## RHS students try "hands-on" business

Economics classes at Rahway High School will once again participate in the Applied Economics program sponsored by Junior Achievement.

Students in William M. Roesch's four economics classes will obtain first-hand knowledge on how to run a business through a "hands-on" approach.

Business consultants from I.B.M. and Merck and Co., Inc. will work with

each class on a weekly basis for a period of fifteen weeks.

The students and their business consultant will organize and name a company, elect officers, sell stock certificates, select a product, assemble and market the product to sell to the general public.

Each company will have their own business checking account to pay their expenses. Rahway Savings In-

stitution and United Jersey Bank provided financial services last year.

At the conclusion of the fifteen-week period, each student company will liquidate, and individuals who purchase a share of stock will receive their original \$2 investment plus a "healthy" dividend.

In addition, students will have an opportunity to work with an IBM pc computer to calculate various

prices, costs and expenses. The computer was donated last year by Merck and Co., Inc.

The four companies last year, Rainbow Enterprises, R and B Productions, Senior Productions and Non-Stop Productions were all successful in returning a dividend to their stockholders. Student workers and officers gained valuable knowledge on the ups and downs of organizing and running a business for a profit.

"I hope that this year's students will enjoy the same type of success," said

Roesch, who attended a valuable training session with the business consultants this past summer.

Junior Achievement will provide a notebook and workbook that will serve as a supplement to the students' regular classroom responsibilities.

This year's business consultants include Elaine Needham, systems engineer, from IBM; Kenneth Johnson, associate marketing research analyst; Bill Simpson, senior purchasing agent and Mike Kelly, Research, all from Merck and Co., Inc.

## Rahway parents attend Gifted/Talented evening

chaeologist, whose lecture and slide presentation spotlighted the Lenape Indians of New Jersey. Professor Kraft, President-elect of the Middle Atlantic Archaeological Society, has written over 120 books and articles.

His most recent publication is entitled "The Lenape Indians of New Jersey," with units ranging from fourth grade to high school levels.

Dr. Kraft's talk was an example of the type of activity from which gifted students receive academic enrichment outside of the regular curriculum.

The evening concluded with refreshments provided by the Intermediate School P.T.O., which was represented by Mrs. Linda Horvath, the organization's president.

An aide's position has been approved by the Board of Education at last week's meeting which will allow a full-time nurse in each of Rahway's elementary schools.

The board approved a motion to create and post an aide's position for 5 1/4 hours a day to work primarily at the High

School's nurse's office. Previously, nurses had been assigned to the High School from elementary schools to help with the work load.

The new aide's position will allow the nurses to return to their primary elementary schools and to the Intermediate School.

## Students improve testing scores

Student scores have "increased tremendously" on the High School Proficiency Test (HSPT) according to 1986-87 school year results announced at the Board of Education meeting held last week.

The HSPT has been a state-mandated graduation requirement since 1985-86 testing achievement levels in reading, writing and math skills.

The test is given in April to ninth graders who must pass it in order to graduate. If a student fails any portion of the test in ninth grade, he or she is given remedial education in that skill area and is allowed to

take the test again in the tenth, eleventh or twelfth grade.

"There has been a tremendous increase across the board in all areas," said Alice DeSanto, Director of Student Personnel Services, in a presentation of test results to the board.

Results of Iowa tests in grades K-8, HSPT scores in grade 9 and Tests of Achievement and Proficiency (TAP) in grades 10-11 throughout a five-year period were included in the program. "Students are at or above grade level in all achievements this year," said DeSanto.

Calling the test results the "nuts and bolts of our business," Superintendent

of Schools Frank Brunette said that 1987 results showed that students scored above the national norm in every one of 39 areas of testing.

Test results in 1983 showed 10 out of the 39 areas scored below the national norm, he said.

In 1986-87, 86.2 percent of the students achieved a passing grade in reading, 86.1 percent achieved a passing grade in writing and 64.6 percent achieved a passing grade in math.

The passing level set by the State Department of Education for 1986-87 was 75 percent in reading, 77 percent in writing and 61 percent in math, said Adele Magnolia, Supervisor of

Curriculum and Instruction.

In 1985-86, the first year the test was used as a graduation requirement, 76 percent passed in reading, 71 percent passed in writing and 57 percent passed in math.

Scores for the 1987-88 school year will have to meet a standard of a 75 percent passing rate in each of the three areas to achieve certification in the Department of Education's Level 1 monitoring. The 1986-87 standard was a 60 percent passing rate.

"We've come a long way," said Magnolia, "but there is still a long way to go."

## Funding approved for summer school

The Rahway Board of Education funded a summer school program for both the High School and the Intermediate School at last week's meeting.

A motion approving a remedial/enrichment summer school program at the High School was approved at a cost not to exceed \$13,130.

The program will include make-up courses in English, social studies and physical education and health and will run 60 hours. Enrich-

ment courses, non-credited, include Computers I, Computers 2, Word Processing, Theatre Arts, Mechanical Drawing, HSPT Preparation and SAT Preparation at a tuition cost of \$30 each.

"This year we are also recommending two advanced courses," said Assistant Superintendent of Schools Nicholas Delmonaco. "Geometry 202B and Algebra 102B will be offered for 30 days, at four hours a day, for a total number of course hours of 120."

This will be the first time a remedial summer school program will be offered for seventh and eighth graders at the Intermediate School, said Delmonaco.

Cost of the program is not to exceed \$5,400 and will cover basic subjects such as English, reading and mathematics to remediate students in preparation for the HSPT, said Delmonaco.

In other business the board:

—Submitted a proposal for funding under the Education for Economic Security Act in the amount of \$2,370.88.

—Approved the addition of an Adult School course call Concert Series: Barber Shop Quartet, Piano

Recital, Other (with approval of Central Administration).

—Granted permission to the Chapter 1 Parent Advisory Council to solicit donations for the yearly activities of the pre-school program.

—Approved the contract between the Rahway Board of Education and the Union County Educational Services Commission to provide instructional services to St. Mary's Elementary School under Chapter 1 program in grades K-1 for the 1987-88 school year, fully federally-funded.

—Approved final payment to Park Construction Co., Rutherford, in the amount of \$1,500 for window replacement work completed at the High School.

—Approved payment to Martinez Sun Electric Co., Newark, in the amount of \$14,391 for light fixture replacement at Roosevelt School, the Intermediate School and the High School.

—Approved payment to Tami-Githens, Inc., Woodbridge, in the amount of \$54,408.60 for work completed on the boiler replacement project at Franklin School.

**Clark loyalty commended**

I want to thank the veterans of Clark American Legion Post 328, Foreign Wars Post 7363, Disabled American Veterans Post 14, the Clark Volunteer Fire Department, Police Department, Volunteer First Aid Squad, Knights of Columbus, Elk Boys Scout Troop 145, Winfield Clark Girl Scouts town dignitaries, and all of the mothers, fathers and grandparents, and residents of Clark who braved the rain and snow and low temperatures on Veterans Day to pay tribute to the fifteen Clark residents who paid the supreme sacrifice defending our country during the Vietnam, Korean Conflict and World War II.

As a Clark resident, I have been involved in the Clark Central Veterans Committee from the day I joined the American Legion. I am a native of Perth Amboy, entered the service at 18 and but for the grace of God, during a skirmish on Iwo Jima, my name could have been listed on the Perth Amboy Veterans Monument. Through the years following World War II I have seldom mentioned my combat experiences, but one incident has always been very vivid which I would like to mention.

During a skirmish on Iwo, a flame-thrower operator was called up to an area to knock out a cave. An infantry man told me approximately the location of the cave and as I looked around my vantage point, I could not see the cave. When I moved back and asked him to give me a better direction, he stepped up and at that time a shot rang out. It ricocheted off the wall and fatally struck the infantryman. This could have happened to me seconds make the difference.

My purpose for telling you this is not to relive my war years, but to tell you "why" and "how" the war monument... (one Broadway, Clark)... bothers me. Not only on Veterans Day and Memorial Day, but for many years. With each succeeding year I feel that we have denied the fifteen young people whose names are engraved on this monument a decent Memorial Service... these young people who gave their lives so that we could all live in a free world.

I sincerely feel that it is time that we, and I do not mean only the veterans' organizations, I mean all of us - veterans, Town Council, families of the deceased, and all organizations make a concerted effort to make this site worthy or move the monument to the location which has been discussed and designated by the Central Veterans Committee.

I would like to see the monument moved from its obscure position on Broadway to the much traveled Westfield Avenue in front of the Arthur L. Johnson High School. The much traveled location would be available at this site and the monument could be seen every day by the students of the Clark school.

They may decide to get involved. A much needed hugger every Memorial Day and Veterans Day could be held, a few members by the high school band would help. An invitation to the surrounding schools who have ROTC programs could be beneficial. Organizations who have never participated are always welcome. I'm hoping the 1988 programs will be much improved and grow stronger in future years.

In 1955, when tensions were high between the communist black nations and the western democracies, President Eisenhower suggested a *defente* between East and West. This French word had been adopted and brought into common usage earlier by European diplomats.

The word *defente* originally described several mechanical devices including "the catch, or part of a crossbow that stops or releases movement of a missile."

The political sense of *defente* is "a relaxing or easing of tensions between nations." Its origin is the Latin word *defendere*, which literally means "to release."

*Defente* becomes especially meaningful when one considers it in the context of the untold destruction made possible by today's high technology warfare. There can be no more of a meaning for *defente* than "to relax tensions" between nations and, thereby, to prevent the unthinkable: the release of atomic missiles by nations against each other.

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Here's news that erupts with interest: when active, the Parícutin volcano in Central Mexico could spew four million pounds of rock and lava into the air in one minute.

## A tribute to a Rahway legacy — Monsignor Buttner

Not too long ago, if you wanted to find out why the three "Peanuts" in the river, you needed only to ring the doorbell of the rectory of St. Mark's Church on Hamilton Street in Rahway. You would have been greeted by the always smiling and cordial Father Buttner who surely would have related one of his hundreds of "stories" to you during the course of your conversation.

Everyone who knew Monsignor Buttner can speak of his kindness and his generosity toward people. He always made you feel comfortable in his presence and he used his "little stories" as a way to put you at ease. At any testimonial, civic dinner, or even religious function, Monsignor Buttner could always be counted on to tell some of his admittedly "corny jokes." Even if it was the tenth or hundredth time you heard them, you couldn't help laughing along with him, especially seeing the sheer delight he got out of telling them. Even into his eighties, Monsignor Buttner would insist on giving you letters how to practice to get the proper delivery. And who couldn't be proud if yours was one of the names he used in his many little "stories"?

When Father Buttner came to St. Mark's in 1941, he came to a small parish struggling along during the World War II years. His was not merely a job of giving encouragement and consolation to his congregation, but a vocation which was a lifetime of dedication and service to God's people.

He was a good pastor, welcoming the "new" parishioners, visiting the sick, burying the dead, but all done in his unique, loving style. Countless families in Saint Mark's have hundreds of photographs, slides and movies about the years with Fr. Buttner baptizing their babies, celebrating a child's First Holy Communion, participating at Confirmation or performing a wedding ceremony. He prided himself on remembering who was born to each family, which was no easy task as the parish grew to over 700 families during his lifetime.

He experienced many changes during his lifetime, some in his parish, some in his country. Yet, in all things, from Vatican II to Parish Councils, from installing air conditioning to purchasing parking lot property, Monsignor Buttner carried on patiently and harmoniously.

He was a devout man. In the letter to the Hebrews in the New Testament we read that "every high priest chosen from among men is appointed to act on behalf of men in relation to God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins." For Charles Buttner, the priest, his trust in God and his service to people were inseparable beliefs. He was quietly effective, too, helping struggling families, working to evangelize, helping his parishioners become more holy. He didn't need publicity to make people know about him — he was known and admired by people all through the state. Even when Archbishop Iland honored him by naming him Monsignor in the year that St. Mark's celebrated its 100th anniversary, he remained that humble, lovable man who always smiled and told those jokes.

It perhaps not without significance that Monsignor Charles F. Buttner died on the Feast of All Saints, November 1st, 1987, a little over one month after celebrating his 85th birthday with the people he loved.

So at this season of Thanksgiving, let each one of us remember who had the honor and privilege to have known this humorous, devout and saintly man, give thanks to God for having given us his gift, whom we know as Monsignor Charles F. Buttner.
