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Rent strike heats up

Court puts payments in escrow

Tenants involved in litigation against their landlord showed their dedication to the cause by picketing their apartment building during the pouring rain on Sunday morning.

Representative of the Shami Apartments tenants association marched in front of 400-402 Hamilton Street carrying placards asking for needed repairs to the buildings. "We want regular heat and water" read one sign carried by a tenant. "Building unsafe for children" read another.

Five tenants represented by the association have withheld their rent in protest of living conditions they call "unhealthy." The group appeared in court on November 16, where their rent monies were put in an escrow account until the landlord, known as the Shami Associates of Edison, has completed necessary repairs.

A hearing date of December 19 has been set and if repairs have not been completed, the tenants may have their rents reduced, according to Anna Prizzi, spokesperson for the group.

Frank Dickenson, a youngster who lives in the complex, said that someone from the office of Shami Associates told his mother that the judge settled the litigation and that Ms. Dickenson must pay her rent by November 18. "That was an outright lie," said Prizzi. "This hasn't been settled yet."

Complaints range from no screens and broken windows to no heat and hot water, infestation, holes in the ceilings, weak floor boards, open sewer pipes and structural defects. "We're tired of

it," said Prizzi. "We can't live like this anymore."
Residents of the Shami Apartments pay between \$500 and \$700 per month for

a one- or two-bedroom apartment in the 52-unit building.
"This is terrible and it is getting worse," said Victor

Texidor, president of the tenants association. "We think we deserve better conditions than these. Management has taken advantage of

most of these people. Many of us are Hispanic and we don't know the language and we don't know the law."
Texidor said that when his

apartment was without water for several days, the owners told him to go to the river to bathe. "We feel ashamed of the conditions of

these buildings, he said. "We don't want to bring anyone here. We worry about our families and the health of our children."

County ahead of schedule on recycling

Union County is exceeding New Jersey's mandated recycling goal more than one year ahead of schedule by recycling an average of 17.28 percent of its residential and commercial waste stream, according to figures released by the Union County Utilities Authority (UCUA).

The 17.28 percent figure represents the combined recycling efforts of the county's 21 municipalities and is based on 35,157 tons of recyclable materials collected during the first six months of this year.

The Statewide Recycling Act, signed into law by Gov. Thomas Kean on April 20, 1987, requires that a minimum of 15 percent of the municipal solid waste stream be recycled one year after the N.J. Dept. of Environmental Protection approves the county's recycling plan. The recycling law also sets a 25 percent requirement for 1990.

"The fact that we have not only met but exceeded the state's goal is proof of Union County's commitment to recycling," UCUA Chairman Louis A. Santagata said. "Reaching this goal before plan puts us in great shape to meet and exceed future requirements."

The UCUA Regional Recycling Program provides curbside pickup of recyclables in Berkeley Heights, Cranford, Mountainside, New Providence, Plainfield, Rahway, Scotch Plains, Springfield, Summit, Westfield and Winfield. District Recycling Coordinator Joan Buhrendorf explained that the 17.28 percent figure also includes recyclables collected in curbside and depot recycling programs operating in the remaining 10 municipalities.

"All of Union County's residents and businesses should be commended for contributing to this achievement," said Buhrendorf.

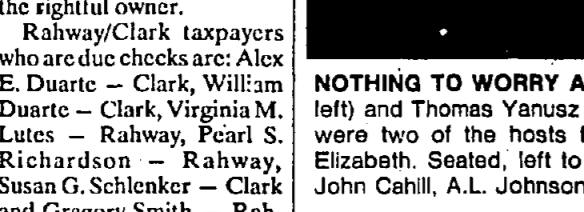
The Internal Revenue Service is trying to locate nearly 2,000 New Jerseyans to give them refund checks returned by the Postal Service as "undeliverable."

She spoke at a recent meeting of the club, reporting that there were over 27,000 cases of oral cancer, in many forms, in the U.S. last year, and that with no testing method currently available, cancers are not caught early and the cure rate is only about 50%. Men over 40 are twice as apt to get oral cancer, and, if they smoke and drink, the odds increase, said Feinberg, noting that there has been a reduction in smoking, but an increase of 11% a year in the use of smokeless tobaccos. This trend, she said, has led health officials to believe that oral cancer will also increase at this rate. She advises against the use of chewing tobacco and snuff. Young men who look up to baseball heroes that make use of these products are especially susceptible to the health hazards they pose. 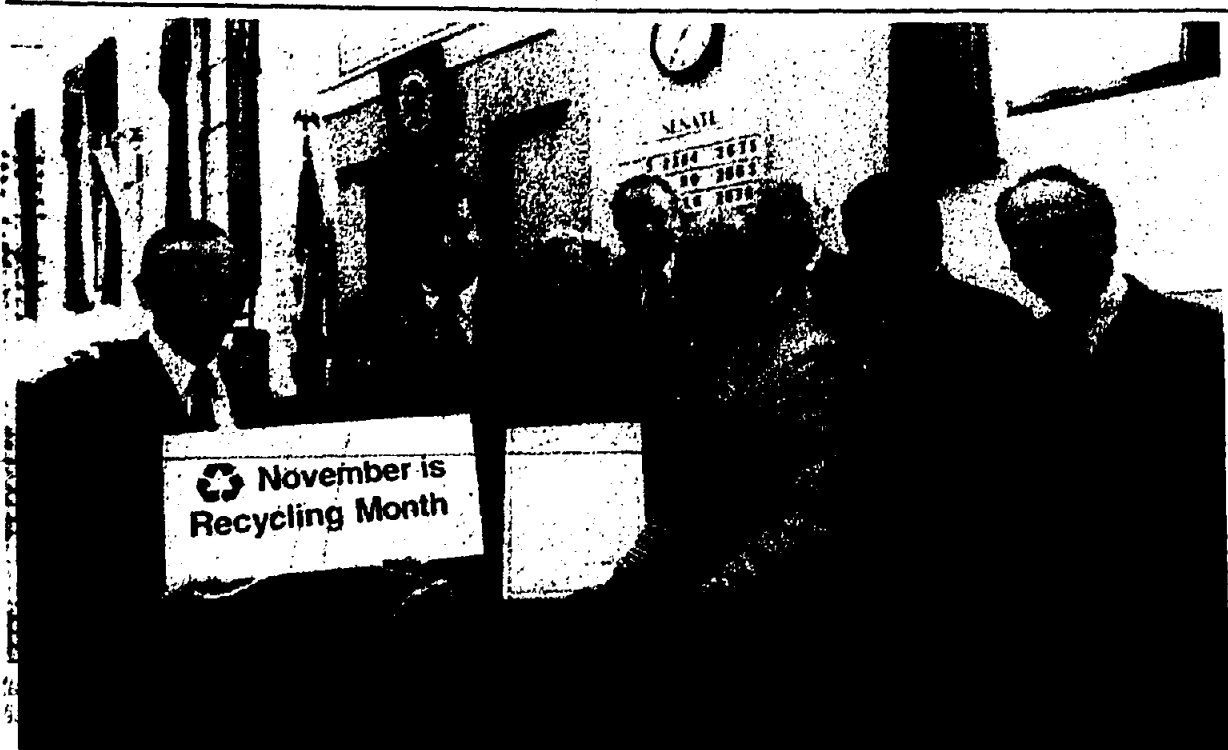

Fingernails can put the finger on health problems

There is more to fingernails than biting, filing, and polishing. Changes in their color, texture and shape provide important clues to our health, reports the November 1988 Reader's Digest. Here are some of the more common nail abnormalities that may help your doctor diagnose a major illness:

- 1. Clubbing.** The nail has an exaggerated upward curve and curls around the fingertips. Clubbing may indicate emphysema, tuberculosis, cardiovascular disease, ulcerative colitis or cirrhosis.
- 2. Blue moons.** A blue tint to the lunula, or moon, at the base of the nail can signify impaired circulation, heart disease or Raynaud's syndrome — spasms of the arteries of the fingers and toes.
- 3. Spoon nails.** The nail is depressed and looks flat or scooped. This condition is associated with iron-deficiency anemia, syphilis, thyroid disorders and rheumatoid fever.
- 4. Lindsay's nails.** The half near the nail tip appears pink or brown while the half near the cuticle appears white. This can be a sign of chronic kidney failure.
- 5. Beau's lines.** Depressed horizontal furrows across the nail are caused by malnutrition or any severe illness that temporarily interferes with nail growth, such as measles, mumps and heart attack.
- 6. Terry's nails.** Most of the skin under the nail ap-

County declares 'Caregivers Week'

The Union County Board of Chosen Freeholders has declared the week of Nov. 20-26 as "National Family Caregivers Week" in the county, announced Freeholder William H. Eldridge, liaison to the Advisory Council on Aging.

"Family caregivers carry a big load on their shoulders, resulting in stressful situations," Eldridge said. "Other responsibilities they have often suffer due to the assistance they give in caring for older loved ones, it is only fitting that Thanksgiving week is designated to honor these special people."

The Division on Aging of the Union County Department of Human Services has a Respite Care Program that provides relief to adult individuals experiencing fatigue and stress associated with long-term caregiving, according to Philip Pearlman, Director of the Division on Aging.

The program substitutes an occasional homemaker, home health and/or adult day care services for the caregiver, temporarily freeing the caregiver to attend to personal needs or restoration recreation.

The program is available to caregivers over the age of 18, who are responsible for the daily care of an impaired adult. Only the impaired adult's income and resources are considered for eligibility, and the amount of service time offered is evaluated on a case-by-case basis.

Shoplifting prevention seminars for students

The Union County Youth Service Bureau (YSB) of the Department of Human Services, has begun a program of shoplifting prevention seminars for county school children, to make them aware of the consequences of shoplifting, announced Jeffrey W. Maccarrelli, Union County Freeholder and liaison to the Juvenile Detention Advisory Board.

The seminars, which are 45 minutes long, are presented in classrooms and include a film and discussion developed to make youngsters aware of the fact that shoplifting is a crime and can affect their lives.

"By January, nearly every school in Union County will have pupils arrested on shoplifting charges," Maccarrelli said. "Youngsters often become involved in shoplifting on a dare, or as a prank and seldom realize the seriousness of the offense. This program is designed to keep youngsters out of the juvenile system."

The seminars are the first for children in the classroom, grades six to twelve, according to Eleanor Wojnowski, Supervisor of the Division of Youth Services, who runs the program. Shoplifting prevention seminars are held in the YSB office for high school students once per month.

Low-income families qualify for fuel aid

Effective Nov. 1, nearly 125,000 low-income families in New Jersey can now apply for winter fuel assistance through the \$73.8 million Home Energy Assistance Program.

The program is funded by \$53.8 million in federal block grant and \$20 million in Oil Overcharge funds that have been earmarked to assist eligible individuals and families with heating and medically required cooling costs in 1989.

"Heating assistance payments will vary by income, household size, fuel type and heating region," says Human Services Commissioner Drew Altman, "but, basically, the average payment should be about \$955."

The following income eligibility requirements must be met:

- A household of one must have a gross monthly income of no more than \$721; a household of two, \$966; a household of three, \$1,211; and a household of four, \$1,456.
- For each additional family member, add \$245.

Families receiving Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) or food stamps will automatically receive heating benefits through April 1989. And recipients of Supplemental Security Income (SSI) who may be eligible for HEA benefits will receive information from county welfare agencies.

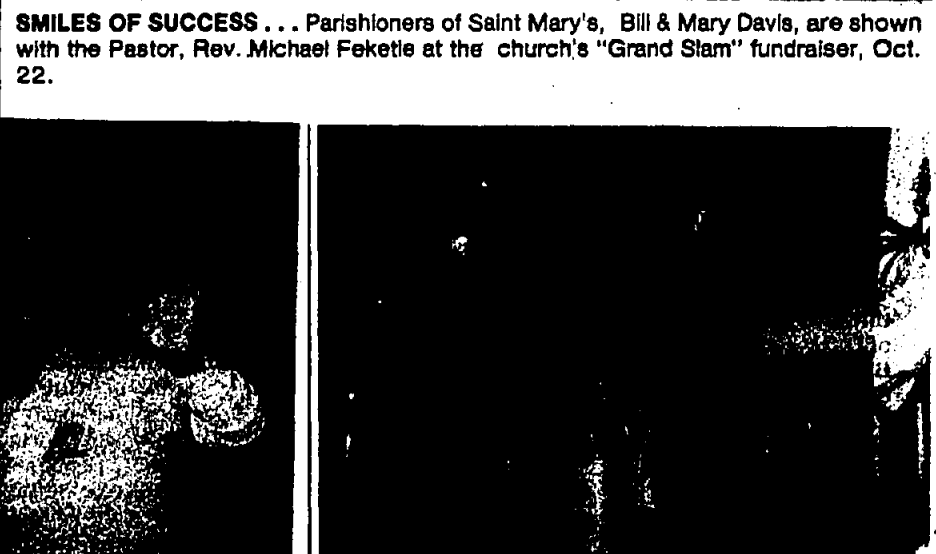

 16 oz. mandarin oranges, drained
 2 tsp. currants
 Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. In a baking dish, lay the chicken in a single layer, breast side up. Mix together the apricot nectar, pineapple juice and mint, and pour over the chicken. Lay the onion slices and shredded carrots over the chicken. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Add the fruit on the sides of the dish, and sprinkle with the currants. Return to the oven for another 10 minutes, or until the chicken is done.
 The recipe should yield four servings, each containing 404 calories, 107 mg. of sodium and 5 grams of fat. It derives only 11 percent of its calories from fat.

It can change your life

One day you're young, successful, and on top of the world, and then the unthinkable happens. You're diagnosed as having cancer. "Can't happen to me," you say - and it did to Joseph Heines.

A successful 36-year-old economist employed by one of New Jersey's leading corporations, Heines (not his real name) was diagnosed as having acute myelocytic leukemia shortly after learning his wife, Betty, was pregnant with their second child. Betty had just passed the New Jersey bar exam, preparing to return to the workforce. Instead, news of her husband's illness meant giving up career aspirations in favor of family care.

"Joseph needed a sterile environment after the chemotherapy to reduce the risk of infection. That meant staying up all three in the morning cleaning. It also meant that I had to do everything I could to help him. No fruit with skin, because it would cause irritation. Things like this were sprayed with, and of course, no salad because of the contact with the ground," Betty explained.

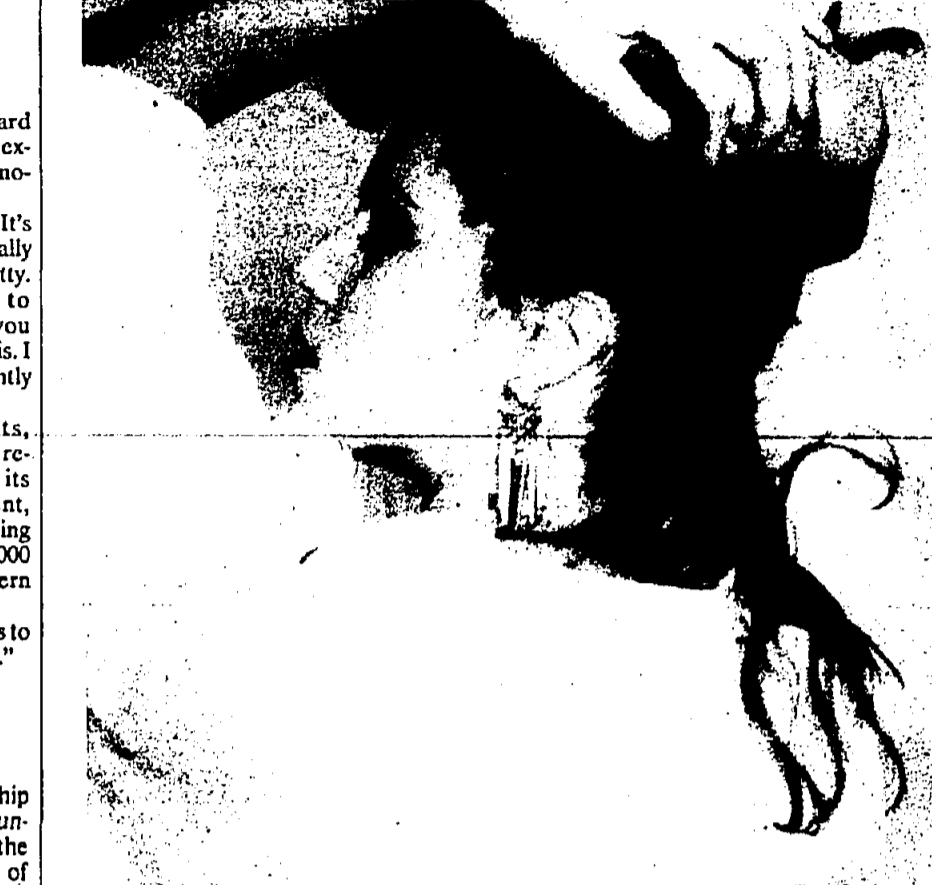
"I was drained, taking care of Joseph, the household and running after our very active son, Michael. I needed help!"

Luckily, her sister-in-law, a nurse, located Cancer Care, a non-profit social service agency founded in 1984 to help patients, their families and friends cope with the impact of cancer. In New Jersey, Cancer Care serves New Jersey clients from its offices in Millburn, Ridgewood and Metuchen.

"Cancer Care changed my whole life," Betty says. "They came through when no one else did, and that includes the big national cancer organizations. Without Cancer Care's help, Joseph wouldn't have survived the summer. We couldn't have made it without them. Cancer Care was there for real reasons."

For families like the Heines, coping with cancer gives rise to a host of ancillary problems. For many, it means greatly restricted finances. For the Heines, finding child care assistance for young Michael and housekeeping assistance for Betty added to the burden.

After a quick evaluation, Cancer Care provided the Heines with immediate help for Michael's child care and Betty's housekeeping. The organization also

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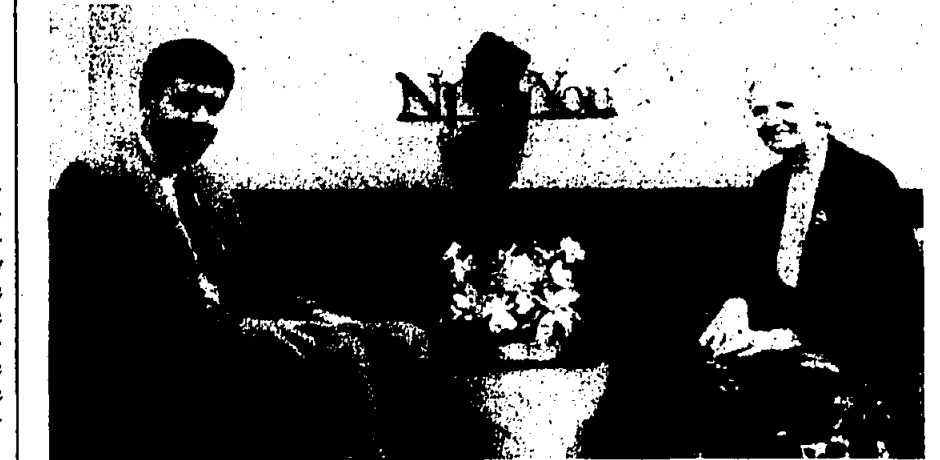
