

Stock Market 'crash' cited

Corporate Center hits new snag

The proposed Rahway Corporate Center faces another hurdle due to the collapse of its financial commitments.

The partially-developed 14-acre site located in back of City Hall was to be sold at a foreclosure sale on November 11 due to non-payment, according to Joseph LaMountain, presi-

dent of Reliance Savings and Loan Association, the lending institution for the property.

Two weeks ago, Daniel Colangelo, of Clark, declared bankruptcy which now freezes any creditors from taking action.

In a letter to council members dated October 29, Business Administrator

Joseph Hartnett said the City, along with Community Development Director Thomas Connell, had "successfully facilitated negotiations with the lending institution, the original developer and a new development group that were to lead to a complete resolution to the situation." On Monday, however, negotiations broke down.

Hartnett said among the factors that led to a halt to negotiations was the "crash" of the stock market last month. "This calamitous event had a chilling effect on what we were trying to accomplish and particularly destroyed the confidence of the new group as to the investment and financial aspects," he said. "Saying that the site re-

mains "totally viable for positive development," Hartnett said the project will be marketed and will continue. "We just have to get through these difficulties," he said. "We are re-examining all possibilities because it is complicated, but there is no question that there are developers who are interested." Hartnett said a decision must now be made whether

to market the remaining nine acres alone or the entire 14 acres including the half-constructed office building on a five-acre site. The Rahway Corporate Center is a projected \$30 million project including a 150-room hotel with a conference center, catering facilities and over 200,000 square feet of corporate office space.

NAACP awards banquet to be held tomorrow

The Community Service Award will be presented to Robert L. Brown, first Black principal of Rahway High School, and former vice principal of Rahway Junior High School.

Mr. Brown is a member of the J.F.K. Community Center Board of Directors and the Union County Juvenile Conference Committee. He is credited with participating in a project which developed a program of Black studies in the Rahway Public Schools.

He is married to the former Sandra Harding. They have two children, Kenneth and Kim.

The Hall of Fame Award will be presented to Mrs. Lillian Hannibal for her past and continuous contributions to the history and

culture of the City of Rahway. She has served the Rahway Public Library board of trustees for the past twenty years as president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. A popular speaker and exhibitor on the Black Experience, she is listed in two Directories of Speakers.

Senator Clifford P. Case has been chosen to receive, posthumously, a Hall of Fame Award. He began his career as a councilman with the City of Rahway in 1937, moving on to the New Jersey Assembly, U.S. House of Representatives, and was Senator for 24 years.

Senator Case was one of the bipartisan floor managers of the landmark Civil Rights Act of 1964.

The Armed Service Award will be presented, posthumously, to Pfc. Myron Ross III. He attended Rahway schools and joined the Marine Corps in 1968. Pfc. Ross was killed October 3, 1968 in Vietnam

of multiple fragmentation wounds.

He was presented the Purple Heart and the Bronze Star. Ross was a rifleman with Company G, Second Battalion, 26th Marines, Ninth Marine Amphibious Brigade. He was killed while trying to rescue two fallen men in an open area during battle.

His mother, Mrs. Lee Ross, will accept the award for her son.

Guest speaker at the awards banquet will be The Reverend Arlene H. Churn, pastor of the Cathedral of Faith Baptist Church, Camden. Rev. Churn has served as chairman of the plenary session of the White House Conference on Children. She has been featured in Ebony Magazine, and gives lectures frequently across the country.

Video promotes campaign

Rahway Day Care Center finds Main Street home

Filming began on Monday to kick off a capital campaign to raise money for a new home for the Rahway Day Care Center.

Judi Munsey, Director of the Center presently located in the Columbian School on New Brunswick Avenue, said a video will be made to be used in the corporate segment to solicit donations to help in purchasing a new building.

The Rahway Day Care Center is a non-profit agency governed by a Board of Directors serving 154 youngsters from the ages of three months up to 12 years. "We are one of the few centers in Union County who serve infants," said Munsey.

The capital campaign is sponsored by United Way. The Rahway Day Care Center presently pays \$50,000 per year in rent for its facilities, according to Munsey.

"We feel it's time we had our own building," she said. "We need the equity to prevent us from passing the cost of major repairs off to the parents. With ownership we can always take a loan to offset emergencies such as heating repairs."

The Center has discussed the purchase of a building that formerly housed Robinson's Hardware Store on Main Street with the owner, Julie Madsen.

"Our offer has been accepted and will sign the contracts this week," said Munsey. "We have affection for the school we are in and hate to see our last old school not have children, but it's time to grow. Like a married couple, it's time to have our first home."

Columbian School is owned by Rahway resident Eric Rickes, said Munsey.

Merchants downtown have been supportive of the purchase, said Munsey. "Merchants can expect about 200 ready-made customers in and out of the building daily," she said. "We run year-round which should increase sales especially in the summer months."

The Rahway Day Care Center has been housed in the Columbian School for the past five years. They spent 10 years previous to that housed in the First Baptist Church.

The video will be used as a marketing tool to raise

donations and is being filmed by a professional production company, Renna Productions, from Springfield.

"We are hopeful, especially in Rahway, that people will be supportive of our efforts particularly because it will help everyone downtown," said Munsey.

Merck and Company has promised to support the making of the video and Munsey pointed to their past endeavors on behalf of the Rahway Day Care Center. "Merck has always been very supportive and the Center is very much relying on their commitment to the children of Rahway. We've had a Merck employee on our Board of Directors for 15 years."

If the move is successful, Robinson's will be converted into usable space for classrooms on the main floor, a kitchen, dining room and all-purpose room in the basement and administrative offices, with the kindergarten and the computer program on the second floor.

Ryan inducted into honorary society

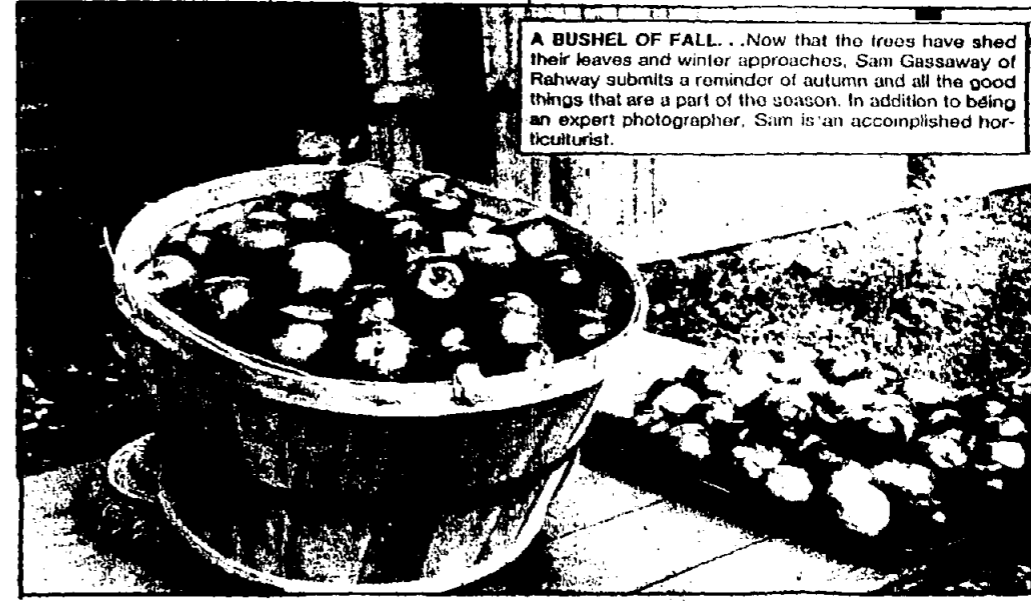

Maguires begin trek home

Editors Note: Following is the fifth in a series on the trip of William Maguire and his wife, Mrs. Doris Maguire, of Clark, on a freighter cruise from Montreal to Antwerp, Belgium. Mr. Maguire is a former Mayor of Clark, and former Freeholder, Freeholder Director, Assemblyman, and assistant to George Albanese, Head of the Department of Human Resources. Maguire retired in 1984.

Our replacement Chief Engineer, Jerz Sikora, sort of "backed" into his profession, if you will. After World War II many Poles, both male and female, were arrested and brought to Russia by that demon, Stalin. Jerz's father was one of these people shipped to Communist Russia.

Jerz was only 12 years old at the time and conditions in Poland were pathetic — no jobs, food shortages, in many cases their homes were destroyed, clothing was ragged and dirty, and feet were wrapped in newspapers and rags.

In addition to all this misery, his young mother with three other children was ill and with no money. A year later Jerz was in need of the opportunity to go to a Merchant Marine School. He jumped at the chance as it meant food, clothing and a warm bed. It also gave him the opportunity to occasionally get food for his family as his word was heard from his father.

The family never knew why their father was arrested, or, indeed, whether he was still alive. Almost 12 years to the day he was shipped to Russia, he was returned home and he was never told why he was torn away from his family.

The trend, worldwide, appears to be that the salary paid is commensurate with the crew member's home country. There are no unions in Eastern block countries. This puts American flagships between a rock and a hard place. They must pay several hundred percent more to our crew members than other countries pay. This fact has all but destroyed the American shipping industry, which is sad when you recall the role it plays in time of strife.

I have discovered that many Poles have what might be called a love hate relationship for their country. They love their own country, but hate its government and all it stands for. Two and one-half years ago the deck crew on the Otter numbered 34. Today it has only 12 crew members and the deck is full of equipment and all qualified to do their respective jobs. In spite of what we consider "short" wages, there is no shortage of Poles wanting to sail under flags other than their own.

Polish sailors must obtain permission from the government before they can leave the country and they can be away no longer than two years at one time with no assurance that they will ever sail on other than a Polish ship again.

When one considers that \$50 American dollars will comfortably support a Polish family of three for a month or more, salaries of \$400 or \$450 per month, plus overtime, means they can live with some comfort.

Although the chef's meals were pretty good, he had no experience in cake baking. The cake was a disaster! We all thanked him for his efforts because we knew he had really tried.

Once again an iceberg watch was in force. Although no visual sightings were made, over six blips appeared on the radar screen with the nearest iceberg being about 20 miles away. Under these circumstances, they are called "unidentified targets" and are so reported and logged. I didn't know until then that icebergs have names such as Growler, O.J. Jr., Small — 450 ft. Medium — 21150 ft. and Large — 151 + ft.

The St. Lawrence is really a lively body of water. Parts of the river are 20 or more miles below the surface of the water. We are approaching the Cabot Straits between Cape Breton Island and Newfoundlands where mountains are still snow covered. A beautiful sight. Tomorrow we will reach the St. Lawrence.

Approaching the city of Three Rivers, we picked up the pilot who will guide us down the river to Montreal. Our estimated time of arrival is 2:30 p.m. What a beautiful sight!

"The Sicilian"

"The Sicilian" based on a best-selling novel by Mario Puzo which functioned as an extended metaphor within his "Godfather" epic, is a long-winded bore-who only offers a dull lead performance by Christopher Lambert as the title character and some nice panoramic shots of the Sicilian countryside.

The story tells the tragic tale of one Salvatore Giuliano, a legendary, real-life Sicilian bandit who boldly opposed both the papacy and the Mafia during the corrupt and chaotic days of post World War II Italy. The progressive Giuliano was full of utopian dreams which he hoped would bring his tiny state out of the depths of despair suffered by Italy's defeat at the hands of the allies. One such plan was for the secession of Sicily from the rest of the Italian state.

Essentially a dashing "Robin Hood" type of character, it is a shame that the part was played by the somewhat unlikable French actor, Christopher Lambert. The actor who played Tarzan in the "Greystoke" films, few years back, would have been a much better choice. The "Sicilian" is so utterly dull, this film contains no spectacular sequences that open wide the eye. If anything it could prove a welcome lull for an inebriated.

Indeed, what could have amounted to a fascinating tale of a hero's larger than life "man of the people" role could have been a real treat. Make "The Sicilian" an offer that you CAN resist!

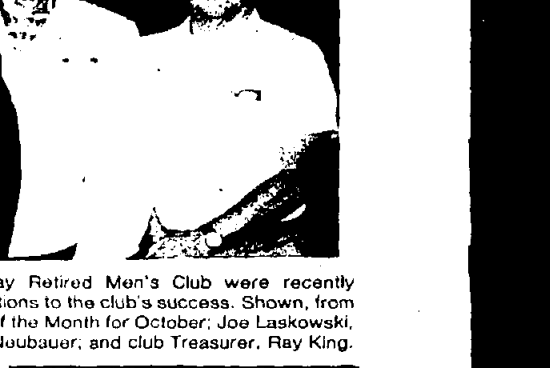

A few minutes can save a life...

American women lack a dramatic look at the life-saving capabilities of early cancer detection through mammography. Last month when a routine mammogram revealed a small tumor located in First Lady Nancy Reagan's left breast. "Mammography is a potentially lifesaving procedure that is safe, painless and takes only a few minutes to perform," explains Erica Fried, M.D., Director of Doctors Radiology Center, a Rahway Hospital affiliate located in Avenel.

"Breast cancer is a disease which develops very slowly and is without early symptoms," continued Dr. Fried. "Mammography now presents us with the capability for early detection. We can see the lesion while it is still small and limited in extent."

In addition to breast self-examination, the American Cancer Society recommends that every woman have what is known as a baseline mammogram between ages 35 and 40. Dr. Fried states that "the baseline is important because there is a lot of variation in breast appearance from woman to woman. Once an individual baseline is established, it makes it easier, as years pass, to monitor changes."

Survivor benefits payable

Social Security benefits can be paid to many survivors of workers who died after working long enough in work covered by Social Security. John H. McCutcheon, Social Security manager in Elizabeth, said recently:

These survivors include the worker's unmarried children under 18, under 19 if a full-time high school student or over 18 if disabled before reaching 22; a parent caring for a child under 16 or disabled who gets benefits; a widow or widower 60 or older, or 50 or over if severely disabled; and dependent parents 62 or older.

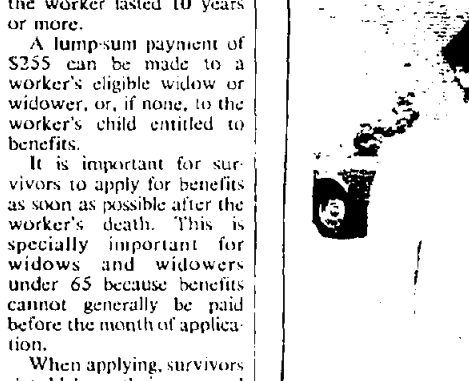
In addition, a surviving divorced spouse can generally get the same benefits as a widow or widower if the marriage to the worker lasted 10 years or longer.

A lump-sum payment of \$255 can be made to a worker's eligible widow or widower, or if none, to the worker's child entitled to benefits.

It is important for survivors to apply for benefits as soon as possible after the worker's death. This is especially important for widows and widowers under 65 because benefits cannot generally be paid before the month of application.

When applying, survivors should have their own and the worker's Social Security cards or a record of the numbers, birth certificates for any eligible children, marriage certificate, proof of the worker's death, proof of age for the widow or widower, and Form W-2 or self-employment tax return for the past year. Parents 62 or older will need to show they were dependent on the worker for their support.

Check credentials of person claiming to represent IRS

Persons posing as Internal Revenue Service employees occasionally attempt to harass taxpayers or collect money for what the IRS Internal Security Division says are bogus claims for unpaid taxes, the IRS Internal Security Division says.

Officials receive up to a dozen complaints a year from New Jersey taxpayers who have been victimized by such imposters.

However, they believe that the problem may be more serious as most such incidents are never reported.

The impersonation of a federal official is a felony, which could send a convicted individual to prison for many years.

The IRS suggests that taxpayers request to see the credentials of any individual who claims to represent the agency. Employees making public contact are required to carry distinctive identification and must show it when conducting official business.

In any event, taxpayers owing money to the IRS should contact the IRS.

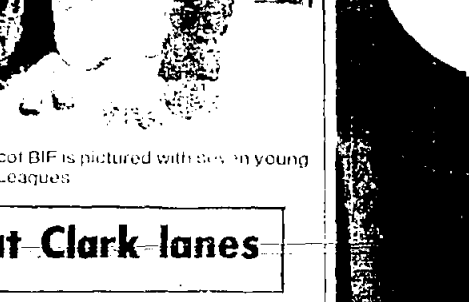

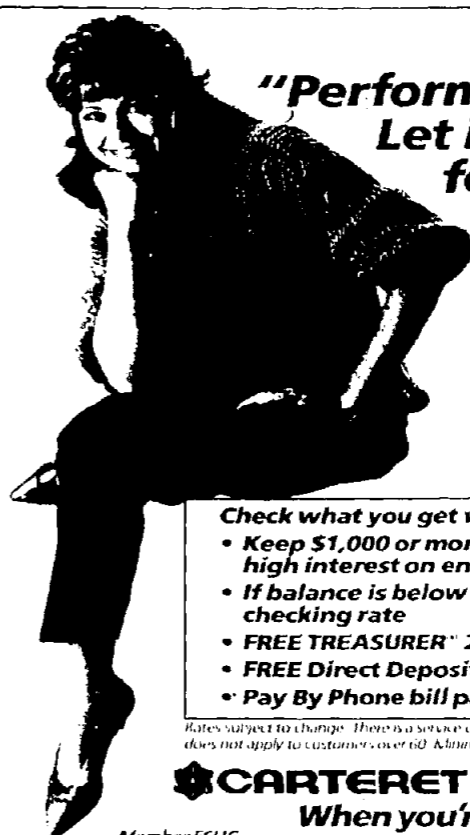
"This dinner-dance and a 'Look at Rumlle Hospital's Future' is a fitting tribute for this important milestone 75 years of providing health care to Union
