

## Council approves Hartnett appointment; requests state aid for garbage costs

Rahway's Municipal Council confirmed the designation of Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett as an officer of the Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) for a one-year term despite opposing Republican votes at a meeting held on January 11.

In a consent judgment granted after litigation against the UCUA and the Union County Board of Freeholders, Rahway received the right to designate their choice as chairman, treasurer or secretary. Hartnett has served as treasurer since October 1986.

Councilmembers James Fulcomer, John Marsh and

George Wagenhoffer voted against the designation. "This resolution confirms the designation of an individual responsible for the waste of tens of thousands of dollars of taxpayers money in frivolous lawsuits," said Fulcomer.

"Fulcomer and his cohorts started this nonsense with going to court," said Councilman Vince Addona. "Every councilman should vote unanimously for the job Hartnett has done."

In opposition to the appointment of former Freeholder Richard Matgren as authority counsel last year, Hartnett refused to sign the authority's checks.

A law suit resulted in

which a final determination found the hiring of Matgren to be legal.

The council also approved a resolution requesting state assistance to meet the increases in solid waste disposal costs.


"The number one reason for increases in garbage costs are the decisions by the state Department of Environmental Protection," said Councilman Fulcomer.

"The idea of sending garbage out of state could have been avoided. The DEP has forced a plan down the throats of residents in Union County and the state should provide the money to carry out that decision."

A resolution authorizing the endorsement of an agreement with Certified Valuation, Inc. for a reevaluation of Rahway was approved by the council.

The reevaluation is court ordered, said Hartnett, and must be begun this year to be on the books in 1989. "As unpopular as it may be, it has to be done this year," said Hartnett.

The council also approved a resolution requesting the New Jersey Legislature to enact legislation limiting liability against volunteer workers in the same manner as provided for recreational coaches, managers and officials.

## County arts center names new director

Joanne King Guida has been named Executive Director of the Union County Arts Center (the former Rahway Theatre) in Rahway, succeeding Donald Strelbig, who resigned that post in December.

Mrs. Guida had been the center's box office manager and assistant fund-raiser since June, 1986. She has also coordinated its publicity effort.

Prior to becoming the center's first salaried employee in 1986, Guida (nee King) had been box office manager and administrative assistant for the Theatre At Raritan Valley Community College, and had worked in Public Relations for Starpointe Savings in Plainfield. She also has a performing background in dance, music and drama.

Guida had first come to the not-for-profit Union County Arts Center as a volunteer. She helped with publicity and coordinated a successful celebrity auction for which she obtained

donated items from numerous notables, including President Reagan, Richard Nixon, Bob Hope, Mary Tyler Moore, Johnny Carson, Paul Newman, Alan Alda and Billy Joel.

Currently residing in Plainfield with her husband, Robert, a producer of audio-visuals, Guida is a third generation Rahwayan with a combined B.A. degree in English and Theatre from Kean College. She also attended Fordham, at its Lincoln center campus, and Montclair State.

The Union County Arts Center, located at the junction of Main and Irving Streets and Central Avenue in Rahway, officially opened in March, 1986, with the Union County Education Association's stage production of "Shenandoah." Prior to that, as the Rahway Theatre, it had been in continuous operation from 1928 to 1981 as one of the state's largest and most solidly constructed showplaces for first-run films and occasional stage shows.

## Street ordinances approved for permit parking, reconstruction

An ordinance authorizing the reconstruction of Johnson Street and an ordinance amending the permit parking system were approved for final reading by Rahway's Municipal Council at their regular meeting held on January 11.

Johnson Street will be reconstructed from Essex Street to its terminus and will be taxed as a local improvement.

The permit parking system allows residents to park in restricted areas if they purchase a sticker for their vehicle.

Permits are issued by the Parking Authority to

residents who reside in a dwelling whose front or side yard is on a street calling for restricted parking.

Stickers will be valid for as long as the vehicle is owned by the resident and the resident lives in the permit parking area.

The following streets will have parking restrictions from the hours of 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.: Adams Street, both sides, from New Brunswick Ave. to Broad St.; Broad Street, west side, from Milton Ave. to Hazel Place; Bryant Street, both sides, from Central Ave. to Maple Ave.; Main Street, west side, from Emerson Ave. to Hazelwood Ave.; New

Brunswick Avenue, both sides, from Emerson Ave. to Hazelwood Ave.; Williams Street, both sides, from New Brunswick Ave. to Main St.

Parking will be prohibited at all times on East Scott Avenue, both sides, from a point of 75 feet east and west of the intersection of Bond Street, from a point 75 feet east and west of the intersection of Lufberry Street and from a point 75 feet east and west of the intersection of Rutherford Street.

No stopping or standing will be allowed on W. Grand Ave., north side, from the easterly curbline of Rt. 27 to 150 feet east.

**Parkway spending scored**

The decision this week by the New Jersey Highway Authority to hire an outside public relations firm to coordinate information on the proposed Parkway toll increase is troubling. At a time when the legislature has granted subpoena powers to a committee investigating the toll increase and spending policies of the authority, this new expenditure seems only to worsen the situation.

In my testimony submitted to the legislative committee investigating the authority, I emphasized the need for fiscal oversight of independent authorities who act in a fashion injurious to the public. To hire a public relations/lobbying firm at \$7,500 a month in addition to ample in-house staff, seems to be part of a counterproductive win approval for the 50c toll. There is a need for sound review of the finances set forth to justify new tolls, not more public relations. This new expenditure for public relations should be revoked, if it strikes of anyone.

Beyond the increase, I fear the credibility of some of the existing commissioners is so damaged as to harm the authority itself. Charges of excessive spending, such as a quarter of a million dollars for new mobile walk-in a hospitality building, thousands more for works of art, and the unsuccessful attempt to purchase a Cadillac for the authority chairman are offensive. The commissioners have even taken to fighting among themselves.

Even with the review by the legislature, it is time for our Governor to step in and call for the resignation of commissioners who have through their conduct lost the respect and trust of the Parkway users.

**Utilities Authority eases transfer station payments**

At a special meeting recently, Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) members formally granted a payment promise to waste haulers using the Automated Modular Systems transfer station on Lower Road in Linden.

The tipping fee at the transfer station, which only recently opened its doors to trash haulers serving Union County communities, is \$137 a ton.

Haulers were paying approximately \$58 a ton to dump at Edgemoor, which closed to Union, Morris and Somerset counties on December 31 by order of the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP).

Under the UCUA's payment plan, haulers have the option of paying half the tipping fee during the first 30 days the transfer station is in operation, bringing the total to \$68.50 a ton. After that period, haulers must pay the full rate of \$137 a ton.

On Thursday, the BPU issued a similar order to transfer station operators in Union, Middlesex and Somerset counties. The UCUA operates independently of the BPU.

**Free trees given by foundation**

The National Arbor Day Foundation is giving ten free trees to each person who becomes a Foundation member during January.

**Rinaldo protests release of killers**

El Salvador's planned release of three terrorists charged with the 1985 murders of four U.S. marines and two civilians is being protested by Rep. Matthew J. Rinaldo, R-N.J.

Rinaldo and several other Republican and Democrat members of Congress have expressed outrage at Salvadoran President Jose Napoleon Duarte's decision to grant amnesty to the terrorists under terms of the Central American Peace Plan. The Salvadoran government ruled that, because the killings were political crimes, the perpetrators are entitled to amnesty.

In a letter to Secretary of State George Schultz, Rinaldo and his congressional colleagues objected to the action, and urged that "the Department of State employ every method available to prevent the release of the three confessed killers."

The rebels, who said they belonged to the headline Revolutionary Party of Central American Workers, confessed to the slayings and said the marines were targets of the attack.

While President Duarte's desire to offer the broadest possible amnesty to the spirit of national reconciliation under the terms of the Central American Peace Plan is understandable, we cannot excuse those responsible for terrorist actions against U.S. citizens," Rinaldo said. "That sends a signal of weakness that will encourage more murderous assaults in the future."

## Curbside pickup

The Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) has announced the schedule for curbside pickups of recyclables during January and February for the participating municipalities in the regional recycling program.

Recyclables will be collected according to the following schedule:

• Rahway (west of railroad tracks) — January 25; February 8, 22 (Mondays).

• Rahway (east of railroad tracks) — January 26; February 9, 23 (Tuesdays).

Union County's regional recycling program continued to make good progress as another successful month of curbside pickups was completed, according to District Recycling Coordinator Joan Buhrendorf.

The program got off to a great start in September. The Rahway Area Union County Women's Club, a member of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, is open to women between the ages of 18 and 35 serving the communities of Rahway, Clark, Linden, Woodbridge, Scotch Plains and Carteret.

Buhrendorf noted that the upward trend continued through November and December, when 853 tons and 954 tons of recyclable

materials were collected, respectively. The number of tons collected during the first four months of the program amounted to 6,755,969 pounds of recyclables.

The Occupational Center of Union County (OCUC), a private, non-profit organization that provides work training for handicapped citizens supplies labor for the twice-monthly curbside collections. The recyclables are transported to a recycling center in Plainfield, where they are sorted and prepared for resale to companies that reprocess the materials.

## Dem Club hears Councilmen

Members of the Rahway City Council addressed the Rahway Democratic Club on a variety of subjects at the latter's January 4 meeting.

Council President Harvey Williams discussed the activities of the County Utility Authority, and "the State E.P.A.'s confused decisions to the Authority, and their sidestepping of tonnage allocations to transfer stations, making resolutions difficult."

Also, of the E.P.A.'s order to aid haulers financially without designating who should assist in transportation funding, Williams said the Authority would advance funds to those haulers needing interim aid, and that the funds would be repaid with interest in an effort to resolve that problem.

Councilman-at-Large Walter McLeod said Rahway had received \$6,339,672 over the past 13 years from the County Community Development Block Grant Revenue Sharing Committee. He praised Williams' efforts in obtaining a considerable portion of that for sidewalks, sewers and other municipal improvements, during his service as Rahway's representative.

Councilman Max Shield was applauded for his ef-

forts in removing a local stigma with the change of the name of Rahway Prison to New Jersey East Prison.

Shield spoke on the state-mandated reevaluation and noted that the Council had selected a firm known for its efficiency to conduct the program. He urged citizens to participate in the public hearings later this year on renewal of the CATV franchise for Rahway, adding that input is needed before, not after, the fact.

Councilman-at-Large Vincent Addona added his

concerns for mandated costs in the budget and conveyed the best wishes of Mayor and Council to all for the New Year.

A Nominating Committee report of Chairman J. Milton Crans, Richard Fazzari and Mrs. Mary Finelli was unanimously adopted.

Re-elected as Democratic Club officers were: President William J. Mc Bride; Vice President Walter D. Nadler; Corresponding Secretary Dinah Gabel, and Treasurer Georgia Foley.
