

## Construction guidelines in City hit stalemate

It's back to the drawing board for an ordinance setting guidelines for new construction of garden apartments, townhouses and condominiums after Rahway's Municipal Council voted to hold the ordinance for further study.

The council held a public hearing on the ordinance at a special meeting held last week. Before finally adopting the ordinance, the council voted to hold all action until the March 14 regular meeting of the council.

The ordinance sets a minimum of two acres for the new construction of garden apartments, townhouses and condominiums in the City of Rahway and sets guidelines for parking and utility services and other building regulations.

Anthony Deigo, Health Officer for the City, questioned certain language in the ordinance. He suggested requiring sewer and water services for each townhouse and questioned parking regulations.

Stanley Wichinsky, of Rudolph Avenue, a former assistant engineer and a licensed professional engineer and land surveyor, questioned the definition of land use in set zones in the City. "I think you should reconsider this ordinance," said Wichinsky. "Somewhere along the line someone's missed the boat on what is required." He said the ordinance set guidelines that were more favorable to the construction of garden apartments than for townhouses.

"We have over a dozen situations to discuss," said Robert Cotte, Rahway's Building Inspector. "This was brought up too quickly for consideration." Council President Harvey Williams recommended postponement of the ordinance until all department heads could make their reports to the council.

The council also approved resolutions appointing Fire Director Chief James Heller as the Coordinator for the Supplemental Fire Services Program, designating Police Captain Edward Tilton as the Safe Neighborhood Program Municipal Coordinator and reappointing William F. Schaffer III as constable.

During her career, she has also been involved with the St. Patrick's Youth Advisory Board (seven years); as a Trustee for Council #8, Civil Service Association (20 years); as a member and past President of the Professional Woman's Club in Union (10 years); and as a member of the Board of Trustees of the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (R.S.V.P.) for the past 15 years.

## Year-round swimming for handicapped

The Union County Department of Parks and Recreation is running a year-round recreational-therapeutic swim program for the handicapped.

As part of the "Leisure Independence for the Handicapped" program, the department's summer swim program has been expanded through the winter months, to include weekly swimming at the Fanwood-Scotch Plains YMCA.

Every Tuesday evening, now through June 14, and September 13 through December 27, handicapped individuals ages 6 and up may swim at the YMCA, free of charge, from 8:45 p.m. The sessions are offered as an hour of open swimming, but lifeguards will be available to offer limited instructions when necessary. There is no pre-registration.

During the summer months, handicapped swim sessions will be held at Wheeler Pool, Linden, each Monday and Thursday from 10 a.m. — noon, and at Railway Pool, on Thursday evenings from 6:30-8:30 p.m.

This program has been funded through a grant from the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs, Handicapped Persons' Recreational Opportunities Act, and is run in cooperation with the Fanwood-Scotch Plains YMCA. For information call 527-4930.

## Rahway action group receives grant to study resource recovery impact

The Rahway Citizen Action Organization (RCAO) has received a grant totaling \$39,500 from the Geraldine Dodge Foundation to study the environmental and financial impact of the resource recovery facility scheduled to break ground in January 1989.

The Institute for Local Self-Reliance (ILSR) of Washington, D.C. will conduct the research which

should be completed by May 15. Reverend Edward A. Allen, Executive Director of RCAO said, "This study is critical for our community. This plant will be put in the middle of our neighborhood. Apparently we will have to live with it for 20 years. We need to know what it will do and if it is necessary. We're grateful to ILSR and the Geraldine R. Dodge Foundation for providing the means for us to find out."

Mrs. A. Parker, a member of the Board of Directors of RCAO said, "The city has offered us \$75,000 to compensate the community for hosting this plant. We can't evaluate this offer until we have a complete account of what the range of possible facilities are available."

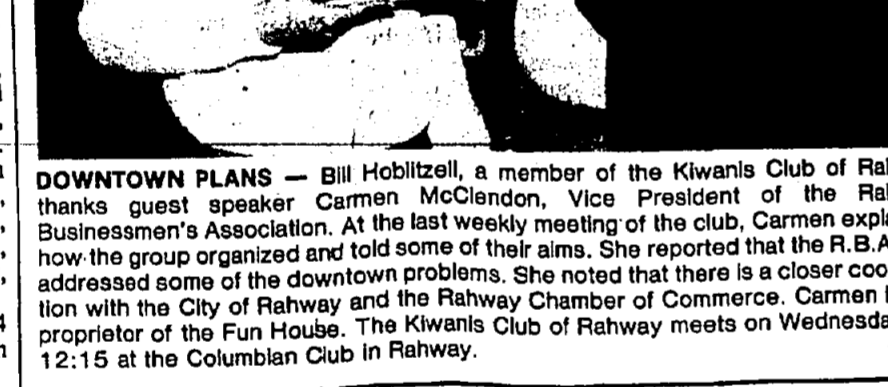

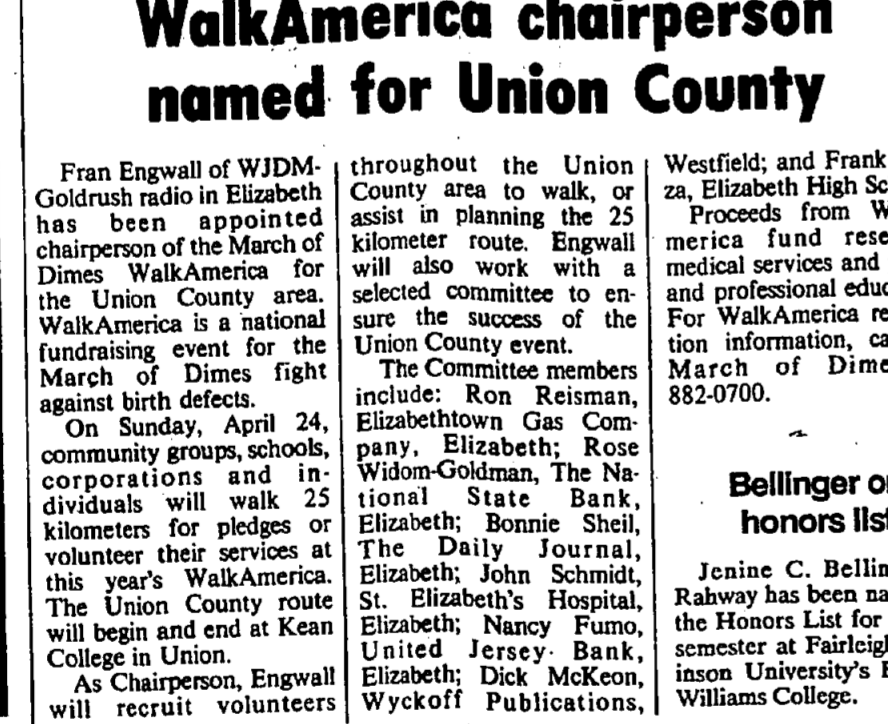
UCC slates artist's show

The Small Engine Repair Course is a good home maintenance course for gasoline engines. Course will cover cleaning and adjustments, blade sharpening, wheel, tire and belt replacement, engine overhaul and valve grinding. A very practical course for the busy season ahead.

Some mini-courses offered are: Owning Your Own Business, where students ask questions. Do you want a business of your own, How do you get started, Should you buy a going business or franchise, using the popular "Bank Street Writer" word processor can be avoided are discussed.

The Direct Marketing: How to Increase Your Sales course is designed for small business and even company executives looking for powerful techniques and creative new ways to attract more customers. This course will teach anyone starting a business of any kind, how to skillfully market their products and/or services economically.

Another course, Origami, stimulates the artistic senses and teaches precision, neatness and geometry through its shapes. You will learn to make mobiles, flowers and geometric shapes and will be able to teach these techniques immediately.
