



rom noon until sunset. -By order of the President of the United States, or by the Governor of any State, Territory or Possession, On occasions, Heads of the several departments and agencies of the U.S. Government may direct the Flag to half-staff, if deemed proper to do so.

What is the significance of displaying the flag at —This gesture is a sign to indicate the nation mourns the death of an individual or individuals (Navy and

Military custom); and Can the Mayor order the flag to be half-staffed? -No, only the President of the United States or the Governor of any State (our State Governor) may order the flag to be half-staffed.
