# Chamber probes downtown redevelopment options

by Pat DiMaggio Rahway's Chamber of Commerce has undertaken a study of the downtown area to develop a plan for

the best use of the City's commercial land. "The chamber recognizes

the need to undertake a major downtown survey and redevelopment plan," said James Kennedy, Chamber president.

The Chamber of Commerce prepared a request for a study for the N.J. State Planners Association said Kennedy, Requests were mailed out to 20 top planners in the state, and eight proposals to under-

take the downtown development plan were received.

A subcommittee composed of Chamber members, City officials and representatives from Merck & Co. selected the consulting firm of Harvey Moskowitz. Merck has given a corporate gift of \$20,000 to provide a cornerstone for the redevelop-

ment plan, said Kennedy. The nine month plan will cost \$40,000, according to Kennedy. "Studies have come and gone," he said. "We will look at past studies concerning the Parking Authority and business retentions and formulate an


