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## Harrison St. re-do close to being realized

Council also approves purchase of new police cars, pledges support for sr. tax relief

At its regular meeting Monday night, Rahway's Municipal Council approved for second reading a bond ordinance that will authorize the reconstruction of a City street, and approved the purchase of new police vehicles.

The bond ordinance provides for the reconstruction of Harrison Street from St. Georges Avenue to Winfield Street. A portion of the reconstruction costs will be funded by state aid.

"It's taken us many years to get this portion funded," said Councilman Vincent Addona. "This will help the residents living there who are concerned with the safety of their children attending Franklin School. It is a job well done by our administration in getting the funds through."

The council also approved a resolution authorizing the purchase of police vehicles under state contract. Two 1989 Chevrolet Caprices with police packages were purchased from Warnock Fleet of East Hanover for a total of \$27,842.

A resolution supporting the passage of an Assembly Act which would provide property tax relief for senior citizens was also approved by the council. Assembly Act 4044 would establish a cap on an individual's property tax payment at an amount equal to 8 percent of his income, up to a maximum of \$1,000. This cap would apply to all senior

#### Pesticide Control Council membership periled

"New Jersey needs real, not 'pseudo scientific' decisions from the Pesticide Control Council," says Dr. C. Douglass Mampe, a spokesperson for the nonprofit NJ. Pest Control Association.

Dr. Mampe, commenting on legislation introduced by Sen. Raymond Lesniak, said it seeks to alter the membership of the Council away from qualified scientists who can make critical judgments affecting the protection of health and property throughout the state.
