### Post office has clerical openings

The U.S. Postal Service/Newark Field Division has announced it is seeking applicants to take the entrance examination for positions as Clerk-Stenographers and Clerk-Typists. Applications will be accepted for the position of Clerk-Stenographer indefinitely. Clerk-Typist applications will be accepted until September 21.

Form 2479-A/B for the Clerk-Stenographer and Clerk-Typist positions can be obtained at local post offices having ZIP Codes beginning with 070, 071, 072, and 073. Applicants will be notified of date, time, and place of examination and will be sent sample questions. Test scores will be used for establishing eligibility registers for the Newark Field Division areas.

Those eligible for Clerk-Stenographer and Clerk-Typist positions may be considered for employment in the Newark Field Division areas, including its associate offices. Clerk-Typist applicants must qualify to type 45 words per minute. Clerk-Stenographer applicants must qualify to type 45 words per minute and take dictation at 80 words per minute.

Following is a list of elected officials on the state level, their functions and addresses. Rahway residents may wish to contact their representatives for matters of information and communication.

Governor Thomas H. Kean, a Republican, will end his term in office in 1989. The minimum age for gubernatorial candidates is 30 and each term runs for four years. The salary for governor in New Jersey is \$85,000 per year. His functions include seeing that laws are faithfully executed, and he has the powers of appointment and dismissal. He can call special sessions of the legislature and approve or veto legislative bills.

Two U.S. senators are elected from each state. The minimum age for senatorial members of the United States Congress is 30 years and each term runs for six years. Senators receive a salary of \$89,500 plus \$48,000 for expenses and allowances for office staff, based on the state's population. Their functions include legislating on the federal level. They have the power to ratify U.S. treaties with foreign governments and confirm or veto Presidential appointments. The 101st Congress also acts as a Court of Impeachment.

One representative is elected from each of 14 Congressional Districts in New Jersey. The term of office is for two years, elected in even numbered years with a minimum age of 25. The salary for each member of Congress is \$89,500, plus an expense allowance and \$394,680 for staff salaries. Their functions include legislating on the federal level and originating all revenue measures. They also have the power to vote impeachment charges.

The N.J. State House, located in Trenton, is a 500-year-old building. One member of the Assembly from each of the state's 40 legislative districts. Senators receive a salary of \$25,000 and hold a term of four years, except for the term following each census in which they are limited to two years.

The present Senator's terms end in 1991. Their functions are to legislate on the state level and to originate revenue measures. They also have the sole power to vote impeachment charges.

Members of the Assembly hold a two-year term of office, receive a salary of \$25,000 and must be at least 25 years of age. Present members' terms end in 1989. Their functions are the same as Legislative Senators.

Rahway, which falls into the 20th District, is represented by Senator Raymond Lesniak and Assemblymen Thomas J. Deveris and George Hudak, all Democrats.

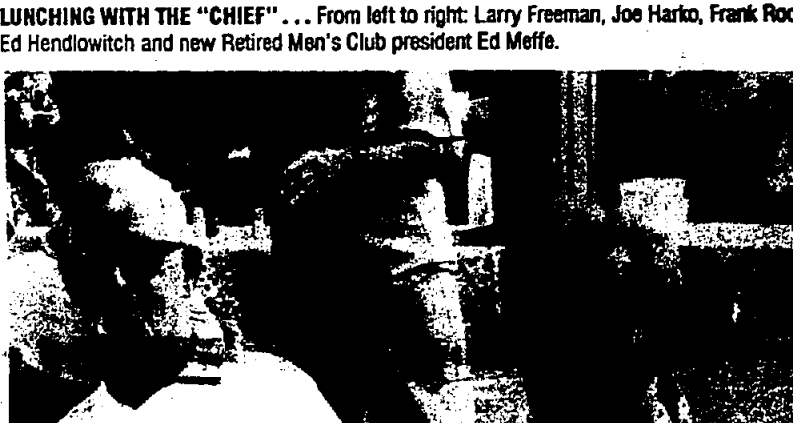

**Resource Recovery Update**

(NOTE: The following is the 1st in a series of articles prepared by the Railway Community Action Organization, Inc., whose motto is "We build bridges, not monuments.")

**Municipal Solid Waste Incinerators**

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) predicts that 25 percent of the nation's garbage — some 80 billion pounds per year — will be incinerated by 1990.

U.S. citizens generate more garbage than any other nation — over 100 million tons each year, or more than 1200 pounds per person. EPA expects this to increase to more than 2300 pounds per person each year within the next 12 years.

Whether recycled, buried or burned, this refuse and its ultimate fate heavily impacts the public health, the environment and the economy.

What's the Garbage?

According to EPA, this is the general composition of household garbage:

Paper and paperboard	41.0%
Yard wastes	17.9%
Metals	8.7%
Glass	8.2%
Rubber, leather, textiles, wood	8.1%
Food wastes	7.9%
Plastic	6.5%
Miscellaneous inorganic wastes	1.6%

Most of these components are either fully or partially recyclable.

Where Does Garbage Go?

Approximately 80 percent of U.S. garbage is currently buried in landfills. The groundwater pollution caused by landfills has fueled both public and regulatory opposition to new sites. Since existing landfills are reaching capacity, new methods of managing municipal waste are needed.

Approximately 10 percent of municipal solid waste is recycled. In the process, wastes are separated at their sources, first in homes and businesses, then further at recycling centers. The separated components — paper, glass, metal, etc. — are reintroduced into the marketplace as useful, saleable raw material.

Approximately 10 percent of municipal solid waste is incinerated. Wastes are burned and converted into gases and ashes. The gases are released into the air and the ashes are buried in landfills. Both the gases and ashes from municipal incinerators contain toxic chemicals and harmful heavy metals.

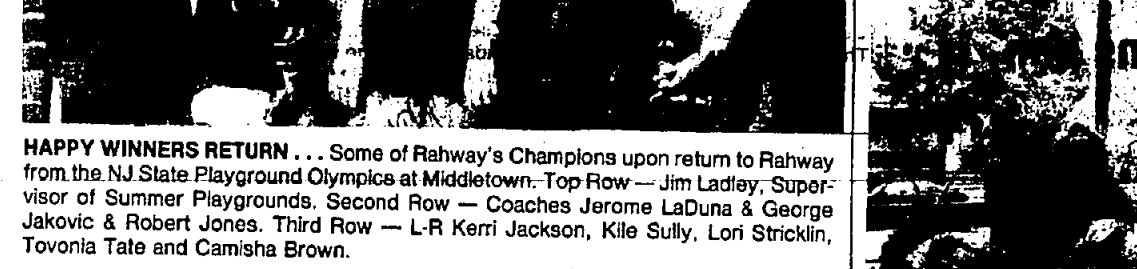

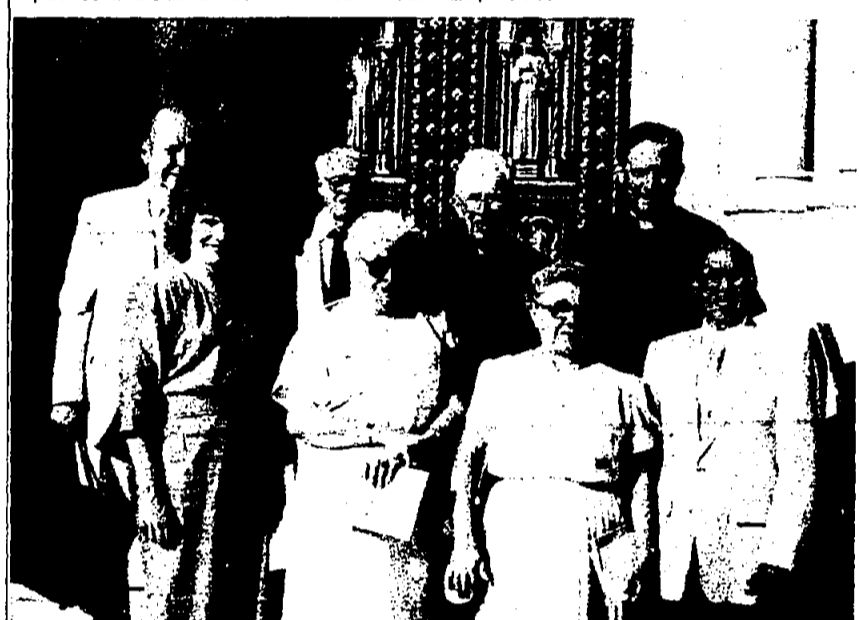

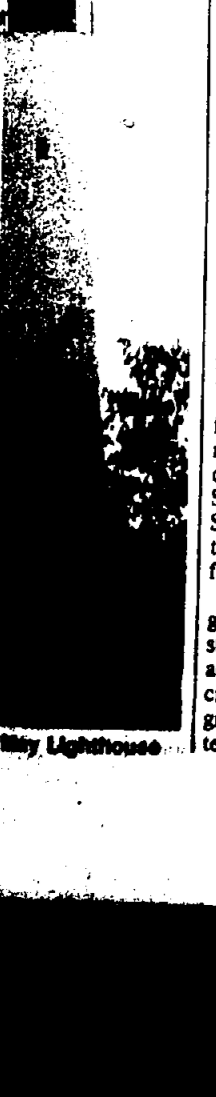
