# Board candidates, budget up for vote

Voters will go to the polls to choose three candidates for Rahway's Board of Education in the schools election on April 5.

Six candidates are seeking three, three-year vacancies on the board which governs policy in Rahway's schools.

Incumbent Ronald Matusaitis is seeking his fourth term as a board member. A former board president, Matusaitis has been a member of the Rahway Library Board of Trustees and has served as C.Y.R.C. president twice. He has served on every major board committee and was this year's chairman of the Finance Committee.

Mary Finelli has retired after 29 years of employment with the school system. She has resided in Rahway since 1941 and has three sons, all of whom attended Rahway schools. She has been involved in many school activities and organizations.

Employed by Laminare Corporation, Antonio Garay is also on the Board of Directors of Rahway's Y.M.C.A. He has coached Rahway Recreation wrestling and was a coach last season for the High School's varsity football team. Garay is a graduate of Hofstra University and attained a Master's degree in finance from a branch of New York University.

Raymond Grimes is a life-long resident of Rahway and has two children, one a student at Franklin School. He is a graduate of Union County College, where he earned an Associate of Art degree, and Kean College, where he graduated magna cum laude with a Bachelor of Science degree majoring in management and minoring in economics. He is employed as a department manager at Foodtown in Clark. Grimes serves as the president of the Franklin School P.T.A. and as president of the P.T.A.O. (Parent Teacher Association)

Incumbent Lillie Henderson is seeking her third term on the Board of Education. She has served two terms as vice president of the board and has served on 17 board committees. Henderson also serves as vice president of

the Union County School Boards Association and has been board liaison for four Rahway schools. She is vice chairperson of the Board of Directors of the J.F.K. Community Center and is chairperson of the Emergency Food Bank at the J.F.K. Center.

Voters will also be asked to approve the 1988-89 school budget of \$19.4 million. The budget includes a current expense portion of \$18,587,054, a capital outlay portion of \$473,000 and debt service of \$387,055.

The amount to be raised by taxes includes a current expense portion of \$13,717,669 and a capital

outlay portion of \$432,434 for a total of \$14,150,103. If the budget is approved by voters, residents can expect to pay an additional 50 cents per \$100 of assessed value. On a home assessed at \$40,000, taxes for schools purposes would increase by \$200.

The budget includes salaries for nine new positions in the district, including language, mathematics and industrial arts and special education teachers in the High School, an additional librarian, an art teacher, a music teacher and two physical education/health teachers at the elementary level.

According to the Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders, if the weather cooperates, the Lakes at Wanaquan and Echo Lake Parks will come alive in April, when boating season

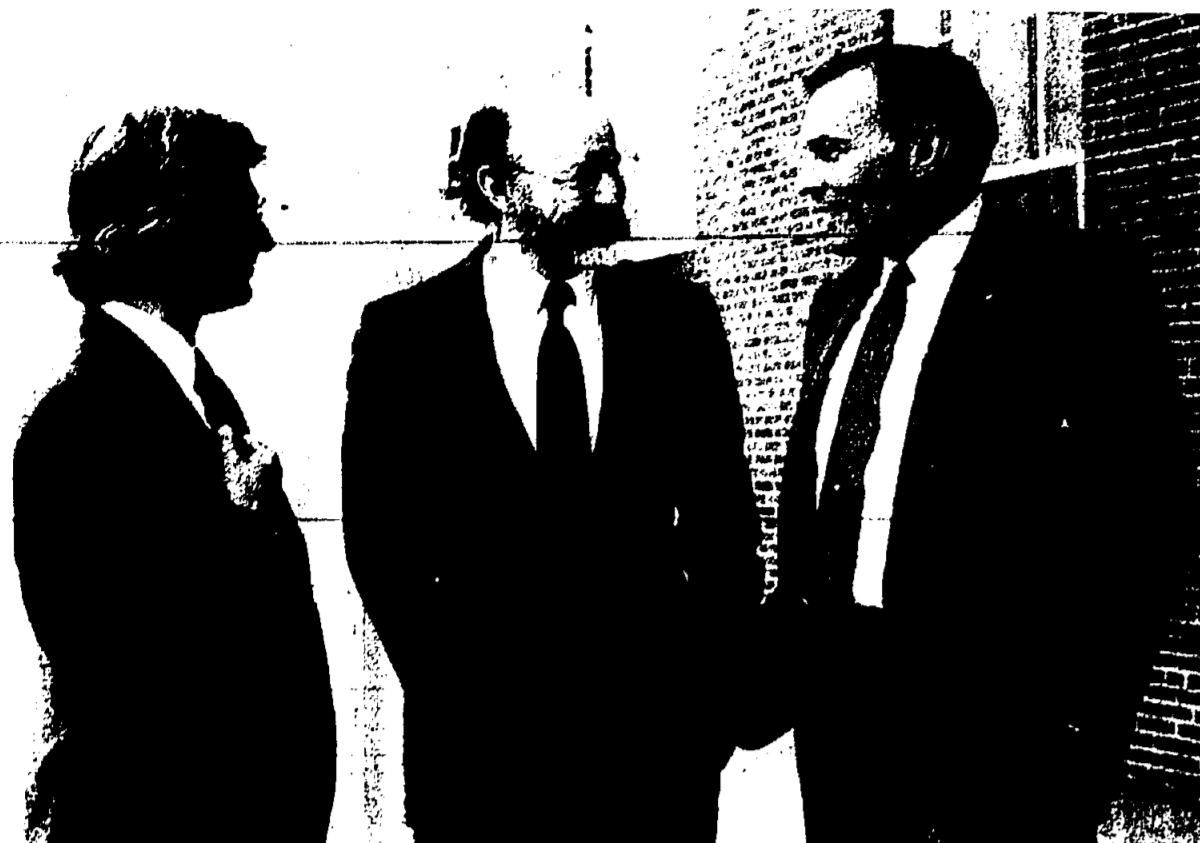

A dental first at Rahway Hospital

A revolutionary dental procedure took place at Rahway Hospital recently under oral surgeons Philip Santora, D.M.D., and Joseph DeMaio, D.D.S. These two doctors performed the first tooth implant procedure to take place at Rahway Hospital...

This is an exciting milestone for Rahway Hospital, the only community hospital in Union County to have the equipment and the properly trained surgeons to perform this operation. The reconstructive procedure provides a permanent solution to anyone with single, partial or total tooth loss who wishes to have more permanent restoration than the conventional dentures or crowns...

The procedure was developed by Per-Ingvay Branemark, M.D., Ph.D., thirty years ago. Dr. Branemark heads the Institute for Applied Biotechnology in Gothenburg, Sweden. The procedure is unique in that the bone forms a biological bond with a pure titanium implant, a method of tissue integration that Branemark calls "osseointegration..."

Dr. Santora and Dr. DeMaio are planning to conduct a community education program at Rahway Hospital in the near future to give interested members of the community an in-depth view of this procedure.

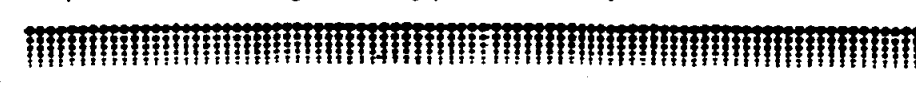

## Emergency action averts layoffs

The lay-off of township personnel was averted Monday night when Clark's Municipal Council approved emergency appropriations at a special meeting.

A resolution creating an emergency temporary appropriation of \$334,979 was defeated at last week's regular council meeting when it failed to draw the required number of votes. The funds were needed to pay township salaries until the 1988 budget is approved and needed a five-vote majority to be implemented. Councilmembers Bernard Hayden and Carol Pluta voted against the resolution, Councilman Carmine Cristiani was ill and did not attend the meeting.

At last week's meeting, Hayden said he would not vote for the emergency appropriation because it included increased salaries for council members and the mayor and an increased salary for the mayor's confidential secretary. Council increases were approved last year by a 4-3 vote.

"The objections to the budget raised by Mr. Hayden and Mrs. Pluta are baseless," said Councilmembers Fred Eckel, William Caruso, Robert Ellenport and Joseph Pozniak in a statement released to the press on March 26. "The salaries for the mayor and council were not increased in this year's budget. In addition the salaries were exactly the same as the temporary budget which Mr. Hayden, Mrs. Pluta and Mr. Cristiani voted for on January 1."

Saying that the salary for the mayor's confidential secretary was at a level comparable to other clerk/typists in the township, the Democratic council members called Hayden and Pluta's opposition to the temporary appropriations "an attempt to blackmail the Township of Clark." Hayden is a Democrat and Pluta is a Republican.

At Monday night's special meeting, Hayden moved to amend the resolution by deleting \$4207 in the council salaries account, \$2132 from the mayor's office account, \$250 from the Department of Senior Citizen Affairs, \$15 from the Division of Public Works, and \$275 from the directors office of the Department of Public Safety. The amendment was defeated with Council Members Eckel, Ellenport, Caruso and Pozniak voting against it.

The original resolution creating the temporary emergency appropriation of \$334,979 was then moved and unanimously approved, thereby averting all township lay-offs.
