

Has firsthand knowledge of the situation there

by Pat DiMaggio In 1984, Jack Benun was one of the first Americans to move his company to the Peoples Republic of China. In spite of recent developments in that country. Benun is anxious to go back and expects to expand his opera-

Benun, founder and president of Concord Camera Corporation, with its head office located on Pinewood Street in Rahway, is still optimistic about the economic climate in China.

Benun got his start in the camera business by working for a relative who owned a small company. He greatly expanded that company and at the age of 30, retired a millionaire.

During the years he was actively employed, Benun transacted business in the Orient and learned firsthand the workings of the Chinese people, their government and their culture. In the early 1980's, when the Peoples Republic of China (PRC) opened its doors to outside investors, he jumped back into the camera business by being the first to move his assembly opera-

tions there. In 1984, Concord Camera established operations in Shenzhen, one of the oconomic zones set up the

tors and free enterprise to flourish in an otherwise communist-controlled country.

When Benun first opened his factory in Shenzhen, his was one of only a few manufacturing plants operated by outside investors. Today, he says, Shenzhen bears a striking resemblance to down town Manhattan.

"When I first arrived, there were only about six buildings, and every man, woman and child wore Mao garb. Today, there are tens of thousands of businesses in

Benun recently closed out his operations in Shenzhen and moved 20 minutes away to Boaen County. He employs 2,000 workers and provides dormitories and dining facilities. Workers carn \$40 a month, considered good wages in that

country. During the four-and-ahalf years Benun has been operating facilities in the PRC, the government has kept every promise it ever made, he said. "The capital-istic bug is definitely within

Students and the govern ment have the same goods, according to Besun. "they both want to bring in foreign investors, technology and knowledge to build up the country. They just have different methods of obtaining that goal.

The important difference between the central government and the local government, Benun says, is that local government is on the spot and has the ability to be flexible for businesses that come in. "Central government has to manage 1.2 bil-lion people and, therefore, they have no flexibility."
