munity, and a good part of your community." Several of the councilmembers questioned the impact of the project on downtown businesses. "We feel this project will activate this area," answered Horowitz. "It will be good for everybody. We expect a hub-

bub of activity here." Business Administrator Hartnett said the project would result in "hundreds of thousands" of dollars in tax revenues and "many hundreds" of permanent jobs. Construction costs will be approximately \$30 to \$40 million, he said.

It takes more than 4,000 people to hand-deliver the various editions of the weekly Guardian.

"I am amazed that here papers are thrown wherever," said Mills. "In England, we must push them fully through the mail slot. As we compete with five other papers in our areas, there is quite a bit of com-
