

UCUA regional recycling program: bigger and better after one year

The Union County Utilities Authority's (UCUA) Regional Recycling Program celebrates its first year of operation this month, and all indicators suggest that it has grown to be one of the most successful recycling programs in the state.

"The UCUA's program was one of the first to offer multimaterial collection on a regional basis," said Aletta Spang, administrator of the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection's Office of Recycling. "It provides curbside pickups for more housing units in urban and suburban communities than any other recycling program in the state."

The UCUA's Regional Recycling Program, which provides curbside collection of newspapers, glass containers and aluminum cans, was implemented shortly after Labor Day last year. The initial participants were Berkeley Heights, Cranford, Plainfield, Rahway, Springfield, Summit, Westfield and Winfield. New Providence and Scotch Plains joined the regional program in March; Mountainside will begin receiving pickups this month.

The UCUA program originally was part of Union County's comprehensive Solid Waste Management Plan. The program also complies with the Statewide Re-

ycling Act, signed into law by Gov. Thomas Kean on April 20, 1987.

Currently, the UCUA's Regional Recycling Program serves approximately 222,051 residents, 44 percent of Union County's population.

"We are really encouraged by the strong support of the residents," UCUA Chairman Louis A. Santagata said. "We've collected more than 11,798 tons of materials since the program began last September, and the amount continues to increase each quarter."

Municipal officials have noted that the UCUA's pro-

gram relieves them of the burden of operating their own programs.

"We looked into the cost of operating our own curbside recycling program and found that we couldn't beat the UCUA's price," commented Summit Recycling Coordinator Bob Lee.

Demonstrating their satisfaction with the UCUA program, municipalities that received curbside collections during the first year have signed on for another year of service.

The new contracts, which run from Sept. 1, 1988, to Aug. 31, 1989, hold the current per-household fee at \$18.20 and increase the number of curbside pickups in each town to 26. Newspapers, glass containers and aluminum cans will be collected every other week during the new contract period. Previously, collections were made twice a month.

"The efficient management of the program enabled the Authority to hold the costs for another year, while increasing the number of pickups," Santagata observed. "The change in schedule will eliminate the periodic peaks in tonnage that occurred when there was a three-week interval between collections."

To manage the increasing volume of recyclables more efficiently, the UCUA recently purchased five specialized recycling vehicles. According to District Recycling Coordinator Joan Buhrendorf, the vehicles contain five compartments to hold three colors of separated glass containers, aluminum cans and newspapers.

"The trucks are designed to permit loading from either side and are equipped with radios to provide instant communication between supervisors and drivers. This will allow us to respond promptly to any unforeseen problems," she said.

The trucks, which cost \$37,921 each, will be financed by a grant from the N.J. Department of Environmental Protection's Office of Recycling and with funds appropriated under the state's mandatory recycling law. The purchase will reduce the number of trucks the Authority leases to 12, lowering program costs.

Newspapers, glass containers and aluminum cans collected by UCUA crews are transported to P.I.M. Recycling in Plainfield, where they are processed for resale.

Fulcomer: Rahway has highest tax rate again

Union County Freeholder James J. Fulcomer of Rahway announced recently that the general property tax rate in Rahway once again is the highest rate of the twenty municipalities in Union County that use the same tax system according to the newly published "Abstract of Rates by Union County, 1988."

Freeholder Fulcomer said that this is "particularly sad news" for Rahway property taxpayers because Rahway has the highest tax rate despite the fact that the City of Rahway has received 1.4 million dollars in distressed city aid from the state and has appropriated \$800,000 in land sales revenue for this year's budget. He explained that most other Union County municipalities do not have these large tax relief windfalls, which together totalled 2.2 million dollars in 1988.

He said that without these revenue items, Rahway's tax rate would be even higher. The 1988 expenditure of the remaining land sales money means an \$800,000 shortfall

in revenue next year which will require budgetary economies or tax increases in 1989.

According to the "1988 Abstract of Rates," published this month by the Union County Board of Taxation, the general property tax rate to apply per one hundred dollars of valuation is \$8.08 for Rahway, \$7.67 for Plainfield, \$6.83 for Hillside, \$6.03 for Union Township, \$6.63 for Roselle, \$6.53 for Elizabeth, \$4.49 for

Roselle Park, \$3.96 for Fairwood, \$3.93 for Linden, \$3.11 for Scotch Plains, \$3.10 for Garwood, \$2.98 for Summit, \$2.92 for Berkeley Heights, \$2.62 for Clark, \$2.58 for New Providence, \$2.42 for Mountainside, \$2.41 for Westfield, \$2.29 for Springfield, \$1.48 for Cranford, and \$1.43 for Kenilworth.

Board of Ed OK's objectives

District objectives for the 1988-89 school year were approved by Rahway's Board of Education at a special meeting held on Sept. 6.

District objectives are required by the State Department of Education, according to Superintendent of Schools Frank Brunette.

Objectives for the Rahway school district are as follows: By June of 1989, the student attendance rate will improve to 92 percent and the number of dropouts will decline by 15 percent for students in grades 9-12; by June of 1989, 85 percent of the students in

grades 3, 6 and 9 will achieve at or above the state minimum level of proficiency (MLP) on the California Achievement Test (CAT) or the High School Proficiency Test (HSPT); and by June 1989, 90 percent of students in grade 9 will pass the objective portion of the High School Proficiency Writing Test (HSPT).

The board also approved the following special education curricula: Language Arts (K-12); Reading (K-12); Science (K-12); Mathematics (K-12); Social Studies (K-12); Life Skills (9-12); Multiple Handicapped (K-12); and Pre-school Handicapped.

New phys ed post approved

The Rahway Board of Education voted to create and post the position of a physical education teacher for the High School at a special meeting held last week.

Board Member Raymond Grimes voted against the position saying that he was opposed to hiring another physical education teacher.

"It is an unnecessary expense for the entire district," said Grimes.

Grimes said that a female teacher is needed and if a female had been hired last June, the additional position would be unnecessary.

Board Members Jacqueline Fagan and Peter Kowal disagreed with Grimes' assessment. Fagan said the additional position was needed to alleviate overcrowding at the High School. "It is for the students' best needs," said Kowal.

A motion to transfer teaching staff members also met with dissent from some board members. Antonio Garay, Lori Kennedy and Raymond Grimes voted against the following transfers: A. Popovich from Roosevelt School to Madison/Cleveland; J. Rocco from Madison/Cleveland to Roosevelt School; J. Ladley from the High School to the High School/Intermediate School.

The board also appointed Assistant Superintendent of Schools Nicholas Delmonaco as the district's Desegregation Officer. An integration plan has been in effect in Rahway since the mid 1960's, said Frank Brunette. "There are approximately the same number of minorities in all schools," he explained. "A Desegregation Officer is a person designated to keep track of the numbers and figures and to keep an eye on the plan."

County gets grant for Alzheimer program

The Division of Aging of the Union County Department of Human Services recently started a community-based pilot program for those suffering with Alzheimer's Disease and other dementia, with a grant of \$70,000 from the N.J. State Department of Health, announced William H. Eldridge, Union County Freeholder and liaison to the Advisory Council on Aging.

"In recent years the problems of patients with Alzheimer's Disease and related disorders has moved to

the forefront in Union County, and the impact of these illnesses upon caregivers and service providers has led to an increasing demand for day care services," Eldridge said. "About 40 percent of the clients of Union County's Adult Day Care Consortium are individuals who have Alzheimer's disease or a related disorder."

The program, which runs three days a week, includes door-to-door transportation, therapeutically oriented activities, lunch, special trips and the monitoring of general health needs.

Also, an education/support group is available, and the general staff is accessible to answer questions, to hear concerns and to offer support.

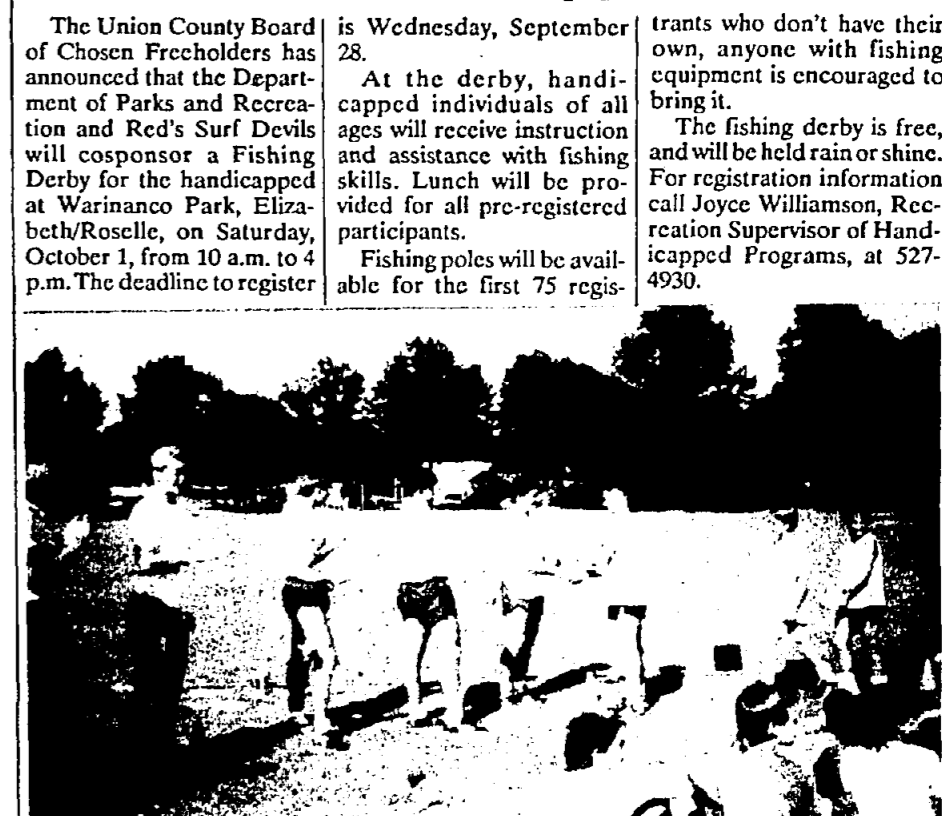

CPAs concerned about economic outlook

Members of a recent poll of members of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA), the nation's short-term economic outlook continues to be positive. Unfortunately, results show a somewhat gloomier outlook for the longer term.

Surveys were mailed to 4,093 certified public accountants (CPAs) nationwide on April 18. A thirty-percent response rate was achieved. Each question asked for the respondents' view on the status of various economic indicators, both six months and one year from now.

"Because we are professionals who act as consultants to businesses on financial, managerial and operational issues, the results of this survey offer a unique perspective on the national economy," said Joel J. Rogoff, CPA, president of the New Jersey Society of Certified Public Accountants (NJSCPA).

Ninety percent of the national sampling predicted the economy to improve or remain about the same over the next six months. On the other hand, nearly half those

asked expect conditions to worsen one year from now. The overall discouraging long-term outlook is based on the respondent's expectations of specific business and economic indicators. Seventy-two percent of CPAs responding expect higher prices a year from now. Thirty-eight percent anticipate higher interest rates six months from now, compared to nearly seventy-five percent who expect higher rates in one year. While only eleven percent of the respondents expect the unemployment rate to be higher six months from now, over two-thirds expect it to be higher one year from now.

The two factors that respondents believe will have the most significant impact on the economy in 1988 are the presidential election (33%) and the federal budget deficit (27%).

CPAs are not overly optimistic about the impact of the Tax Reform Act of 1986 on the economic growth of the country to improve or remain about the same over the next six months. On the other hand, nearly half those

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CPAs concerned about economic outlook

According to a recent poll of members of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants (AICPA), the nation's short-term economic outlook continues to be positive. Unfortunately, results show a somewhat gloomier outlook for the longer term.

Surveys were mailed to 4,000 certified public accountants (CPAs) nationwide on April 18. A thirty-percent response rate was achieved. Each question asked for the respondents' view on the status of various economic indicators both six months and one year from now.

"Because we are professionals who act as consultants to business, financial, managerial and operational issues, the results of this survey offer a unique perspective on the national economy," said Joel J. Rogoff, CPA, president of the New Jersey Society of Certified Public Accountants (NJSCPA).

Ninety percent of the national sampling expect general business conditions in the country to improve during the next year. Additionally, while only one percent of respondents expect a recession, nearly half those

asked expect conditions to worsen one year from now. The overall discouraging long-term outlook is based on the respondents' expectations of specific business and economic indicators. Seventy-two percent of CPAs responding expect higher prices a year from now. Thirty-eight percent expect a higher interest rate six months from now, compared to nearly seventy-five percent who expect higher rates in one year. While only eleven percent of the respondents expect the unemployment rate to be higher than now, nearly 30 percent expect it to be higher three times as many—thirty-five percent—expect it to be higher one year from now.

The two factors that respondents believe will have the most significant impact on the economy in 1988 are the presidential election (33%) and the federal budget deficit (27%).

CPAs are not overly optimistic about the impact of the Tax Reform Act of 1986 on economic growth. Sixty-one percent believe TRA '86 will hinder economic growth during the next year. Additionally, while only five percent of respondents expect

to see the public interest, the AICPA and fifty-four independent state CPA organizations work to promote a greater public awareness and understanding of the high quality of diverse services provided by CPAs, and continue to further the CPA profession's image as chief advisors to the business community and individuals.

The 90-year-old New Jersey Society of CPAs represents 11,000 members in public practice, industry, government and education.

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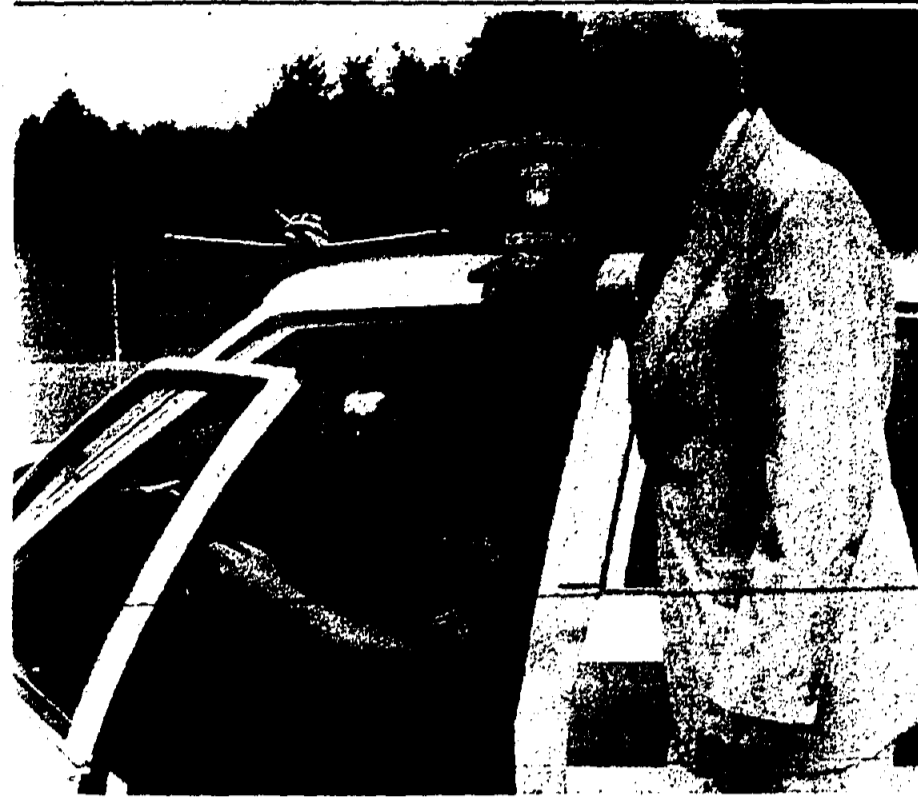

Rahway Police to stress safety in polishing pursuit skills

Corporal Daniel Stone of the Rahway Police Department recently participated in the American Automobile Association's Driver Improvement Program Instructor Certification Workshop. Corporal Stone is now qualified to teach AAA's Driver Improvement Program to officers in his own police department as well as members of the community.

Corporal Stone was one of 14 officers from police departments in Essex, Morris and Union counties to enroll in the program sponsored by the N.J. Automobile Club Foundation for Safety.

During the past three years, accidents involving officers on patrol or in pursuit of another vehicle resulted in significant injury and vehicle damage costs for the 14 participating police departments. The AAA Driver Improvement Program Instructor Certification workshop trains participants how to instruct others in safe driving techniques and is used regularly by the U.S. Navy and Air Force.

Through classroom sessions and road-performance-under-stress tests, participants learn how to teach time-space management, searching for potential risks while driving, effective decision making, and proper responses for emergency situations.

"My driving skills, especially as they relate to emergency situations, have really been put to the test in this course," said Corporal Stone. "The information and skills I gained from this course will not only help improve the driving skills of our officers but reduce the amount of time and money lost due to injury, vehicle repair, and increased insurance costs. Because of their improved pursuit skills, our officers will also be able

to avoid placing pedestrians and other motorists at risk."

The AAA Driver Improvement Program Instructor Certification Workshop was conducted at the Morris County Fire and Police Academy and the Essex County Airport in Caldwell by Charles Butler, a member of the AAA's national staff.
