

Citizens group launches attack against UCUA incinerator site

A citizens group composed of residents from the First and Fourth Wards has filed a complaint against the Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA) trying to void the sale of land where Rahway's proposed resource recovery facility is to be built.

The property is a parcel of land bordered by Route 1 and the Rahway River and was used as a site for the storage, handling and disposal of hazardous substances and hazardous wastes, according to the complaint.

Thomas Germino, an attorney representing the Concerned Citizens for the Environment, announced

last Thursday that a complaint against the UCUA, Dorbett, Inc., previous owners of the 22-acre site and John Sisto, present owner of Dorbett, Inc., has been filed in Superior Court, Chancery Division.

The complaint includes two counts, said Germino. He cited violation of the Environmental Clean-up Responsibility Act (ECRA), a state law which requires property on which hazardous waste has been disposed to be cleaned up prior to sale.

The property was purchased by the UCUA before any clean-up was ordered, in direct violation of ECRA, said Germino. Estimated

costs of the clean-up are between \$6 and \$10 million. "This cost has been transferred from private responsibility to a responsibility born by the taxpayers of Rahway and Union County," said Germino.

The second count charges violation of the Spill Compensation and Control Act

(Spill Act) in that discharges of hazardous materials have seeped into ground water and into the Rahway River. Germino said a soil report has shown that at the time of sale the property was contaminated with petroleum hydrocarbons and toxic heavy metals including lead and mercury at levels above those permitted under ECRA. Contamination has also resulted in the discharge of lead, mercury and other pollutants into the Rahway River.

"We believe that proponents of the incinerator are attempting to bypass environmental requirements of the law in acquiring and

operating incineration in New Jersey in a manner that would protect the health and safety of residents," he said. "It is ironic to see, under their nose, a site contaminated with hazardous materials not being cleaned up. Anything less than strict enforcement shows that the DEP is allowing less than

compliance with the law." Councilman Jerry Coleman, founder of the citizen's group, said officials have been approached on the local, county and state level. "Our concerns fell on deaf ears," he said. "We felt the only alternative we had was to take this action. The DEP

in their vicious support of this project, is willing to take any action to get this facility built. We are seeking support not only from residents of the First and Fourth Wards, but from citizens throughout the community and from surrounding communities."

Hartnett's salary hike remains hot issue

An ordinance allowing residents to voice their opinions at special meetings called by Rahway's Municipal Council was approved for first reading at the council's regular monthly meeting held last week.

Residents were not allowed to speak at special meetings called in addition to regularly scheduled council meetings in the past.

The council could take action, but residents were held mute by a previously ap-

proved section of the code of the City of Rahway. The ordinance, amending this code, allows residents an opportunity to speak immediately following the call to order and preceding the introduction of any items on the special meeting agenda.

The ordinance was introduced by Councilman James Fulcomer and was seconded by Councilman Jerry Coleman.

"This ordinance will allow citizens interested in any agenda item to have the op-

portunity to speak," said Coleman. "It is a good step for the council to take to continue with citizens' input."

A public hearing and possible final adoption of this ordinance will be held on November 19.

The council also approved for second reading a salary ordinance which again drew fire from Republican councilman against the business administrator's increase in salary.

Councilman James Fulcomer said that Business Administrator Joseph Hartnett's salary would total more than \$90,000. Fulcomer said Hartnett's base salary of \$60,000, added to a \$13,250 stipend from the water utility combined with longevity benefits would make him the highest paid business administrator in Union County.

Councilman George Wagenhoffer moved to delete the water utility stipend from Hartnett's salary.

"When I was elected, people told me to keep an eye on the administration, the budget and taxes," said Wagenhoffer. "A \$60,000 salary with a \$13,250 stipend is almost a 20 percent increase. This is not a political issue, it is clearly an issue between right and wrong."

The move to delete the water utility stipend was defeated and the discussion then rapidly deteriorated into cross accusations of political speeches. The ordinance was finally approved with Councilmen Fulcomer and Wagenhoffer opposed. In other business the council:

— Approved for first reading an ordinance specifying handicapped parking on Montgomery Street in front of residence 2087.

— Approved a resolution authorizing the sale of abandoned motor vehicles by the Police Department on Wed-

nesday, October 19, at 10 a.m. at Police Headquarters, 11 a.m. at Ryan's Garage, Westfield Avenue and at noon at Johnny's Garage, Bridge Street.

Approved a resolution accepting a bid of \$22,972 from Barnes Chevrolet for two dump trucks. Voting against this resolution were Councilmen Fulcomer and Wagenhoffer, abstaining was Councilman Harvey Williams and not voting was Councilman Coleman. Reiterating his stand against companies that have holdings in South Africa, Coleman said, "I have to ask myself what is more important, the people in South Africa being free of the yoke of oppression or two Chevrolet dump trucks."

Approved a resolution authorizing the final payment for the reconstruction of Johnson Street.

Approved a resolution appointing Anthony Deiga as Local Registrar of Vital Statistics.

Approved a resolution for the insertion of \$1,957 in the budget for a Drunk Driving Enforcement Fund.

Committee votes lid on lottery lure

A Senate committee voted last month to approve Senate President John F. Russo's bill to stop the state from spending millions of dollars annually to entice people to gamble on the lottery.

"The lottery's own demographic shows that too many very poor people in this state are throwing away a considerable portion of

their income on lottery tickets every week," Senator Russo said.

"The state shouldn't be in the business of encouraging people to gamble a way money they cannot afford to lose," Senator Russo said.

"These slick advertisements obscure the fact that the odds of winning are long and that people who buy lottery tickets play against a stacked deck."

The odds of winning a "Pick-6" are 5.25 million to one — a fact many lottery players don't realize, Senator Russo said. It's actually more likely that a person will die in a car crash (5,000-to-one odds) than it is for him to win a million dollar lottery prize.

Senator Russo's legislation, S. 106, would abolish all forms of lottery advertising

including print ads, radio and television commercials. The bill, which was approved 4-1 by the Senate State Government Committee, now advances to the full Senate for consideration.

Senator Russo noted that lottery advertising will cost the state's taxpayers an estimated \$2.6 million this fiscal year alone.
