Rahway agencies benefit

United Way awards \$270,000 in grants

The United Way of Eastern Union County has announced that grants totaling some \$270,000 have been awarded as part of the United Way's 100th anniversary celebration. The monies will be distributed to United Way member and non-member agencies who fill the criteria set by the United Way Board of Directors.

These awards are divided into four categories: Venture Grants, for the implementation of new programs to meet emerging or unmet human service needs in the community; Capital Projects, to increase the technical capabilities of agencies through the purchase of equipment such as computers and typewriters; Program Expansion Grants, to increase the service level of existing programs; and the Outreach Fund, where non-member agencies receive "one time" grants.

The Venture Grants went to the Alternative Living Project, American Red Cross of Eastern Union County, the Elizabethport Presbyterian Center, Ca-

tholic Community Services, Union County Office, and both the YMCA and YWCA of Eastern Union County.

The Capital Projects were awarded to the Center for Infant Development, Community Coordinated Child Care, Washington Rock Girl Scout Council, Jewish Family Services, Our House, Puerto Rican Organization for Community Economic and Educational Development (P.R.O.C.E.E.D.), Rahway Community Action Organization, Rahway Day Care, Roselle Day Care, The Salvation Army, Spaulding for Children, Summit Child Care, and the County YM/YWHA of Union County.

Some of the agencies who received Program Expansion Grants are the Association for the Advancement of the Mentally Handicapped, the YMCA of Rahway and Bridgewater House. These awards will institute an educational program sensitizing the families of the formerly institutionalized to the special needs of the mentally handicapped and help establish a home

for battered women, among many new or previously under-served sectors of our communities.

The Outreach Fund extended United Way funding to the Morningstar Agency, the Interfaith Council to House the Homeless and Visiting Home Care. These non-United Way agencies are either new agencies who haven't existed long enough to meet United Way's two year organizational requirement, or agencies who have, for one reason or another, never sought United Way funding.

The Centennial Grants are just one of the programs sponsored this year to celebrate United Way's 100th birthday. "1987 marks 100 years of service by United Way," stated Easton-Union County United Way Board President Christopher Armstrong, Esq., a Rahway resident. "The United Way of Eastern Union County is proud to offer these grants to human service agencies so they can increase the invaluable service they provide. This is our 'birthday' present to them and the community.

Rahway Geriatrics Center "challenges" new director

Jeffrey Schwartz is young "only in chronological years," but he brings a great deal of enthusiasm to his new position as director of the Rahway Geriatrics Center. Originally from Brooklyn, Schwartz, 27, obtained a Bachelor's Degree in Economics from Brooklyn College and a Master's Degree in Hospital and Public Administration from New York University. As his thesis he developed a nursing home program for Jersey City Medical Center.

He has been employed in the health care industry as an assistant administrator and administrator for the past eight years and has worked in Edison for the past five years. Newly married, Schwartz lives in Edison.

Calling the health care industry "challenging and competitive," Schwartz is still confident that he made the right career decision. "It is pretty much a hard field to get into," he said. "Because the nursing home industry has evolved in the past years due to state and federal regulations. Resi-

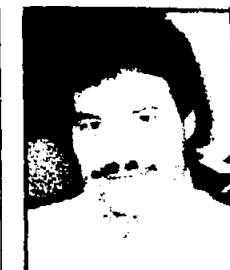
dents are getting much older with more chronic diseases and they have to be taken care of. It has to be done by someone who knows what is going on."

The Rahway Geriatrics Center is located at 1777 Lawrence Street. Opened in December of 1983, the center is a 120-bed skilled nursing care facility which employs over 100 in staff, an almost one-to-one ratio.

It is an independently run, non-profit organization governed by a Board of Directors that includes Frank Crue as president, Joseph Salay as vice president and James Daly, Ruby Scott, Mayor Daniel Martin, Councilman Max Sheld and Jack McGrath as board members.

"The board consists of members of the community who are very much interested in the care of the people of Rahway," said Schwartz. "They are very motivated, very intelligent people who have a big heart."

One of Jeffrey Schwartz's goals is an Alzheimer's Unit with a special program for Alzheimer patients. "We are just beginning to semi-

understand what Alzheimer's disease is," said Schwartz. "We need separate programs for these individuals to protect them and others in the facility — a program geared towards activities during the day when they have a tendency to wander." Such a unit and program will be the first in Rahway, said Schwartz.

Another goal on the way to realization is the forming of more committees and better communication. "If we don't communicate, nothing gets done," said Schwartz.

Schwartz has already made his first three months as director of the Rahway Geriatrics Center count in long range plans and short term goals. "At the present time, we have an excellent reputation in the community as a progressive nursing facility," he said. "We are planning to make Rahway one of the best in the state."

Merck restructures South African operations

Merck & Co. Inc. has announced it has restructured its business in South Africa. It has sold its South African operations to a subsidiary of Barlow Rand Limited and entered into long-term agreements with that company that will assure the continued availability, reliability, and growth of Merck's expanding line of human and animal health products.

The details of the sale were not announced. Merck's South African subsidiary, MSD (Pty) Ltd., employs 283 people, including 76 blacks and eight Asians. The firm's business in South Africa traces to 1917, and currently it markets some 40 prescription pharmaceuticals and several major animal health and veterinary products.

Barlow Rand Limited is a diversified company with numerous businesses in the fields of mining and minerals, industrial operations, food, and international operations and had 1987 sales of \$5.3 billion. Its business includes pharmaceutical operations, through Adeco Inc., which markets hospital products such as intravenous solutions and equipment, prescription pharmaceuticals, and consumer products.

It was announced that MSD Managing Director Donald J. Allen will continue to manage the operations during a transitional period.

In commenting on the action, Dr. P. Roy Vagelos, Chairman and CEO of Merck, said, "We have taken this action after intensive study and reflection. We believe that Barlow Rand is in a better position than Merck, in light of existing circumstances, to maintain the availability and quality of our expanding line of human and animal health products and assure growth. Barlow Rand, a progressive company that has been a leader in programs of social responsibility in that country, specifically has committed itself to maintaining the well-being of all Merck employees."

In addition to being a wife and mother of two children, Mrs. Kuharik is pursuing a degree in management at Middlesex County College.

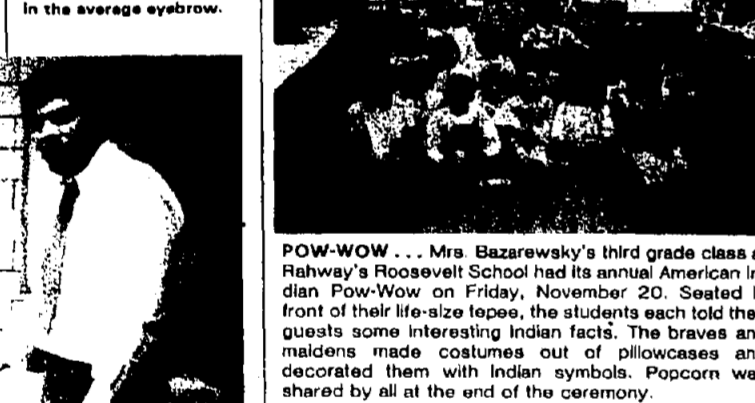
She is a member of the Phi Theta Kappa National Honor Society and has been on the Dean's List every semester since she started at Middlesex.

The only acceptable tape is filament-reinforced tape and should be wrapped around the parcel at least twice. Also make sure the address is printed clearly and accurately on one side of the package only and include the ZIP Code.

Rufolo added it is a good idea to put the name and address inside the package in case the address label comes off.

Postmaster Rufolo suggests stamp collecting kits make excellent Christmas gifts and are nominally priced. "Start a child on a very interesting, enjoyable and constructive hobby," he said.
