

## The Brain-Wrist Connection And How It Can Be Harnessed To Save The World

I recently took advantage of a bargain offer in national magazine to have my signature analyzed by a professional handwriting analyst. The result came in the mail a few days ago. It was quite detailed and quite interesting. In fact, so impressed was I with the analyst's ability to describe the "real me" just from my signature, and without even having met me to see how I dressed and combed my hair, that it set me thinking about how this neglected tool could be effectively harnessed for the good of mankind. First, I think the government should license all handwriting analysts, and the granting of the license should be based on a scrupulous assessment not only of the analyst's professed skill, but also of his or her susceptibility to bribery. The latter determination could be made by (you guessed it) handwriting analysis - by a licensed analyst, of

Now with analysts licensed and their analyses therefore quite trustworthy, employers could require job applicants to include approved handwriting analyses with their customarily exaggerated resumes. Now the person hired to deal with the public would likely be more courteous, more likely to know the right answers and less likely to say "We'll take care of it" without really meaning it. Among others who could make effective use of such

analyses are the various government agencies that issue licenses of all sorts - motor vehicle, County Clerk, State Medical Review Board, etc. — and, of course, the agency that licenses handwriting analysts. But here's the best part: We could save all of those millions of dollars that now get thrown away on sheer rhetoric in political campaigns and, instead, simply subject the candidates to handwriting analyses, carefully overseen by a select, unbiased panel of Quakers and Rosicrucians.
