





tion of test results on public drinking water supplies. It may seem hard to believe, but right now when the DEP notifies local officials that a public water supply is tainted, no one is legally obligated to notify the affected

My plan would require public water purveyors to increase their testing from twice a year to once a month and, more importantly, publish notices in local newspapers whenever a problem is discovered with water

Another bill mandates that all prospective homebuyers be given written certification that their drinking water is safe if the house they plan to buy uses The final bill, which is similar to one sponsored by Assemblywoman Maureen Ogden in the Assembly

would provide state funds to map all aquifers throughout the state. We must provide at least \$5 million so the DEP can do the job right. Right now we don't know the geological conditions that surround many of our aquifers or even which direction many of these underground water supplies are flowing. It is essential that we have this information so that when pollution is discovered we can accurately determine

the extent of the contamination and the best way to go about cleaning it up. I am encouraged by the fact that Governor Kean has also identified safe drinking water as one of his priorities. However, taking \$60 million from the state hazardous waste cleanup fund to protect drinking water, as the dministration has advocated, is the wrong approach. In the first place, \$60 million is not enough. And secondly,

we need every cent in the toxic waste cleanup fund fo toxic waste cleanups. We may find out that the \$200 million bond issue that I have proposed will still not be enough to do the job. If that turns out to be the case, then we should be prepared to spend whatever it takes to make sure our

drinking water is safe. We can learn to live without a lot of things, but we annot live without safe drinking water. That is why the Russo clean drinking water package will be given prompt consideration by Senate committees and the full Senate in the coming weeks.

John H. McCutcheon, Social Security Manager for the Elizabeth office of the Department of Health & Human Services, has issued several reminders regarding social security benefits: Appeals - Social security recipients who wish to apneal a decision via a review process should be aware of the time limits on such action Failure to request appropriate action before the time limit ends may result in loss of the right to that action. However, a time limit may be extended if there is good reason for not having made the request on time. The limit is extended to the next work day if the last

day falls on a Saturday,

Sunday, or a national holi-Representative Payees -Representative payees are appointed to handle the funds of social security beneficiaries unable to handle their own funds. The representative payee's first responsibility is to ensure that the person's day-to-day essential needs are met Beneficiaries who can handle small amounts of spending money should have this made available to them. Any funds remaining after basic and special needs are met must be saved or in vested; not kept at home where they can be lost or stolen, and not mixed with the representative payee's own funds. Preferred investments are US saving bonds. Surplus funds should be kept in an interestbearing account that shows

the beneficiary as owner. Employer Responsibility When an employee is hired the employer is responsible for recording his or her home address. At the close of the calendar year employers are responsible for submitting Form W-(wage & tax statement) to the social security ac ministration (SSA). Unless this information is reported in a timely fashion and wit the employee's correct name and social security number, he or she may never be credited with the correct amount of earnings A person seeking employ ment who has never had social security card should apply for one at any socia security office. An employ ee whose name has beer

changed (e.g., as a result o marriage) should also apply for a new card. Benefit Statement - Al social security beneficiarie Security Benefit Statemen (Form SSA-1099) at year' end. The form shows the amount of social security benefits the beneficiar received or repaid during the year. It will help in the calculation of Federal tax liability, if any, Mos beneficiaries do not have to pay any Federal income ta: on their social security benefits. But where there i substantial income in addi tion to social security benefits, up to half of th annual benefits may be sub ject to Federal tax. Include in the benefit statement wi be an IRS Notice 703 which includes a workshee that can be used to get a idea if any benefits are tax able. Beneficiaries filin

Social Security update

John H. McCutcheon Social Security Manager for the Elizabeth office of the Department of Health & Human Services, has issued several reminders regarding social security benefits:

Appeals - Social security recipients who wish to appeal a decision via a review process should be aware of the time limits on such action. Failure to request appropriate action before the time limit ends may result in loss of the right to that action. However, a time limit may be extended if there is good reason for not having made the request on time The limit is extended to the next work day if the last day falls on a Saturday,

Sunday, or a national holi Representative Pavees -Representative payees are appointed to handle the funds of social security beneficiaries unable to handle their own funds. The representative payee's first responsibility is to ensure that the person's day-to-day essential needs are met. Beneficiaries who can handle small amounts of spending money should have this made available to them. Any funds remaining after basic and special needs are met must be saved or invested; not kept at home where they can be lost or stolen, and not mixed with the representative payee's own funds. Preferred investments are US savings bonds. Surplus funds should be kept in an interest-

bearing account that shows the beneficiary as owner. **Employer Responsibility** When an employee is hired. the employer is responsible for recording his or her social security number and ome address. At the close of the calendar year, employers are responsible for submitting Form W-2 (wage & tax statement) to the social security administration (SSA). Unless this information is reported in a timely fashion and with

the employee's correct name and social security number, he or she maynever be credited with the correct amount of earnings. A person seeking employment who has never had a social security card should apply for one at any social security office. An employee whose name has been changed (e.g., as a result of marriage) should also apply for a new card. Benefit Statement — All i social security beneficiaries should receive a Social Security Benefit Statement (Form SSA-1099) at year's

end. The form shows the amount of social security benefits the beneficiary received or repaid during the year. It will help in the calculation of Federal tax liability, if any. Most beneficiaries do not have to nav any Federal income tax on their social security benefits. But where there is substantial income in addition to social security benefits, up to half of the

annual benefits may be subject to Federal tax. Included in the benefit statement will he an IRS Notice 703, which includes a worksheet that can be used to get an idea if any benefits are taxable. Beneficiaries filing ioint returns must combine their incomes and social security benefits on the Additional information on all aspects of social security benefits may be ob-
