

Guidelines approved for new housing in Rahway

Rahway's Municipal Council approved an ordinance last week that will set guidelines for the construction of townhouses, garden apartments and condominiums in the City.

The ordinance, approved for first reading, sets a minimum of two-acre lots for the new construction of townhouses, garden apartments and condominiums and sets minimum side and rear yard footage.

The council approved a moratorium on new construction several months ago in order to formulate guidelines. "There was nothing on the books that lent itself to condominiums," said Councilman Jerry Coleman. "We were basically using whatever existed for multi-family housing units and applied that to condos. Now we have guidelines that indicate in depth how we should operate with reference to parking, trash containers and side and rear yard setbacks."

The council also approved for first reading an ordinance authorizing an emergency appropriation of \$359,000 to begin a revaluation in Rahway. The revaluation is court ordered, according to Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett, and should begin this year to be "on the books" in 1989.

"With the decline in downtown Rahway, the ef-

fect on the 1989 tax bill will be substantial," said Councilman James Fulcomer in voting against the ordinance. "If approved at this time, homeowners will have a larger tax increase than normal."

Councilmen John Marsh and George Wagenhoffer also voted against the ordinance.

Also approved was an ordinance prohibiting parking on the following streets: Alden Drive, both sides, from Linden Avenue north to Lower Alden Drive; Audrey Drive, from Linden Avenue west to St. Georges Avenue; Cora Place, both sides, entire length; Linden Avenue, both sides, entire length; Plymouth Drive, both sides, entire length.

Parking is prohibited on the above listed streets from 7 a.m. to noon, Fridays, except for Plymouth Drive which is limited on Mondays.

All ordinances will come before the council for a public hearing and possible final adoption at the March 14 meeting.

Black History Month celebrated in Rahway

Mrs. Lillian Hannibal instructed Rahway's Municipal Council on the "Black West" in celebration of Black History Month with a display located in City Hall.

Mrs. Hannibal is a historian of African American History and is a trustee of Rahway's Public Library. She is also a life member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

"History is the story of the earth and its people," said Mrs. Hannibal when she addressed the council at a meeting held last week. "But we find that there really isn't any black history. At this time we turn the pages of history books and add in chapters that have been deleted."

The display is sponsored by black churches and black organizations in Rahway and depicts the black man in the westward movement.

Pictures and literature examine the lives of J.B. DuSable, a trapper, the black man and the Indian, Benjamin "Pap" Singleton, who led a migration west, General John "Black Jack"

Pershing, who led the Black 9th and 10th Cavalry, and Fredrick Remington, who sketched buffalo soldiers on the trail.

Also depicted are Nate Love, also known as "Deadwood Dick," York (a slave), black lawmen, Jim Beckwourth, Dred Scott and the Missouri Compromise, a black Pony Express rider, a black rodeo rider and Bill Pickett.

Carter G. Woodson started the study of black history with the founding of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History in 1915, according to Rahway Councilman Jerry Coleman.

Negro History Week began in 1926 and during the Bicentennial year of 1976, the designation was extended to a full month and named Black History Month. The original association changed its name to the Association for the Study of Afro American Life and History, noted Coleman.

"The purpose for founding this association was that throughout history certain deletions and omissions were made dealing with

black Americans in textbooks," said Coleman. "The association tries to work with civic, school groups and government entities to get material into the hands of professionals to distribute to students. We would love to see the day when a full and complete history is written whereby black history would be incorporated."

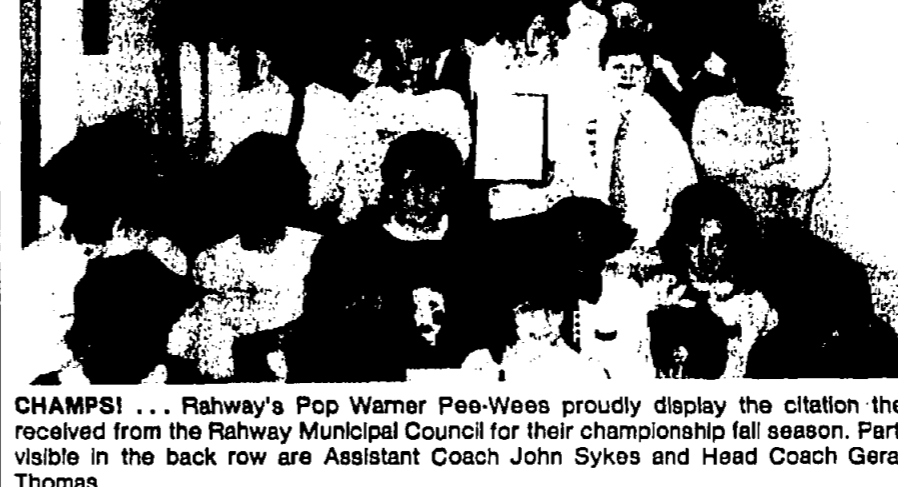

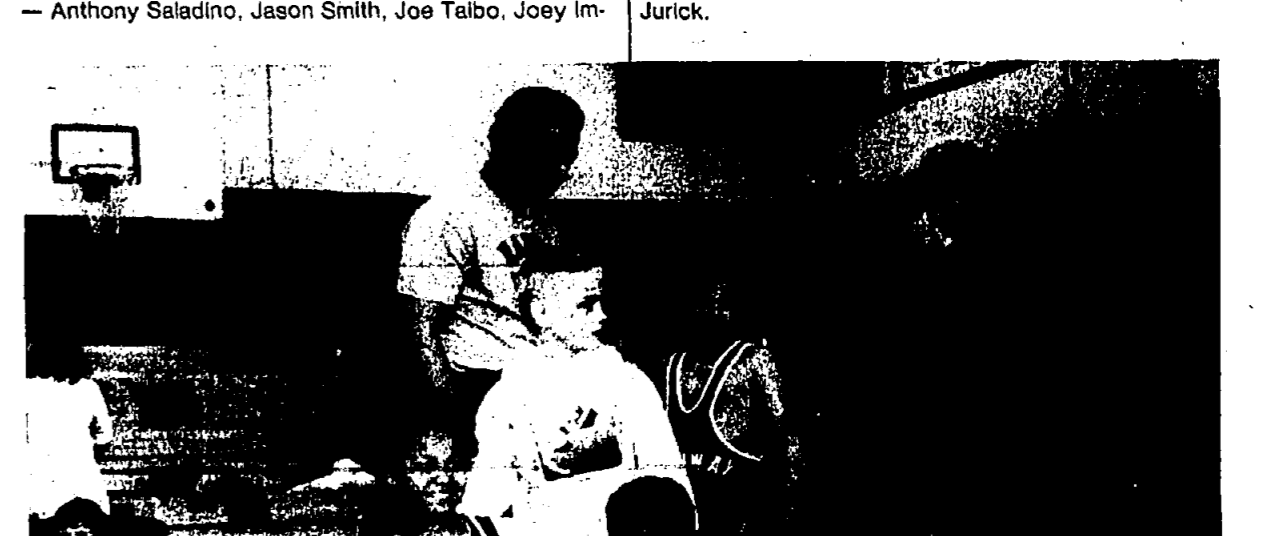

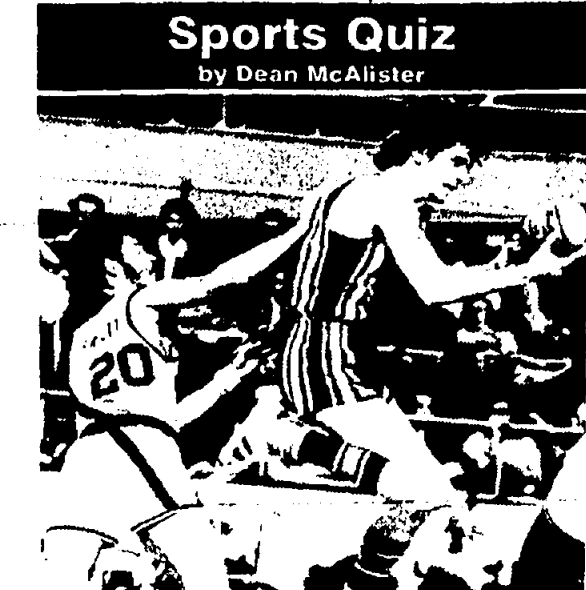

Arts Center toasts past president

The Union County Arts Center honored its co-founder and past-President, Sandra Sweeney, on Sunday, February 7, with a testimonial reception at the center (formerly the Rahway Theatre), 1601 Irving Street, Rahway.

In May, 1983, Mrs. Sweeney, a resident of Highland Park, was elected President of the nonprofit corporation she had co-founded four years earlier, and was repeatedly re-elected to the post for the next four eventful years.

Under her able leadership, the elegant 1920s vaudeville theater was purchased, restoration was begun, the facility was re-opened under its new name and officially designated both a state and national landmark, a staff was hired and a capital campaign was launched.

During Sweeney's presidency, from which she stepped down in June, 1987, the project secured crucial corporate funding support and the center made tremendous strides toward restoration as a fully equipped theatrical and musical production facility.

In a brief ceremony in the auditorium at the February 7 affair, Robert Balfour, who

had spearheaded the drive to preserve the historic theater, and Eric Rickes, the project's funding coordinator, fondly reminisced about their years of working with Sweeney.

Ellen Vigilante, Sweeney's successor as President of the arts center, presented the honoree with a certificate of appreciation donated by calligrapher Virginia Jones, a hand-colored print of the theater facade by Rahway artist Michael Hartnett, and a floral bouquet donated by Joe Hudak of Towne Florist in Rahway.

A 1965 graduate of Rahway High, Sweeney briefly attended Boston University's School of Fine & Applied Arts and was graduated from the Katherine Gibbs School in Montclair. She and her husband, Justin, operated a furniture restoring firm in Edison for about 10 years, when she decided to try a new career direction. She is currently Administrative Assistant to the president of Packaging Corporation of America-East in Piscataway.

Sweeney has remained active with the arts center project, currently as a member of the nominating committee.

Regional Board approves Aragona for teacher honor

The Regional Board of Education gave its approval to the selection of a science teacher from Arthur L. Johnson High School in Clark to participate in Governor Keane's Teacher Recognition Program.

The board, meeting last week, approved the selection of nominee John Aragona from Johnson. The selected nominee will join other teachers throughout the state as representatives of their districts in the program.

The selection of nominees was made by a panel of nine selected by the Board of Education, the American Federation of Teachers, Local 3417 and the panel itself.

Nominees will each receive a certificate of commendation from the governor and will be expected to participate in the Governor's Convocation on Excellence in Teaching during the spring.

The board also revised its proposed tentative budget due to Governor Keane's recommended State School Aide figures. The budget now includes a Capital Expense figure of \$29,551,502 and a Debt Service portion of \$650,572. There is no Capital Outlay figure. The budget to be submitted to the county superintendent now totals \$30,222,074 for the board governing policy at four regional high schools including Johnson.

In other business the board:

- Approved the submission of an application for Special Education funding in the amount of \$75,600. A portion of this amount will be used to establish a second class for emotionally disturbed students at Johnson.
- Approved Roland Marianni, science, and Kathryn Zigmont, german, as bedside instructors.
- Approved the completion of students in the Distributive Education program at the State Leadership Conference, Great Gorge, on March 7, 8 and 9.
- Granted the extension of a child-rearing leave of absence to Donna Lenahan, a member of the mathematics department at Johnson.
- Adjusted the salary of Marcia Haller to \$105 per day after completing ten consecutive days as a substitute teacher in the art department.
- Approved Saralyn Smith, Kean College, and Darren Lewan, Union

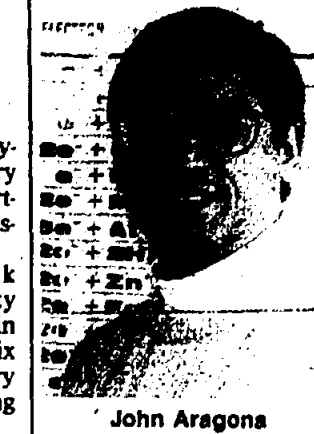
County College, as student teachers.
