## Route 1 & 9 realignment to begin in preparation for resource recovery

The engineering to permanently realign Routes 1 and 9 in Rahway to accommodate truck traffic to and from the Union County Resource Recovery plant will begin later this year, thus enabling the county to maintain its construction schedule for the plant announced Assembly Speaker Chuck Hardwick (R-Westfield) and Majority Conference Leader Bob Franks (R-New Providence).

"The State Department of Transportation has also assured us that the resource recovery plant will be accessible as soon as it opens via a temporary jughandle at Lawrence Avenue," said Franks following a discussion with DOT Commissioner Hazel Gluck.

To get the permanent project underway, Gluck said she was budgeting \$3.34 million for engineering of the northernly Rahway section from Pierson Avenue to the vicinity of Green Street, the project sections affecting the Rahway plant, in Fiscal 1989 which starts July 1, 1988. The resource recovery plant is not scheduled to come on line until late 1991.

"When I met with State and local officials last September, I committed to making the Route 1 and 9 realignment a top priority so the county could get their resource recovery plant up and operating on schedule," said Gluck. "Thanks to the continued efforts of Speaker Hardwick and Assemblyman Franks, we expect the funds will be available in FY '89 to advance this project and meet our deadline."

"The commitment by the DOT to fund the engineering of these critical portions of the Route 1 and 9 project is a welcome step needed to expedite operation of the resource recovery plant," said Hardwick. "The assurance by the DOT to do everything possible to provide ingress and egress to and from the Rahway plant when it opens is essential to preventing any delay in moving the county toward an improved and more cost effective method for disposing of solid waste."

"With this commitment from DOT, nothing should stand in the way of the county moving on constructing the Rahway plant," added Franks. "The faster we can get going, the faster

we can bring relief to our citizens from soaring solid waste disposal rates."

"I'd like to commend Assemblyman Robert Franks for his leadership in working with the DOT to move for-

ward with the Route 1 and 9 plan on a priority basis," Hardwick said. "In addition, I'd like to recognize the important contributions made by former Union County Freeholder Chairman Alan

Augustine and Utilities Authority counsel Richard Malgran, both of whom participated in lengthy discussions with Commissioner Gluck and the department over the past year."

## Waste-to-energy facility awaits permit decision

Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) Chairman Louis A. Santagata has announced that the State Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) has issued a December 31, 1988 target date for the county's resource recovery

permit decision and has committed to monthly meetings with UCUA representatives to assure that the schedule is met.

Approval of the permits would pave the way for construction of the waste-

to-energy facility to be constructed on 22 acres off Route #1 in Rahway.

Santagata said that the DEP target date resulted from a meeting he and other Utilities Authority representatives had with DEP Commissioner Dewling on April 14. "We are highly encouraged by the DEP's willingness to keep the permitting schedule on track," Santagata said. "At our meeting, Commissioner Dewling expressed a personal interest in accelerating the permitting process."

According to UCUA executive Director Joseph E. Kazar, permit applications for the planned resource recovery facility were submitted to the DEP in November 1987. After they were deemed acceptable in February, a facility design report and Environmental and Health Impact Statement were resubmitted to the DEP in March for technical review.

According to Kazar, 33 copies of the combined six-volume document were submitted to the DEP for review by numerous state agencies.

Copies of the permit applications are available for public review at Rahway City Hall, Rahway Free Public Library and the Union County Utilities Authority Office.

## Animal warden contract squeaks through on split vote

Despite a split vote at their regular meeting on Monday night, Rahway's Municipal Council approved a contract for animal warden services.

The council approved a contract with Garden State Kennels, Inc., of Stirling, at an annual sum of \$15,600. The resolution authorizing the contract was approved by Council members Vincent Addona, James Ful-

comer, Harvey Williams and George Wagenhoffer.

Council members Jerry

Coleman, Max Sheld and John Marsh were opposed. Council members James Cadigan and Walter McLeod were absent.

The council also accepted a bid from Friguetto Trucking and Excavating Company for a bulldozer and operator for an eight-hour day at \$350 and a four-hour day at \$200.

A resolution authorizing the final payment for Hazelwood Avenue storm sewers and a resolution requesting curbs on the side of streets bordering Union County parkland where no

curbs exist were also approved by the council.

An ordinance authorizing the paving of Midwood Drive from Milton Boulevard to Madison Avenue was approved for first reading, and an ordinance amending fees for tax map sheets at \$3 and for a Rahway street map at \$1.50 were approved for first reading by the council.

Second reading and possible final adoption of these ordinances will come before the council at their June 15 meeting.
