Governor Thomas H. Kean, a Republican, will end his term in office in 1989. The minimum age for gubernatorial candidates is 30 and each term runs for four years. The salary for governor in New Jersey in \$85,000 per year. His functions include seeing that laws are faithfully executed, and he has the powers of appointment and dismissal. He can call special sessions of the legislature and approve or veto legislative bills Address: The Honorable

Two U.S. senators are elected from each state. The minimum age for senatorial members of the United States Congress is 30 years and each term runs for six years. Senators receive a salary of \$89,500 plus \$48,000 for expenses and allowances for office staff. based on the state's population. Their functions include legislating on the federal level. They have the power to ratify U.S. treaties with foreign governments and confirm or veto Presidential appointments. The 101st Congress also acts as a Court of Impeachment.
