Rahway Board of Ed seeks petitions, names AA officer

Rahway's Board of Education announced important meeting dates for residents interested in the upcoming election at their regular meeting held last week.

The annual school election will be held April 5 and petitions for residents of Rahway interested in running for a seat on the Board of Education are available in the office of the Board Secretary/Business Administrator.

Petitions must be filed no later than 4 p.m. Thursday, February 11.

The tentative 1988-89 school budget will be adopted on February 4 at a special meeting to be held in the Louis R. Rizzo meeting room at the Intermediate School at 7 p.m., and a public hearing on the proposed budget will be held March 14 immediately following the regular monthly meeting of the board of the Intermediate School auditorium.

Superintendent of Schools Frank Brunette also announced that the Affirmative Action Officer for the Rahway school district is Frank Buglione, Vice Principal, Franklin School.

"The affirmative action officer is the person in the district one can turn to with questions about job opportunities, human rights, civil rights, minorities and fair employment," said Brunette.

Brunette also gave a progress report on the District Goals Committee at the meeting. "We have had two meetings to date," he said. "The committee has identified the community, school and parent population that they will survey. After the survey, in April, the committee will then reconvene and review the survey for completion of goals for the district. At the end of the school year, we should have established revised goals for the Rahway school district."

The board approved a voluntary tutoring program, Project ASK (After School Klub) for students, fully locally funded.

"It is the board's commitment to help these children, particularly in grades 3, 6 and 9—critical grade levels which must meet the standard set by the state Department of Education," said Brunette of Project ASK.

"The board will provide additional assistance to students in need, beyond the school day."

The program will offer assistance before and after school, and possibly on Saturday mornings, Brunette noted. Teachers will provide the necessary tutoring.

A resolution urging the

governor to recommend full funding of school aid formulas was also approved by the board. The Commissioner of Education has notified the board not to anticipate State School Aid based on a full funding formula which will result in more local taxpayer dollars to support the school budget.

Both Anderson and Lapolla said that there were many projects and programs accomplished during Anderson's appointment as county manager, such as the ongoing construction of the new, 14-story county jail, ground-breaking for the new, John E. Runnels

Hospital and implementation of the REACH Program, which is designed to remove people from the welfare rolls through education, job training and employment.

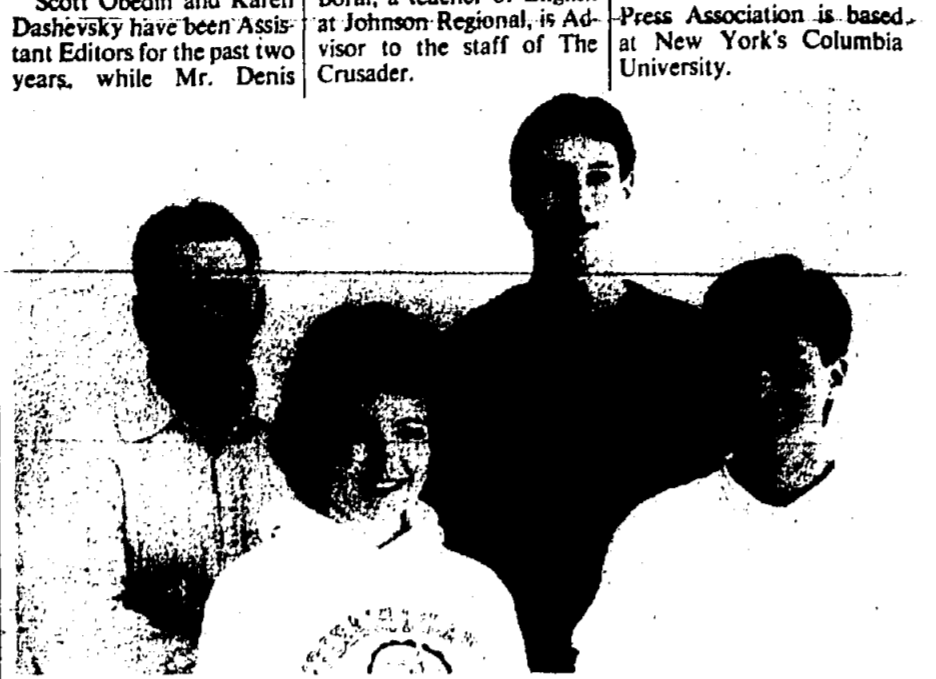
Hospital names coordinator for new birthing center

Melencia Garron, R.N., has been appointed Coordinator of the Alternative Birthing Center (ABC), scheduled to open later this year, according to Catherine Dashkevsky, M.S.N., Vice President of Nursing. A member of the nursing staff for 14 years, Mrs. Garron was Assistant Head Nurse of the Maternity Department for 11 years prior to accepting this new position. According to Mrs. Garron, the ABC program will emphasize the delivery of care to the mother and infant with minimal medical intervention. The family will participate in the birthing process, which will take place in a comfortable, home-like setting. Now under construction on the hospital's fifth floor, the Center is comprised of three suites, each equipped with its own lounge and kitchenette area. The program is primarily designed for patients anticipating a normal vaginal delivery. Rahway will be the first hospital in either Union or Middlesex County to offer an Alternative Birthing Center. Mrs. Garron is currently developing the policies and procedures relative to the program. A graduate of the Elizabeth General School of Nursing, she has worked in every area of maternity care at Rahway Hospital.

The Union County Division of the Make-A-Wish Foundation of New Jersey is celebrating its one-year anniversary this month, according to Scotch Plains resident Susan Mecca, Union County chairperson. The foundation, which grants wishes to children with life-threatening diseases, is part of both state and national non-profit organizations. "The half went wild when he was introduced, even though it was after 1:00 in the morning," comments Mrs. Mecca. "One of my favorite wish kids Jon had had his picture taken with him. She is still talking about it. In fact, she has developed a more positive attitude toward her illness, and says she is having so much fun to stop now." Although the Make-A-Wish Foundation has its happy times, the reason for its existence is never forgotten, and there are some tough times. "I introduced a 7-year-old boy to David Strayberry of the New York Mets in October, and I still smile when I remember the look on Johnnie's face," says Mecca.

Free hearing screening test offered via telephone

"Hello. You will be given four faint tones for each ear. Hold the telephone firmly against your ear. When I say the word Start, the test will begin. Are you ready? Start." New to Union County, "Dial-A-Hearing Screening Test" (DAHST) is a free hearing screening test over the telephone designed to increase hearing health awareness and provide free medical referral. This program was developed for the majority of the estimated 22 million Americans who, for different reasons, will never seek medical attention. The Speech & Hearing Institute, Clark, under the direction of Lisa Barsky, Ph.D., has joined the national network of DAHST systems. This brief recorded message introduces four technically tested tones for each ear. All residents within a 30-mile radius of Clark can listen to this screening test by calling 574-9214. Despite popular belief, 95 percent of all hearing disorders can be overcome through medication, surgery or the modern technology of hearing aids," said Dr. Barsky. "Hearing-impaired people suffer from frustration, stress and anxiety. The DAHST program will elevate public awareness of the help that is available to these area residents. Union County DWI program has best record in N.J.

The Union County Intoxicated Driver Resource Center (IDRC) Planning Division, Department of Human Services, has been recognized by the state Department of Health as having the best record for 1987 in case processing time for convicted intoxicated drivers, announced Joseph Suliga, Union County Freeholder and liaison to the local Advisory Board on Alcoholism.

"The Union County IDRC had the best overall record of processing cases from the time the offender receives his court sentence. The records are sent to the Bureau of Alcohol Control in Trenton, and then onto the appropriate county IDRC for program compliance and treatment referrals," Suliga said.

"Their average time of 82 days is 51 less than the statewide average for processing from court to BAC to IDRC, and they also lead the best average processing time from BAC to IDRC, just 54 days, compared to almost 170 days processing times."

In October, 1984, the state required all counties to establish an IDRC, which would serve as community treatment referral centers and as court monitors of the intoxicated driver's compliance with the program. The Union County IDRC was established in January, 1985, and has offered a program to detain, educate and evaluate the first-time offender of Driving While Intoxicated (DWI), according to Peter J. Moran, Jr., Director, and a NJ Certified Alcoholism Counselor (C.A.C.).

The program operates at the Court House in Elizabeth, for six hours each day, with three C.A.C.'s providing education on topics such as social and problem drinking, drug and alcohol interaction, stages and effects of alcoholism and symptoms of the family and other relationships.

The counselors evaluate each participant to determine whether further treatment is necessary, and if so, the IDRC monitors the individual until all requirements are fulfilled.

During the last three years approximately 3,500 offenders have attended the Union County IDRC, with 38 percent referred to treatment. Seven of 1800 went through the IDRC before, meaning less than one-half of one percent are recidivists, compared to 20 percent recidivism under the former program, according to Moran.

"This is a tremendous achievement for our program," said Ann Berni, Director of the Department of Human Services. "Especially since the staff is made up of just two full-time employees and one part-time."

Clark is among members of a committee of advisors to Kean's recently established African Studies Center. Sponsors of the black history events include the Black Student Union, the Student Activities Office, and the Center for African Studies.

Vehicle inspection system changed

The New Jersey Division of Motor Vehicles is launching a revised vehicle inspection program in March to further reduce waiting times by spreading the inspection workload more uniformly throughout the month. Attorney General Cary Edwards announced today.

A split-month inspection system is being reinitiated as part of the Division's continuing effort to improve programs and services to New Jersey's 5.2 million motorists," Edwards said. He added that under this system, the owners of approximately half the vehicles due for inspection each month will be asked to have them inspected by the 15th of the month.

According to the Attorney General, approximately half the motorists will receive a printed message on their windshield indicating the date they will need to renew their registration documents. The message will then change each month, according to the month when individuals who are in need of the emotional support and guidance of a volunteer, while rebuilding their lives. Being matched with a client, volunteers are required to complete a training program.

Volunteers learn listening and observation techniques, warning signs, medication information, mental health services, and client advocacy.

Roberta Rubin, CCP Director stated, "Monthly volunteer meetings are held to discuss client-related problems, and additional training skills are offered if needed."

"In addition to monthly meetings, individual support is given to volunteers, supervision, and the availability of myself to discuss any problem which may arise, successes, etc."

Weekend nursing program to begin

"A weekend program in Practical Nursing will be launched on February 5, Elizabeth by the Union County College in conjunction with Elizabeth's two hospitals."

"In announcing the innovative program, Dr. Derek N. Nunney, UCC president, said the program is part of an extensive effort by the college to expand the supply of nurses for Union County hospitals and other health agencies."

In conjunction with the Schools of Nursing of Elizabeth General Medical Center, Elizabeth, and Muhlenberg Regional Medical Center, Plainfield, the college will launch a major student recruitment effort to attract young people and adults to enroll in the professional nursing and practical nursing programs, Dr. Nunney said.

The College and the Schools of Nursing jointly conduct a Cooperative Program in Professional Nursing in which the graduates earn an Associate in Science degree equivalent to college and a diploma awarded by the Schools of Nursing.

An orientation program for students enrolled in the new weekend program will be conducted on January 27 at 9 a.m. at Union County College's Cranford Campus.

The program will include a visit to the College's Scotch Plains Campus where the college conducts a daytime and evening program to recruit young people to meet with counselors and students, to launch a major media campaign utilizing the press, radio, and cable television, to encourage practical nurses to enroll in professional nursing programs, and to conduct nursing refresher programs for nurses who have not been employed in their profession for a number of years.

Students earn while they learn

Students enrolled in the schools of the 18 New Jersey Local Area Vocational Schools Districts earned in excess of \$2,500,000 while working during the 1986-87 school year.

That information comes from Stanley Grossman, the Director of Vocational Education for the Union County Regional High School District No. 1, one of the 18 school districts designated as Local Area Vocational Districts by the state department of Education.

"The Cooperative Education program in the four counties of the Local Area Vocational Districts was employed by over 850 employers across the state."

Students also participate in a 200-minute per week course of instruction which teaches them how to obtain jobs and then maintain their employment.

The Union County Regional High School District includes Cooperative Education programs in Arthur L. Johnson Regional High School with Cooperative Industrial Education, Cooperative Office Education, Cooperative Home Economics, and Cooperative Marketing Education. 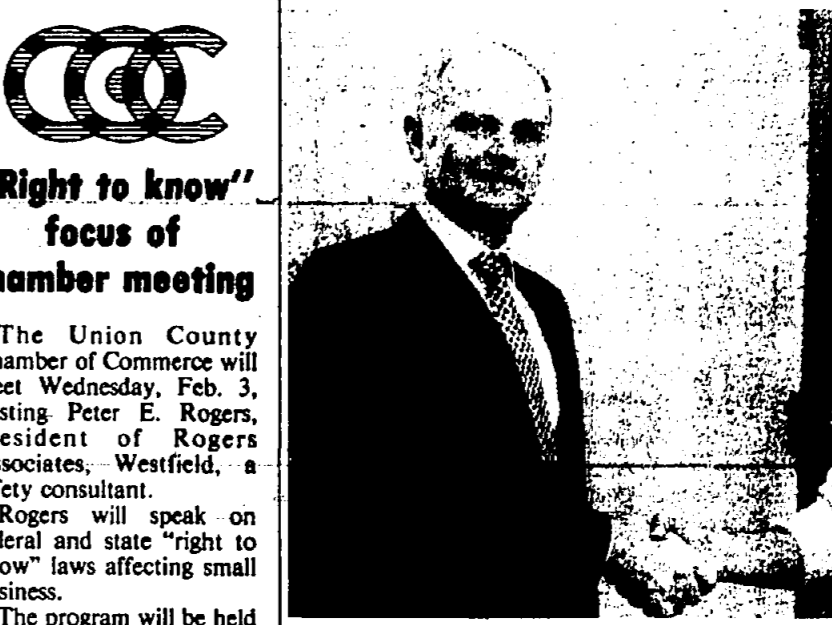

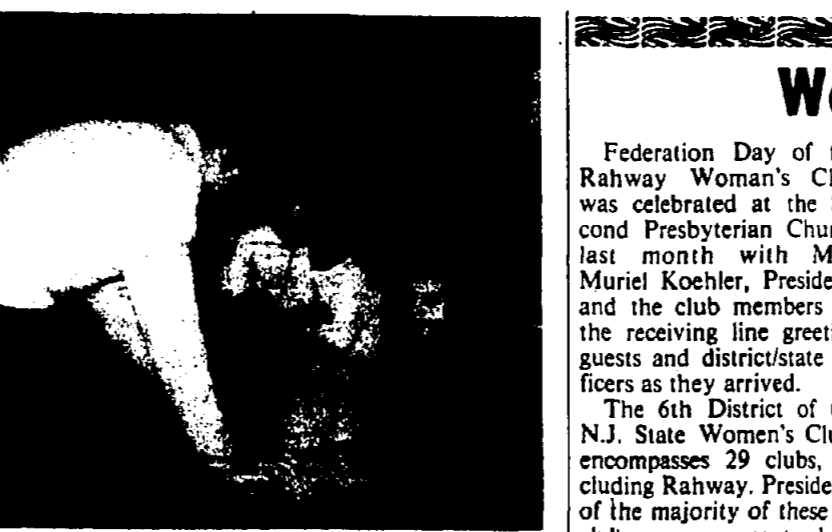

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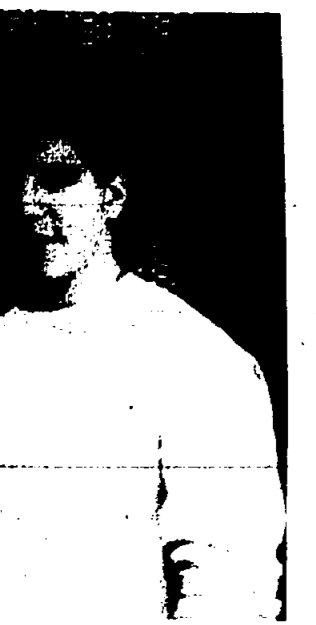

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UCC prof explores trivia as learning aid

Prof. William Dunscombe of Plainfield, formerly of Clark, a member of Union County College's Biology Department, presented a paper titled "Using Natural History Trivia as An Academic Tool" at a recent meeting in Roseland.

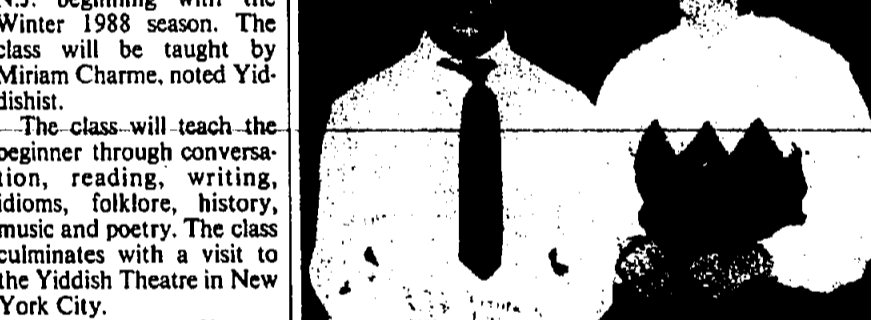

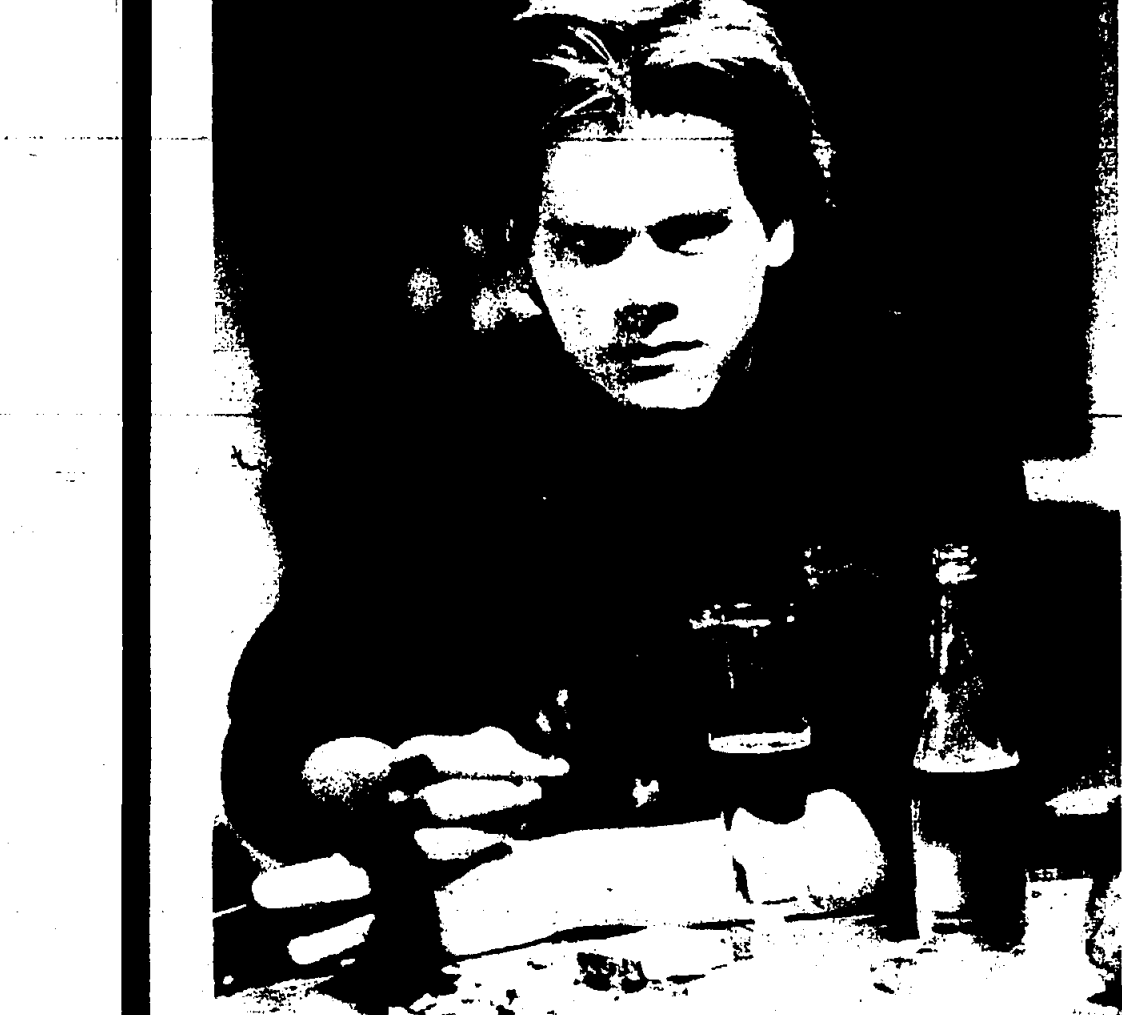

Picked green or allowed to ripen to a rich red, it is especially sweet and lacks the bitter taste common to other varieties.

The seed should be planted indoors in a warm place in mid-March to mid-April and transplanted to the garden in late May or early June.

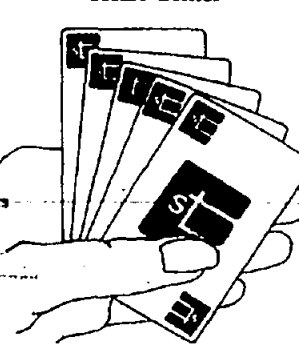

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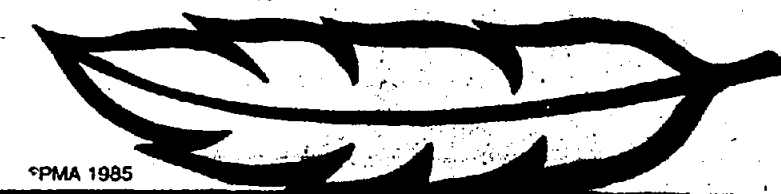

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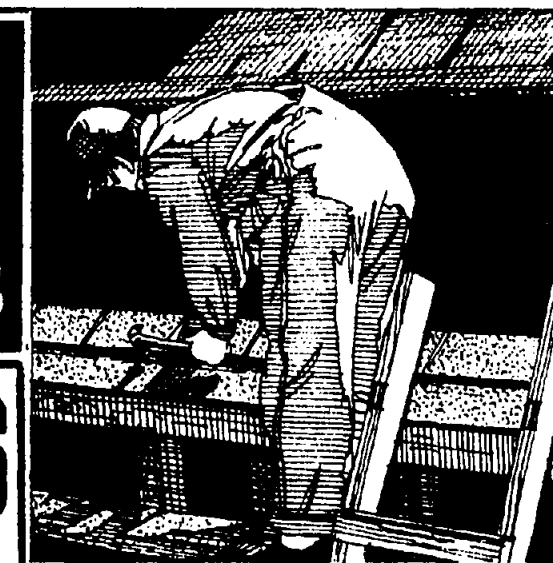
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
