Why Scientists Smoke go, on the 7 o'clock news, it was reported that it's okay to eat beef again. Yes, it has cholesterol, as previous scien-

c reports said - but two kinds: friendly and unfriend-(Hopefully, in the hamburger you are eating as you ead this, there is more of the former than the latter.) And do you recall how scientific studies a few years go had us convinced that vegetable oils were far safer han those made from animal fats? Remember? Now another scientific study group is saving: Watch ut! Certain vegetable oils are okay, but others aren't. A third group is saying that the consumption of oils containing saturated fats (saturated with what?) does not

essarily cause a buildup of cholesterol. Keep these contradictions in mind as I proceed. I also recently watched a TV report on a woman docr who seems to have found a solution to dislexia, a viion problem that, for years, had been misdiagnosed as a sign of either mental retardation or laziness. In this report you saw the person with dislexia struggling to read something from a printed page. The doctor fits the person with colored spectacles, and the page is read again, this time fluently and without hesitation

819-7376m The demonstration was repeated with four or five subjects, and the colored spectacle solution worked like a charm each time. But, although a whole new world seems to have been sened up for dislexia victims by this simple solution, the cientific community doesn't accept the colored spectacle rocedure because, they say, there are "insufficient ocumented scientific results" (or words to that effect). So first we have all these scientific studies convincing us we should shift from beef and pork to fish and fowl and from animal fats to vegetable fats for cooking, if we want to stay healthy. Then, new scientific studies tell us to nore or less disregard previous studies and go back to do-

ng pretty much what we were doing before they told us not to do it (though maybe in moderation). In short, the scientific community, with all of its normous brainpower and extravagant testing apparatus, can't seem to make up its mind. Yet a cure for dislexia, for the effectiveness of which ere is abundant proof, is rejected by this same mixed-up inch — for lack of scientific validity.

I'm beginning to wonder if the Surgeon-General's varning on cigarette packages won't soon be modified to ead something like this: "While there is reason to believe that, for some nokers, cigarettes may be addictive and otherwise harmul, nine out of ten doctors prefer them to carrot sticks." Should I start smoking now and beat the scientists at

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



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
