Board of Ed gives nod to special referendum vote on renovation \$\$

Additional monies necessitated by budget defeat

Rahway's Board of Education approved a resolution preparing for a special election to be held on February 15 to approve a referendum for miscellaneous renovations to various schools in the district.

At its regular meeting held last week, the board approved a resolution setting February 15 for the election and arranging for the publication of military service and civilian absentee ballot notices as required by law. When the board's defeated school budget was

reduced by the council last spring, an agreement was reached whereby additional monies needed for renovations would be raised through a bonding referendum. Business Administrator Anthony Rocco, Jr. said a joint statement would be

released next month from the Municipal Council and the board explaining the referendum. The board also accepted the retirement/resignation of David Robertson, head custodian at the High School and the resignation of LuAnn Favaro, English teacher at the Intermediate School.

Lee Norman, Intermediate School custodian, was appointed as night man in charge at the Intermediate School with an increase of \$350.

Catherine Finizio, Anthony Hall and Patricia Klein were added to the Substitute Teacher List, and the board voted to create and post the position of part-time Resource Room teacher at Roosevelt School for the balance of the 1989-90 school year and to create

and post the position of Resource Room teacher for the Intermediate School for the balance of the school year.

Summer School for grades seven and eight, not to exceed a cost of \$4,500, and Summer School for grades 9-12, at a cost not to exceed \$14,500, were also approved by the board.

In other business the board:

- Approved a motion to accept funds from the State Department of Education, Dwight D. Eisenhower Math and Science Education Act, in the amount of \$5,824.

- Approved a Kindergarten report card.

- Appointed David Stephens as an assistant wrestling coach at \$1,925.

- Corrected the annual

salary of Lawrence Gradman, High School Social Studies Teacher, to \$32,235. - Added Lori Tschoepe, Laura Sperber and Toni Marie Torsello to the Substitute Teachers List.

- Approved submission of an application to the State Department of Education for vocational funding for the following: Handicapped Education-Employment Orientation, \$1,171; Program Development-Marketing Education, \$3,150;

Program Development Co-operative Office Education, \$2,200; Program Development-Business Education, \$10,025.

- Applied to the county superintendent for an Emergency Teacher of the Handicapped Certificate for Lori Tschoepe.

When my granddaddy went to his eternal rest, the last word he whispered through his thin blue lips was "Ophicleide" (or something like that). I've spent the ensuing years in a little quest for the true meaning of that curious word.
I've heard that you are one of the wisest men on earth. Please solve this veiling riddle for me. What does Ophicleide mean?

Bless you, child. You have, of course, come to the right place.

I happen to know that your granddaddy was a great nose-picker whose idea of relaxation was to seat himself at the console of an antique pipe organ and guide his nimble fingers through endless chord progressions.
It is in that connection that I invite you on one of life's most humbling word trips — a scanning of the curious names engraved in the stop keys and draw knobs of a pipe organ's elaborate keyboard.

Come with me, then, to the cavernous and musty auditorium of a just movie palace, where a magnificent but now-silent organ once accompanied the stories told in pantomime on the then-silent screen.

As to why your granddaddy entered this particular name — whether because it was his favorite pipe stop on the organ, or a mere slip of the tongue... or perhaps something he wanted but never could have — I'm afraid I've never known for sure.

But, anyway, there you have it, Virginia. I do hope I've helped.

Students can enter national AAA poster contest

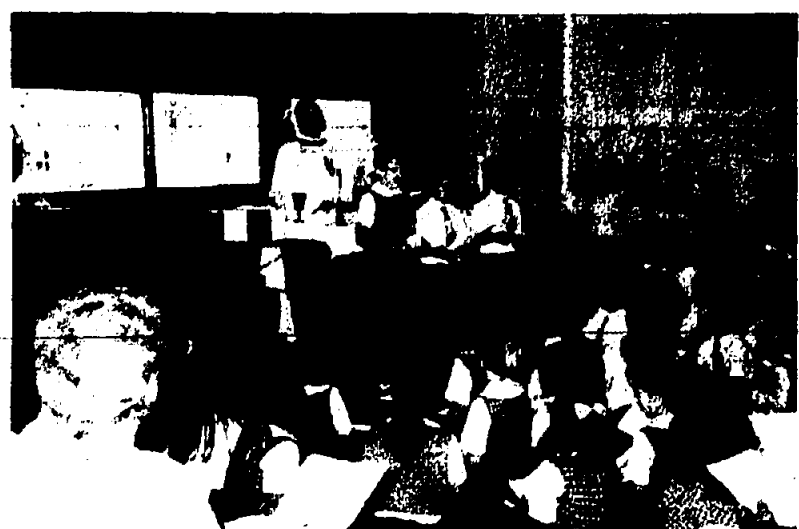

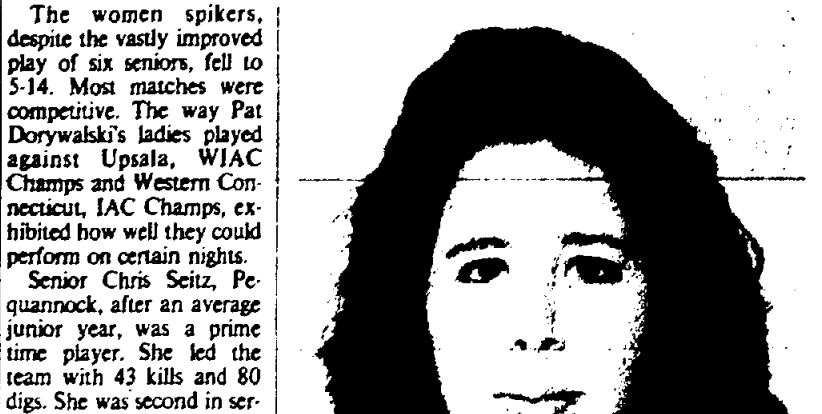

Police train to nab DWI motorists

The N.J. State Police have been awarded a \$145,274 grant by the Division of Highway Traffic Safety to continue a driving-while-intoxicated (DWI) training program. The program will instruct state, county and municipal police officers in a uniform and systematic method of detection, apprehension, processing and prosecution of DWI offenders. "Drivers under the influence of alcohol continue to be one of the nation's most serious public health and safety problems," said Governor Kean. "The police officer's ability to detect and apprehend impaired drivers is crucial to combating this problem." The five-day training program has been updated and includes the horizontal gaze nystagmus method of detection. Horizontal gaze nystagmus refers to an involuntary movement of the eyeball that occurs as the eyes gaze to the side. When a person's blood alcohol content (BAC) is 10 percent or above, the uncontrollable movement of the eyeballs becomes much more distinct. Officers trained in this method of detection will apply the test when they suspect a person is DWI. "As a result of this training program and other DWI programs, arrests and convictions for DWI are rising," said Kean. "This not only gets the drunk driver off the road, but also serves as a deterrent for those who might consider drinking and driving."

Holiday food bingeing a serious problem says Fair Oaks physician

Overeating is a common and often serious problem during the holidays but there are many things you can do to enjoy the holidays and not overeat says Michael M. Newman, M.D., Director of Eating Disorders Program at Fair Oaks Hospital in Summit, N.J. Over the stressful holiday season when most of us are confronted with massive amounts of food at family dinners and office parties, Dr. Newman advises "Take control of your eating habits." "The holidays are food-oriented time of year, associated with family get-togethers and an abundance of food and encouragement to eat, drink and be merry," explains Dr. Newman. "It is a time of year that is too frequently associated with overeating and weight gain. Many of us eat too much and it is not uncommon to put on a few pounds between Thanksgiving and New Year's." However, Dr. Newman adds, "compulsive or abnormal overeating which does not end with the holiday season may be a symptom of a far more serious disease - an eating disorder."

Keep mail path clear of hazards

"Local authorities and the general public can help the U.S. Postal Service deliver the mail as timely and as safely as possible this winter," said Postmaster Joseph P. Rulfo of the Rahway Post Office. Rulfo emphasized the need for ice and snow removal from walkways as a major aid in preventing slips and falls by letter carriers. Other winter hazards that can impede mail delivery, according to the Postmaster, are ice and snow on streets, roads, driveways, stairways and porches. Rulfo asks local road authorities and postal customers to keep public and private approaches to residences and mailboxes clean during the winter months. Last year, thousands of letter carriers across the nation were injured because of hazardous conditions. "The cost of winter accidents is high on the list of human suffering. Equally high is the cost to taxpayers for payments covering lost time resulting from these accidents. Of further concern to the public is the financial burden a postal customer may have to bear due to liability for a letter carrier's accident resulting from hazardous conditions on private property." Postmaster Rulfo says, "The safety of all members of the community, as well as letter carriers, is greatly increased when walking and driving hazards are prevented."

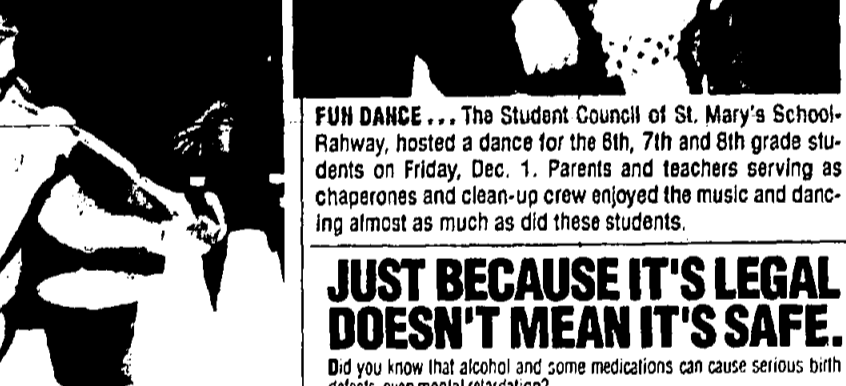

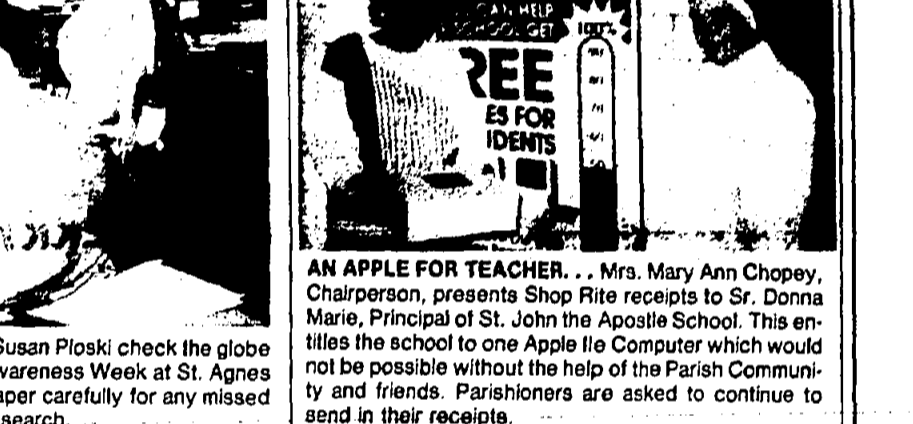

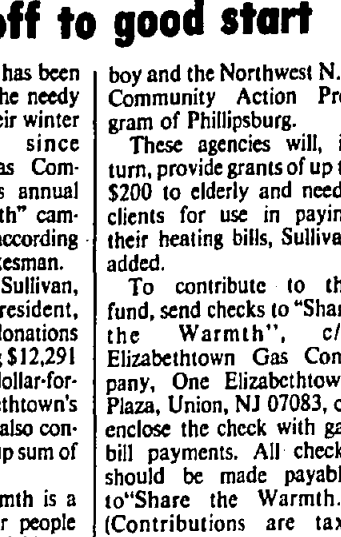
Elizabethtown's 'Share the Warmth' fund off to good start

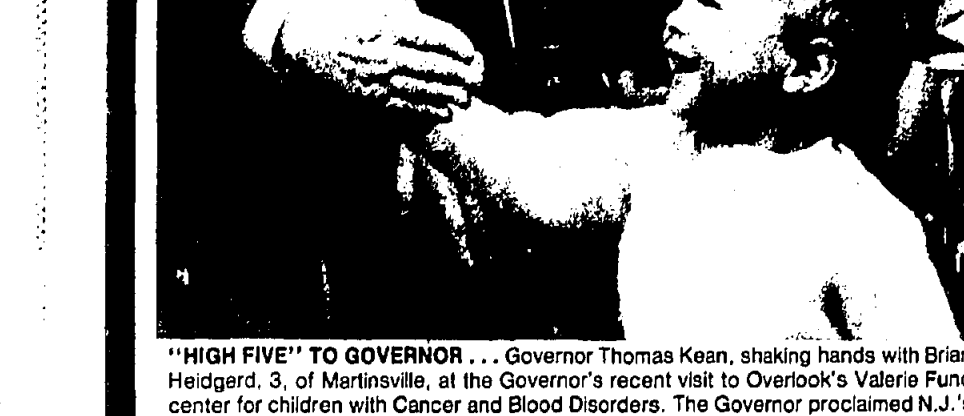

P.O.s offer special service for last-minute gift package mailings

It's the day before Hanukkah or Christmas and it's taken until now to find the special gift or card for that special person. But the special person is halfway across the continent. What to do?

"Use Express Mail Service as your last minute alternative" advises Rahway Postmaster Joseph P. Rufolo. "No one should procrastinate, yet all of us sometimes let things slip through the cracks, and when we forget to send a holiday message or gift to a special friend or relative, Express Mail stands ready to save the day with overnight service."

"It's always better to mail early. But, when you can't for one reason or another, Express Mail is an alternative, delivering even on Christmas and New Year's Day."

Rufolo further noted, "Express Mail is delivered overnight from our post office to nearly anywhere in the country if you mail by 5 p.m." For Express Mail up to half-pound, the rate is \$8.75. Up to two pounds, the rate is \$12. Up to five pounds, the rate is \$15.25. The rate increases in increments for packages up to

70 pounds. Express Mail is ideal for mailing perishables.

Express Mail Service can be used to make a big impression on that special someone. "Imagine it," says Postmaster Rufolo, "The package and cards have all been opened but there's nothing from you. Then a postal vehicle pulls up out front and there's a knock on the door. Your special gift is delivered...and in style!"

If time is not of the essence in getting your Christmas gift delivered, the Post Office advises using Priority Mail Service. It delivers packages weighing up to two pounds anywhere in the country in just two days between major metropolitan areas, and three days everywhere else for one low flat rate of \$2.40.

For larger items, the price of sending a package weighing up to five pounds by Priority Mail ranges from as low as \$3.61 to a maximum of \$6.37, depending on the destination; and for heavier pieces...up to 70 pounds...the rates are also low.

Priority Mail Service includes COD and special delivery and is insurable.

CAUTION: Auto thefts on rise during holidays

'Tis the season to beware. While the month of December is filled with holiday cheer, it is marked also by an increase in auto thefts.

In New Jersey, December had the highest theft rate of any month last year, and the insurance industry is advising drivers to be extra careful. To increase public awareness of the state's auto theft problem, the N.J. Insurance New Service (NJINS) has released a tip sheet to help motorists prevent their cars from being stolen.

"During this time of the year more people are shopping and traveling. More people park in places that are vulnerable to auto thefts, including shopping centers, malls, train stations and airport parking lots," says Detective Robert Penrose of the State Police Auto Theft Unit.

Carelessness is another reason why auto thefts occur, said Detective Fred Fitzpatrick of the Voorhees Township Police Department. "People are rushing around from store to store, more concerned about what they have to buy. As a result, they forget to take their keys out of the ignition, or they leave shopping packages on the car's seat."

New Jersey has one of the highest theft rates in the nation. To promote theft prevention, most insurers in the state offer 5 percent to 20 percent discounts on Comprehensive coverage to policyholders whose cars are equipped with alarm systems and theft deterrent devices.

Many times cars are stolen by juveniles, who take the cars just so that they can sell the parts to "chop shops," which specialize in stripping the stolen cars and selling the parts separately. A recent study showed that the high cost of individual replacement parts makes a car three times as expensive to replace as it cost originally. Insurers and law enforce-

ment officers agree that motorists can greatly reduce their chances of becoming victims of auto theft by following basic theft prevention measures, including locking the car, removing the keys, hiding valuables, parking in well-lit areas, and installing car security systems.

Detective Penrose believes that a starter-or ignition-disabling device, known as a kill switch, is one of the most effective theft deterrents. A kill switch will prevent the car from starting until the switch is set to the correct position.

"The more difficult you make it for thieves the more

likely they will move on to another car that is easier," Penrose said. "A siren alarm system also helps because it draws attention and may scare the thief away."

Motorists also are urged to be on the lookout for possible theft attempts, such as someone tampering with or trying to break into a car. Any suspicious activity should be reported to the police or mall security personnel immediately.

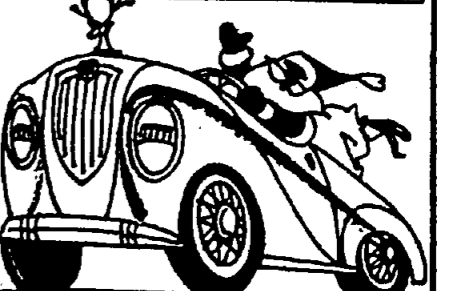
