax rate is one reason why the Republican minority on our city council refused to support the adoption of this high tax city budget and why more economic policies are needed in Rahway," said Freeholder Fulcomer.

Freeholder Fulcomer said that while Rahway raises millions of tax dollars less for the education of its children, the Democrat mayor and council raise millions of dollars more for

municipal purposes taxes (not schools) compared to other municipalities in Rahway's population category.

Compared to the three other municipalities in Rahway's population category, Rahway raised in municipal purposes taxes \$2,768,216.00 more than Cranford, \$2,115,254.95 more than Summit, and \$2,356,471.49 more than Westfield, reported the freeholder.

Rahway leads the county with a 1987 tax rate of 6.89 dollars per hundred dollars of evaluation. The rate of the other municipalities in the county with the same taxation system are: Springfield, 2.02; Westfield, 2.19; Mountainside, 2.22; New Providence, 2.30; Clark, 2.47; Summit, 2.65; Garwood, 2.68; Berkeley Heights, 2.84; Scotch Plains, 2.84; Linden, 3.32;

Fanwood, 3.66; Roselle Park, 3.81; Kenilworth, 4.53; Elizabeth, 5.67; Roselle, 5.77; Cranford, 5.89; and Plainfield, 6.72, he reported.
