





#### Assembly has plan to Clark @ Patriot break homelessness cycle

By Assembly Speaker Chuck Hardwick I am firmly committed to the idea that unless the possibility exists for all citizens to experience the opportunity to enjoy basic human necessities, experience the chance to work and grow, then the quality of life in our state is unacceptable and demands improving. It is out of this belief that I have decided to initiate a series of comprehensive, far-reaching measures to help improve life for those caught within the throes of

Early this week, I introduced a \$13.7 million package to help provide housing and break the cycle of homelessness that is eating away at the fabric of the state's inner cities and spilling over into suburban areas. The timing of this program is critical as current estimates indicate funding for the state's ongoing programs to help the homeless will run out of money next month. Meanwhile, population in New Jersey's shelters has reached a choking point, with many needy mothers and children left out on the streets in the cold. The legislative package I am proposing, in coopera-

tion with Assemblyman Bob Franks, R-Essex, Union, would provide \$5.65 million to the Department of Community Affairs to help keep impoverished individuals threatened with evictions from being forced out of their homes. This funding would also be used to boost nonprofit board home construction and provide improvements to shelters. The second block of funds, totalling \$8.05 million,

would be allocated to the Department of Human Services the Community Calendar, all events for the following for emergency services specialized for needs of the homeless, including operating shelters, counseling, training, day care, and job placement. I patterned this program directly upon what I witnessed to be the biggest needs of homeless people in

my visits to shelters earlier this year. Many of the homeless I spoke with had previously received or were currently being assisted by programs funded by the DHS Comprehensive Emergency Assistance Systems. CEAS provides state funding for emergency shelter, emergency food and support services for homeless individuals and families.

Under the Hardwick-Franks plan, CEAS would receive a total of \$7 million for the current fiscal year, some \$2.4 million more than that originally proposed by the Administration for the next fiscal year that begins Ju-The package I am proposing differs from one recent-

introduced in the Senate due to the fact that both the Department of Human Services and Community Affairs have already indicated their complete support. Part of the program also calls for assistance to amilies that are in imminent danger of losing their homes due to factors not completely within their control — such as job layoffs, a family break-up, or serious illness. As I reflect upon my visits to shelters in Jersey City, Plainfield, and the Edison area, I had a chance to speak personally with homeless men, women and children — all

with different, unique stories to tell. But one thing was clear; most of them are much like you and me.
