Board of Ed hires maintenance 'overseers'

Servicemaster Management Services, a "resource management company." has been employed by the Rahway Roard of Educa tion to improve the overall appearance and mainten ance of school facilities.

The board approved a contract with Servicemaster Management Services, of Chicago, at their regular meeting held on November The contract to perform the managing functions of custodial, maintenance and grounds support services is effective December 8 and extends to June 30, 1990.

"We are a resource management company working with the board and reporting to the board," said Bob Scott, Marketing Director from the Wayne, Pa. district office and the con tract originator, "We help with the maintenance, grounds and custodians in the employees to improve the overall appearance and maintenance of the facil-

Scott said that a two man team would be working with the present mainte nance and custodial employees of the Board of Education. There are no plans to hire or fire additional workers, he said.

Servicemaster Manage ment Services is one of the largest companies to provide this program in the country with over 400 educational facilities under contract, approximately 20

in New Jersey, said Scott.







Shame on you, Mr. Nucera

Mayor Nucera has apparently developed a new political slogan that I must share with the public — "If you can't say anything true about politicians who don't fall into step and do thy bidding, lie like heck about them." And, his Letter to the Editor on Thursday,

December 3 is a perfect example.
