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## Corporate center project is "back on track"

Mayor Daniel L. Martin announced today that the Rahway Corporate Center project is "back on track" following City Council approval last Wednesday night of an agreement with a new development team for the project.

The new developers

Marshall Weinerman and Robert Gelber of Rahway and John A. Strama of Atlanta, Georgia, "have the vision, the experience, the financial ability, and the knowledge of and concern for the community which are essential ingredients for the success of this project."

Mr. Weinerman and Mr. Gelber, who maintain offices in the United Jersey Bank Building on St. George Avenue in Rahway, are owners of the Summit Hotel in Summit. Mr. Weinerman has been a partner in numerous development projects in New Jersey and in

Georgia and had experience in managing two major hotels prior to acquiring the Summit Hotel.

Mr. Gelber holds a B.A. degree, an M.B.A., a law degree, and is a C.P.A. He was previously associated with Coopers and Lybrand, the world's largest accounting and business consulting firm, and the national law firm of Davis, Polk, and Wardwell, before entering partnership with Mr. Weinerman.

Mr. Strama, a former area resident, is the president and controlling partner of Ridgeway Development Corporation, which is headquartered in Atlanta and also has offices in Toms River. His company has developed highly successful corporate center projects in Georgia and nearly 1,000 residential units in Georgia and New Jersey. Mr. Strama was formerly the executive vice president of Hovnanian Enterprises. He holds an M.B.A. from Columbia University in New York City.

Mayor Martin noted that the company has won a number of prestigious awards for its "excellence in quality development." In 1986, it won the "Builder of the Year" award from the Metropolitan Builders Association of Atlanta and has been

accorded honors on the "Giants" list of Professional Builder's Magazine, which is the "Fortune 500" of the building industry.

"Clearly we have recruited a development team which can bring an outstanding project to Rahway," the Mayor said. He pointed out that his administration had engaged in an "exhaustive" search for the past eight months for a new developer for the project.

"We met with over thirty developers, including the largest in the state and in the country," Martin said, "and we are confident we have come up with the team that combines all the elements necessary for success."

Under the terms of the new agreement, Weinerman, Gelber, and Strama will have a maximum of 120 days to prepare new site plans for the project. The contract provides that the major component of the plans must be a hotel conference center of at least 100 rooms. The developers have agreed, as part of the contract, to pay the City a \$75,450 good faith deposit.

Mayor Martin concluded by saying that "while this project went through a rough year in 1987, we are very pleased to be beginning 1988 in better shape than ever with a top notch development team to give our community an exciting, first-class project."

## County Arts Center launches newsletter



The Union County Arts Center in Rahway has distributed the first issue of its newly launched newsletter, "Tableaux," to 8,000 recipients. It succeeds a previous publication titled simply, "Member Newsletter."

Like its predecessor, "Tableaux" will be issued six times a year on the first day of even-numbered months. In an attractive, mini-newspaper format, it reports on recent noteworthy occurrences and upcoming

ing events at the historic entertainment center. In a lead article in the inaugural issue, Dan Costigan of Edison, who designs and edits the 4-page publication, explains the name "Tableaux" as suggestive of "... the capture of a frozen moment in time."

"Any student of the history of vaudeville will recognize (it) as the tag for a vaudeville and music hall feature popular around the turn of the century. In the vaudeville tableaux, or 'living picture,' appropriately costumed actors would assume stationary poses as the figures in a famous event or work of art."

The Union County Arts Center opened in 1928 as the 1600-seat Rahway Theatre, a combined vaudeville/movie showplace. In 1986, it was entered upon both the state and national registers of historic places.

## Henderson named city's acting police chief

Barry Henderson has been named Acting Police Chief for Rahway's Police Department on the retirement of Chief Theodore Polhemus. Beginning his tenure as chief on February 1, Henderson plans to increase the community relations aspect of the Police Department.

"I have a background in community relations," said Henderson. "I would like to see more in the school system and in civic groups. Years ago, we used to send officers in to speak to civics and history classes, getting them involved in the schools. I plan to meet with school administrators to increase this practice."

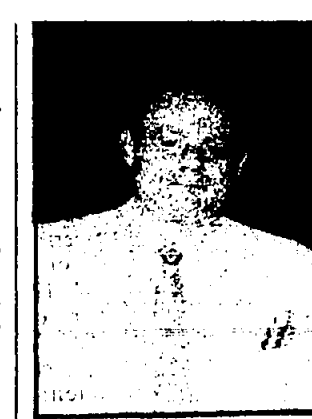
Henderson also hopes to expand the Police Department's speakers bureau whereby officers and detectives will go to civic clubs and churches to speak on different issues.

Born in Rahway, Henderson attended Rahway schools, Seton Hall University, Newark State College and Rutgers University. He played sports at Rahway High School and was named All-State in baseball for two years. He played professional baseball for the

Detroit Tigers in 1960 to 1962. Henderson has been a member of the Board of Education for 10 years and is a member of the Sideliners Club and Rahway Landmarks.

Henderson's father was mayor of Rahway from 1957 to 1965 and was a member of the state's General Assembly. His family's community involvement "goes way back," noted Henderson.

Another hope for the future is to make the public more aware of the state's laws. "I'd like to help people understand better the function of the Police Department," explained Henderson. "We do not write the laws, we are sworn to enforce them. The public has a lack of understanding of laws; they should be made aware."

## Outgoing Chief: Rahway's cops "second to none"

After 29 years, the "Chief" is trading one job for another, but will still be

in the field he has grown to love.

Theodore Polhemus, outgoing Chief of Rahway's Police Department, has accepted the position of director of Union County's Police Academy. Officially retired on February 1, Polhemus has already taken the reins on a new career. "I'm going from one full-time job to another," he said.

Polhemus has been an instructor at the academy for the past 15 years and hopes to see training continue at the same level or higher. "We have one of the finest names in training in the state of New Jersey," he said.

The academy is currently located on the campus of Union County College, but plans are underway to build a new academy on Union County Vocational Technical School property in Scotch Plains.

"The Freeholders have recently allocated funds to build our own academy and, hopefully, we will start development in the spring," Polhemus said.

Polhemus has lived in Rahway "most of his life." He began in the Police Department after World

War II as a member of the Police Reserves. In the 1950's he went into the Special Officers group.

"At that time, they were used to take the place of regular officers when they were out for the day," explained Polhemus.

"In 1959, he started as a patrolman and began his climb up the ranks, being made sergeant in 1966, lieutenant in 1968, captain in 1972 and acting chief in 1973.

Over the years, Chief Polhemus has seen many changes in the City of Rahway and in the way police departments operate.

"We went from what could be termed a small town police department in the 1950's to a major, metropolitan police force in the 1980's," he said. "We in the City of Rahway witnessed those types and numbers of crimes that are synonymous to the metropolitan area."

Today, police departments have advanced along technological lines that make use of computers to access pieces of information vital to investigative work, motor vehicle inquiries and background information. "We can access both federal files and state, county and local files," said Polhemus. "Retrieval information is attained in about 30 seconds. In the old days, it would take a telephone call to Trenton, then a follow-up letter. What could take a week or two, now takes one minute."

Another change in police departments has to do with education. Several years ago, police departments required their applicants to have no less than an associates degree in science, said Polhemus.

The state of New Jersey took away that privilege seven years ago," he explained. "The attorney general's office, in its forthrightness in the education of police, are now looking into reestablishing higher levels of education for police officers."

Chief Polhemus has a background in radio communications and has been appointed to a program in which a state-wide police emergency network has emerged. It is a communications system now in use throughout the state which permits each police officer to access any other officer by radio, said Polhemus. "New Jersey now leads in this form of technology," he noted.

Saying he leaves Rahway's Police Department in as good shape as any in the state, Polhemus credits his officers. "My officers are second to none in the country and the state of New Jersey," he said.

"I am leaving with mixed emotions. I enjoyed working here for such a long period of time and I've worked with excellent people. But I'll only be a short distance away and all it takes is a telephone call."

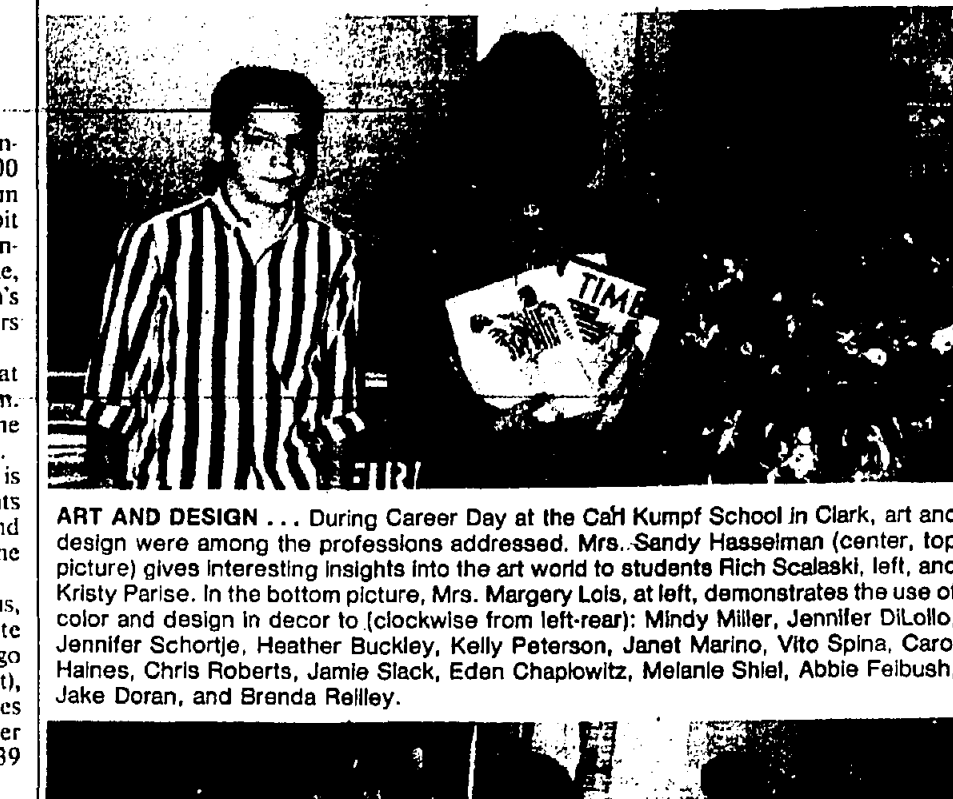
