Regional High School District No. 1. The 1988-89 school year for the four Regional High Schools - Jonathan Dayton, Arthur L. Johnson, Gover nor Livingston and David Brearley - will begin on Wednesday, September 7, 1988, with Freshman Orientation scheduled for the day before. The last day of school for students and the date for commencement exercises at

all four schools is Thursday, June 22, 1989.

The Regional District, like other school districts. usually closes for a number of days each year due to snow. If there are more than three snow days during the 1988-89 school year, Easter vacation could be reduced or school could be extended in June for students and teachers. In addition, the commencement date could conceivably be later than June 22, 1989, if seniors have not completed 180 school days by that date.







If State Division of Fish, Game and Wildlife personnel have their way, hunting black bears will be added to the gray squirrels, ruffed grouse, rabbits, chukars, heasants, raccoons, opossums, woodchuck, red foxes, gray foxes, crows, quail, deer, waterfowl and wild turkeys killed in New Jersey. With an estimated 100-150 bears in the state. Fish.

Game and Wildlife personnel have legislation on the drawing board to allow a hunt this December. Residents who believe they are safe in the woods after Hunters can look forward to a "limited" kill of 10 to 15 black bears. This shouldn't come as a surprise to New Jersey residents since the Division pulled the same trick with the New Jersey deer herd. In the early 1900s, there was limited" deer hunting (4 days to be exact) and by 1986 there were more than 90 deer hunting days annually. Today there are MORE deer than ever in New Jersey. By killing most male deer leaving females to reproduce, the Division has created the problem they claim to be solving. We urge your readers to let their Assemblymen, Assemblywomen and Senators know that they will not tolerate more hunting — demand the Division of Fish,
