## Arts Center to be granted fire exit easement

By Pat DiMaggio City government entered the "summer doldrums" when only two residents and this reporter attended last week's meeting of Rahway's Municipal Council.

A decided lack of interest in local legislative affairs has plagued Rahway in recent years. Most meetings, other than those dealing with introduction and adoption of the City budget. are attended by only a handful of residents.

In addition to resolutions refunding overpayment of water bills and taxes paid in error, the council approved for first reading an ordinance which would prohibit parking at all times on portions of Irving Street and Campbell Street, designated a portion of Campbell Street as a loading zone, and designated portions of Bond Street and Cora Street as handicapped parking zones.

The ordinance would prohibit parking at all times on the east side of Irving Street from Central Avenue to a point 100 feet south and on the east side of Campbell Street from a point 83 feet south of Elm Avenue and for a distance of 100 feet.

A section of Campbell Street on the west side would be designated as a loading zone starting at a point 225 feet south of Elm Avenue and extending a distance of 60 feet.

The idea for the Torch relay the Special Olympics Run began in New Jersey in torch to Princeton Univer-1984 with a relay from Liberty State Park to Rutgers sity, the site of the 1989 Spe-Stadium for the opening ceremonies of the 1984 Special Olympic Summer Games. Since its inception. the event has become larger each year. Today, over 1,000 law enforcement officers cover nearly 1,000 miles across the state. To date, \$500,000 in donations has

been raised.

New Jersey Special Olympics is a non-profit organization providing sports training and athletic competition for children and adults with mental retardation. Thanks to the support of thousands of law enforcement officials, companies and organizations, the New Jersey Law Enforcement Torch Run has become a major promotional and fund-raising event to support the Summer Games. Last year, over 500 law enforcement officers participated in the Torch Run, raising over \$108,000. This year, organizers hope to raise over \$150,000. Members of Rahway's Police Department will be relaying the Special Olympics torch from the Linden line to the Woodbridge line along St. Georges Avenue
